I. Historical Association

Historical Context: The property was platted in 1858 by C. L. Stevenson for J. B. Stearns. The first deed from Joshua B. Stearns to Samuel G. Underhill (1809-1885) was not found on line but is dated to 1862. According to City Directories, Underhill lived on Cutter Street, therefore the house was rental property.

No tenants could be found until 1881 although the house clearly existed by 1874 and probably earlier.



Residents held a wide variety of blue collar jobs from entry clerk to engineer to comptometer (a fairly complicated early calculator patented in 1887) operator. The building was not inhabited by owners until 1920 when George R. Moore bought the house. He was a fireman and engineer for a steam railroad.

G. Moore received a building permit for a concrete block 3-car garage in 1921.

Evolution of Site: The house is located on the short section of Pearl Street between Mount Vernon Street and Mount Pleasant Street. The street was mostly built up by 1874 with a few small lots filled in later.

Architectural Description: The house is a 1-bay by 3-bay 1 ½ story residential structure with an enclosed side porch. The building has a variety of siding materials from vinyl to synthetic brick and real brick. The windows are all replaced. A small shed dormer and a central chimney can also be seen from Pearl Street.

The garage is 3-bays wide and has wood batten garage doors and one pedestrian door.



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Summary: The house is a simple workers cottage that retains its original form and massing. Dating to around 1862, it is one of the earlier buildings on this section of Pearl Street. Unlike many of the workers cottages, none of the residents listed on the US Census have been foreign born.

Findings on Historical Association

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (b) are at the end of the next section.

(a) In accordance with the historic information obtained from *Findings on Historical Association*, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, such as *Somerville Past and Present*, Staff find 14 Pearl Street to be <u>importantly associated</u> with one or more historic persons or events, or with the broad architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.

The subject building is found importantly associated with the broad architectural, cultural, economic and social history of the City due to its size, form, style, and massing as a good example of workers housing and associations with the working class, particularly workers on the steam railway.

II. Historical and Architectural Significance

The findings for historical and/or architectural significance of a historic property address the period, style, method of building construction and association with a reputed architect or builder of the subject property, either by itself of in the context of a group of buildings of structures (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B).

The period of significance for 14 Pearl Street begins prior to 1874 as workers housing.

Integrity

The National Park Service identifies historic integrity as the ability of a property to convey significance. A property should possess sufficient integrity to convey, represent or contain the values and qualities for which it is judged significant; therefore, the following is an identification and evaluation of these qualities and alterations as they affect the ability of the subject property to convey significance.

- a. Location: The building has not been moved.
- b. <u>Design:</u> The building design is simple and unornamented, in keeping with its purpose of housing for workers.
- c. <u>Materials:</u> The building is wood-frame construction with more modern materials applied over the wood frame.
- d. <u>Alterations:</u> The form of the house is essentially unaltered although at some point between 1925 and 1933, the side porch was enlarged and possibly enclosed while a new back door mudroom was added to the rear of the building. The wood clapboard was replaced with vinyl, faux brick and wood shingles. The windows have all been altered or replaced.

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Evaluation of Integrity: The building retains the essential form, shape and size of a workers cottage and can therefore be understood as such despite some alteration of the external fabric. The building is the smallest and probably the oldest on the street which exhibits a range of altered Second Empire and Mansard roofed houses.

According to one neighbor, the yard had until recently been mostly hidden behind trees and shrubs, used by teenagers in the area looking for a secluded spot to congregate.

Findings for Historical and Architectural Significance

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (a) can be found at the end of the previous section.

- **(b)** In accordance with the *Finding on Historical and Architectural Significance*, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, which assess the ability of the property to convey significance, Staff find 14 Flint Street historically or architecturally significant.
- 14 Pearl Street is found historically and architecturally significant to the ability of the subject parcel to convey significance regarding location and design in terms of scale, height, form and massing. This building retains a number of qualities that continue to convey both historic and architectural significance, such as the location of the structure on the lot and the spatial relationships between the subject dwelling and other dwellings along Pearl Street.

III. Recommendation

Recommendations are based upon an analysis by Historic Preservation Staff of the permit application and the required findings for the Demolition Review Ordinance, which requires archival and historical research, and an assessment of historical and architectural significance, conducted prior to the public meeting for a Determination of Significance. This report may be revised or updated with a new recommendation and/or findings based upon additional information provided to Staff or through further research.

For a Determination of Significance, the structure must be either (A) listed on the National Register or (B) at least 50 years old.

(A) The structure is NOT listed on or within an area listed on the National Register of Historic Places, nor is the structure the subject of a pending application for listing on the National Register.

OR

(B) The structure, circa 1874, is at least 50 years old.

AND

For a Determination of Significance under (B), the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant.

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(a) In accordance with the *Findings on Historical Association*, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, **Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission find 14 Pearl Street importantly associated with one or more historic persons or events, or with the broad architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.**

The subject building is found importantly associated with the broad architectural, cultural, economic and social history of the City due to its size, form, style, and massing as a good example of workers housing and associations with the working class, particularly workers on the steam railway.

OR


(b) In accordance with the *Findings on Historical and Architectural Significance*, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, the ability to convey significance, **Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission find 14 Pearl Street historically and architecturally significant.**

14 Pearl Street is found historically and architecturally significant to the ability of the subject parcel to convey significance regarding location and design in terms of scale, height, form and massing. This building retains a number of qualities that continue to convey both historic and architectural significance, such as the location of the structure on the lot and the spatial relationships between the subject dwelling and other dwellings along Pearl Street.

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
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1874 Hopkins Plate 14-15








1900 Sanborn Plate 106
