Burlington Beer Works is a co-op in downtown Burlington — meaning it is owned by the community itself and made up of 2,300 owners. Tracy Schmidt, general manager of Burlington Beer Works, said most of its sourcing comes from Alamance County farms and includes over a dozen partnerships with local businesses such as Converge Coffee and Haand pottery.

Burlington Beer Works also employs

Elon students and hosts several events for the Elon community, Schmidt said.

"There are several departments within Elon that held their Christmas parties with us," Schmidt said. "This spring we are looking to partner with the greek life community to do profit share events here."

Burlington Beer Works has a rotating draft beer menu with 12 beers on tap at a time that are brewed on site, according to its website. Its food includes burgers, sandwiches, soups and salads. One thing that is less widely known about the restaurant is that Burlington Beer Works

serves brunch until 4 p.m. everyday, Schmidt said.

"I don't know that a lot of students realize, but it's not just weekends, but every day that we're open," Schmidt said.

Burlington Beer Works has been open since 2019 and, according to its website, its goal is being a community space as North Carolina's first cooperative brewery and restaurant. According to its website, for \$100 one can buy an ownership share of the co-op, which means access to owners only events, a vote for the co-ops board members and discounted merchandise.

"Some people like to live next door and they don't even know it's here," Brooks


Despite this, Maple View continues to be a hit within downtown Gibsonville.

The Koury Athletic Center was voted the "Best Fitness Center" of 2025. Since opening in the spring of 1994, the building has become a place of exercise, relaxation and community for Elon students.

The center features Jordan Gym, a 7,700-square-foot gym with six basketball hoops and space for two volleyball courts. It also includes Beck Pool, an indoor facility

and six 25-yard lap lanes. Additionally, the fitness center offers an aromatherapy program developed by Campus Recreation and Wellness to enhance emotional wellbeing and regulate sleep quality.

Sophomore Parker Stevens, an employee who works at the front desk, compared the Koury Athletic Center to those at other universities, noting Elon's center offers free access for students and their guests. He highlighted the welcoming environment and supportive community.

"I visited other colleges, I went to NC with more than 190,000 gallons of water State and UNC. First of all, you don't have to pay to get in here if you bring a guest. That's nice because I went to UNC and you have to pay like 10 bucks," Stevens said. "We also have much friendlier staff. We're big on customer service and just being very friendly to everybody. Make sure everybody feels welcome. It's not like a judgmental area."

Sophomore Kat Kester, a cycling instructor, said the fitness center stands out for its excellent facilities and friendly staff. She highlighted Koury's strong sense of community, where students and staff interact and support each other.

"Everyone is so loving and supportive. I'm a new hire but everyone has been so supportive of the whole process, and it's just a loving environment, even

The bookstore has three floors and carries a large variety of titles in store, as well as an online store. The coffee bar is located on the main level and serves a variety of drinks. Persnickety Books often hosts events including things such as open

Junior Emily Menjivar said she appreciates how the event offers a chance



BEST CAMPUS INITIATIVE

REUSABLE TO-GO BOXES

Elon Dining and Harvest Table Culinary Group have had a partnership with ReusePass to provide reusable to-go boxes at Elon dining locations since the start of the 2023-24 academic year. Students and staff can sign up for ReusePass, which is used on 64 college campuses across the country with their Elon credentials. A mobile QR code allows to-go boxes to be checked out for three days. Multiple to-go boxes can be checked out at once, while previously they were traded for a carabiner to check out and needed to be returned to check out another box.

Table Culinary Harvest Group Sustainability Coordinator Leslie Bosse said the process is designed to be easy for students to reduce food waste and promote sustainability.

"ReusePass has really upgraded our green to-go system to be even more convenient," Bosse said. "You almost always have your phone, so you almost always have your ReusePass."

Billy D's Fried Chicken and Village Juice and Kitchen have recently been added to the list of locations where the boxes are available, which was previously limited to McEwen, Lakeside and Clohan dining halls. Bosse said this was decided because of high levels of use of ReusePass to-go boxes.

"As the popularity of green boxes in retail (locations) grow, we would love to continue to expand this initiative," Bosse said. "We are always thinking about what we can do to increase our sustainability in the future."

According to ReusePass, Elon University saved 1,620 pounds of waste from going to landfills in 2024, as well as saved 11,696 gallons of water and 12,211 pounds of GHG CO2e, or Greenhouse Gas Carbon Dioxide Equivalent.

Bosse said ReusePass allows Elon Dining to collect data on the environmental impact through the number of box check-outs.

"It helps us to ensure that our program is as sustainable as possible," Bosse said.

PAPA FREDDOUGH'S PIZZA

"The first day I had my event, I saw people that bought one pizza and then would come back and get more. And that's when I knew, OK, I should really start doing this."

This moment was when senior Vince Freddo realized the potential success of his self-owned pizza-making business, Papa Freddough's Pizza.

Freddo began his pizza business his sophomore year at Elon University and it has expanded to a large customer base. He can be found almost every Saturday set up at a party and spends his summers catering from his home in Boston.

Freddo said his love of pizza started with his family in his hometown.

"My family has two pizza restaurants in Boston, so I've been doing pizza for seven, eight years," Freddo said.

In the beginning, Freddo's business was nothing more than making pizza in his apartment and sharing it with friends and neighboring residents.

"I registered my LLC as a sophomore, and then I started posting on my Instagram and getting more texts to come to parties and events on the weekend," Freddo said. "And that's really how it grew."

