I. Historical Association: See attached

Historical Context: 108 Gilman Street can first be seen on the 1852 Draper Map which according to Charles Sullivan of the Cambridge Historical Commission was based on 1846 survey information. The house is located on land belonging to Charles E. Gilman, Town Clerk, 1882-1872 and City Clerk from 1872-1888.

The house across Walnut Street (razed) was also owned by Charles E. Gilman and where he lived from at least 1877. The City Directories are ambiguous as to which house was considered his home and who lived at 108 Gilman Street prior to that date. The 1882 deed from Charles Gilman to



Enos Murray notes that the property also includes a building. Unfortunately the same deed does not reference how or when Charles Gilman acquired the land or when the house was built. It does cite an 1874 survey by Edward Foote, Surveyor for Mary A. Gilman.

108 Gilman Street was known as 101 Walnut Street prior to the early 1920s when a garage was constructed and a factory to make shoe blacking were added to the property. The factory was given the address of 108 Gilman Street while the house retained the 101 Walnut Street address, until such time as the factory was demolished.



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Site: 108 Gilman Street

See attached table of known ownership, tenancyof the property and alterations as found in maps, deeds, city directories and building permits.

Architectural Description: 108 Gilman Street is a simple 5-bay central entry house with double hung sash. It has been covered with vinyl siding since the building was surveyed in 1980. The building sits on a high concrete basement. It is unknown as to whether the concrete is parging or is part of the structure. The Applicant has heard that the original walls were insulated with corn cobs. From its description the building is possibly post and beam in structure. See attached photo.

Summary: 108 Gilman Street is associated with Charles E. Gilman, Town and City Clerk 1842-1888. The building may be old enough to predate the founding of the town.

Findings on Historical Association

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (b) are at the end of the next section.

(a) In accordance with the historic information obtained from *Findings on Historical Association*, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, such as *Somerville Past and Present*, Staff find 108 Gilman Street to be <u>importantly associated</u> with one or more historic persons or events, or with the broad architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.

The subject building is found importantly associated with the broad architectural, cultural, economic and social history of the City due to associations with Charles E. Gilman, Town and City Clerk, and with working class families from 1882 to the present.

II. Historical and Architectural Significance

The findings for historical and/or architectural significance of a historic property address the period, style, method of building construction and association with a reputed architect or builder of the subject property, either by itself of in the context of a group of buildings of structures (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B).

The period of significance for 108 Gilman Street begins prior to 1846 with its construction near the time the town was incorporated.

Integrity

The National Park Service identifies historic integrity as the ability of a property to convey significance. A property should possess sufficient integrity to convey, represent or contain the values and qualities for which it is judged significant; therefore, the following is an identification and evaluation of these qualities and alterations as they affect the ability of the subject property to convey significance.

a. <u>Location:</u> The Applicant has stated that the building was originally a barn and moved to the current location. There is no evidence in the maps and atlases to show this to be fact. See below.

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b. <u>Design:</u> The building is a simple vernacular design. The late Hopkins maps show the building to be T shaped. However the 1895 Bromley and subsequent maps show the building as rectangular.

- c. <u>Materials</u>: The wood-frame building has vinyl over wood clapboard as can be seen in the amount of exposure or reveal around the windows.
- d. <u>Alterations</u>: Documented alterations show changes in use beginning with the ownership of Morris Greenhood who used the property for automotive uses. Exactly how this affected the structure cannot be clearly deduced from the outside. A garage and a factory building both since demolished were also on the site could have been used for the more industrial purposes as Ada and Henry Harden appear in the 1927 City Directory as living at 101 Walnut Street.

Evaluation of Integrity: The building is unusual in its simplicity of design and size in a group of later larger late Victorian Era buildings. It retains the integrity and form of an early 19th century house. It is prominently located at the corner of Gilman and Walnut Streets across from the Ed Leathers Park.

Findings for Historical and Architectural Significance

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (a) can be found at the end of the previous section.

(b) In accordance with the *Finding on Historical and Architectural Significance*, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, which assess the ability of the property to convey significance, Staff find 108 Gilman Street historically or architecturally significant.

The subject building is found historically and architecturally significant due to its possible post and beam construction, early 19th century form and massing.

III. Recommendation

Recommendations are based upon an analysis by Historic Preservation Staff of the permit application and the required findings for the Demolition Review Ordinance, which requires archival and historical research, and an assessment of historical and architectural significance, conducted prior to the public meeting for a Determination of Significance. This report may be revised or updated with a new recommendation and/or findings based upon additional information provided to Staff or through further research.

For a Determination of Significance, the structure must be either (A) listed on the National Register or (B) at least 50 years old.

(A) The structure is NOT listed on or within an area listed on the National Register of Historic Places, nor is the structure the subject of a pending application for listing on the National Register.

OR

(B) The structure, circa 1846, is at least 50 years old.

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For a Determination of Significance under (B), the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant.

(a) In accordance with the *Findings on Historical Association*, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, **Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission find 108 Gilman Street importantly associated with one or more historic persons or events, or with the broad architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.**

The subject building is found importantly associated with the broad architectural, cultural, economic and social history of the City due to associations with Charles E. Gilman, Town and City Clerk, and with working class families from 1882 to the present.


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
(b) In accordance with the *Findings on Historical and Architectural Significance*, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, the ability to convey significance, **Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission find 108 Gilman Street historically and architecturally significant.**

The building is unusual in its simplicity of design and size in a group of later larger late Victorian Era buildings. It retains the integrity and form of an early 19th century house. It is prominently located at the corner of Gilman and Walnut Streets across from the Ed Leathers Park.

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





1852 Draper with current boundaries overlaid – House

existant at this time. The house across Walnut Street was also owned by Charles E. Gilman.

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


1874 Hopkins Plate 33



1884 Hopkins Plate 3


1895 Bromley Plate 9



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