Now as a senior, Freddo said his business

is in high demand. His set up — consisting of a tent, mobile pizza ovens, tables and everything needed to serve the pizzas is often found at sorority and fraternity

"It's grown from me hitting people up and trying to connect with students, to them texting me or emailing me and asking me to do events for them months in advance," Freddo said.

Getting to be up close and personal with his customers is his favorite part of working events Freddo said.

"Not a lot of business owners get to have this be right with the people," Freddo said. "Usually they're in the back of the kitchen and making the food and stuff like that, but I think having a mobile pizza unit that I have, it's pretty cool."

In terms of pizza options, Freddo said his favorites always include hot honey.

"My go to is usually bacon or sausage somewhere around that realm, with a hot honey drizzle on top," Freddo said. "I love that. That's my thing."

After graduating in the spring, Freddo said he plans to dive head first into Papa Freddough's, including starting a petition to establish a location on Elon's campus.

"We play like three shows a week, so it never ends," Bazos said. "It's a lot, but it's not that hard to balance it, because it's how I would want to be spending my free time anyway."

In the heart of downtown Graham, a restored 1850s building is now home to Press Crepes and Coffee.

With the tagline "European inspired, Carolina made," Press serves a menu of crepes ranging from European styles to southern classics.

Co-founder Jason Cox said the goal of Press was to bring people together.

"The origin is the idea of a community

gathering space and then something a little fun," Cox said.

Creating a space for the community to come together was essential to Cox when he first opened the restaurant. He said he felt that individuals rarely have the opportunity to come together with strangers in a comfortable environment and wanted to create that opportunity locally.

"I can have young kids who look like they just woke up on a Saturday, in sweats and big hoodies beside a group of 70-something blue-haired ladies that have lived in the community their whole lives," Cox said. "And they're across from a guy and his wife."

Cox said he believes that "if the average person who works in the same setting can't eat there, then it's not really a community place."

Along with community gathering, Cox founded his business for a second purpose:

downtown revitalization.

Press is "a downtown revitalization project disguised as a business," according to Cox.

He likes to think that Press plays a role in bringing people, particularly Elon students, into downtown Graham. He believes that Graham has a lot to offer and he wants to introduce that to community members.

Cox is honored to have Press voted best breakfast, both as a reflection of his business and Elon student's exploration into the local community.

Nate Adams, owner of Chirba Chirba Dumpling Truck, grew up in Taiwan where his love for dumplings began. Adams and his business partners all went to school together at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill and were "raised in between cultures."

"The whole idea behind Chirba, the whole mission statement was, when all, partners and I, were together at school, at UNC, we couldn't find Chinese food like we remembered, ... so we started making it," Adams said. "The idea behind Chirba is that with globalization, access to ingredients, knowledge, there should be no reason that kids and people here in North Carolina can't have the same tasting dumplings that we had growing up in Asia,

Taiwan for me, China for my partners."

Adams described Chirba as "authentic Chinese food with Western style marketing," meaning the ingredients are the same as traditional dumplings, but the names and descriptions of dishes are different in order to be more accessible to customers who might not have had dumplings before and don't speak Chinese.

Chirba Chirba has been open for 13 years — and began as an operation in the dorms at UNC.

"We started trying to replicate food that we remembered in our dorms as best as we could," Adams said. "Later on, we got much better at it. We always seemed to have some type of test stuff in the freezer. So we realized that people liked them whenever everyone would just invite themselves over to our place after going out on the town or whatever and just be like, 'dumplings?' 'Yes.' 'All right, come on over."

The men's soccer team was voted "Best Men's Varsity Sport" by the campus community after a successful season that saw the Phoenix secure a regular season Coastal Athletic Association championship.

The team had many electric moments including starting the season 7-0-1 and entering the top 10 of Top Drawer Soccer's national rankings for the first time since 2015. The season also included senior Scott Vatne being named the CAA Player of the Year. After a strong start, the team dropped four straight losses but bounced back to capture the regular season title against Campbell University in the regular season finale. Head coach Marc Reeves, who was named the CAA Coach of the Year, said the win at Campbell was one of the more special moments of the season.

"I was very frustrated at times — not getting the chances I wanted, not getting the opportunities that I would have loved to have had," Stromsten said. "It can bring a lot of frustration, but the fact that we rallied, and at the end, on a personal note, being able to score the game winner against Northeastern, and then doing my last game against Campbell, it means everything. The fact that we went through a great start, a little rough patch, and then built our way out of it at the end meant a lot."

Despite a regular season title, Elon fell to the eventual champions Hofstra University in the semifinals of the CAA Tournament. It was the fourth straight year of making the CAA Semifinals and the second regular season title in the last three seasons.

"I think we're trying to build a consistency in our program, and that comes from having a cohesive culture that really values the people element and the development and the character aspect of our group," Reeves said.

Stromsten said the lack of egos on the team helped set the season apart and led to their success.

"The entire team did really good at not putting themselves before the team," Stromsten said. "It was really great to

see that we were working as a unit rather than individuals trying to prove something."

Reeves said he was glad that the team secured a regular season championship to cement the success of this season into history.

"It's only us and Hofstra that end up with some tangible trophy, something that keeps this team in the history books," Reeves said. "They're a championship team at Elon forever. So I'm really pleased that this group were able to do it again."

Luckily, the Deluxe Travel Edition folds neatly in half with convenient indents on the top that act as handles.
