# Somerville Commission on Energy Use and Climate Change Meeting Minutes January 11, 2022, 2021 7:00 P.M. Virtual Meeting

#### Review and approve meeting minutes from December 2021

• Motion by Commissioner Bueno; seconded by Commissioner Johnston; approved 6-0

## **City Updates:**

- Re-opening application for Commission position, including outreach to applicants from 2020. Position description notes looking for someone with experience working with marginalized communities.
- Most recent SustainVille newsletter includes a hazard mitigation survey. The survey has received over 300 responses so far and more are encouraged.
- Office of Sustainability and Environment and the OSPCD-Housing Division are working on a proposal for American Rescue Plan Act funding
- Somerville was recognized for its climate change work by CDP. It is one of 95 cities around the world to get an "A."

### American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA")

- Presentation from Erica Satin-Hernandez regarding how the Commission can help with ARPA process.
  - o Guidance on how to evaluate ARPA proposals against sustainability recommendations.
  - o Also open to ideas about specific projects.
- Subcommittee of Commissioners Bueno, Galloway and Johnston will prepare ideas to present at February Commission meeting. The Commission discussed the following:
  - o Rubric checklist versus guidance
  - What metrics should measure, e.g., project ability to minimize climate impacts or provide climate benefits
  - Goal is to increase consideration of metrics rather create yes/no decision on a project

#### <u>Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act</u>

- There is now guidance about how funds can be used, but not yet clear how money allocated to Massachusetts will be distributed to municipalities.
- Fund uses include activities relevant to climate change and Commission's scope; does not require direct response to COVID.

- Members expressed interest in different categories for eligible funding, including weatherization, transportation, resiliency against extreme weather, and communications, internet, and cyber security.
- Brainstormed several potential uses:
  - Work at city buildings, such as adding solar panels; helpful to know if there is a timeline or priority for work on these buildings. Staff could discuss with the Energy Manager where the gaps in funding are, and the Commission could have input.
  - O City revolving loan fund or expanding the Energy Stabilization Fund to the private sector.
  - O Education and support for alternative/more climate change friendly infrastructure decisions (*i.e.*, think of infrastructure as more than just the physical component)
  - o Incorporate green infrastructure into ongoing sewer separation work
  - Rehab and advisory services for two-unit buildings for weatherization and electrification (HeatSmart CoolSmart), or to avoid new gas connections.

### <u>Cambridge Resilience Efforts</u> (presented by Commissioner Wood)

- Overview of Mystic and Charles River Regional Coastal Flood Interventions
  - o 10 potential projects could protect a lot of inland areas, including Draw Seven Park in Somerville. Many could affect flooding in Somerville.
  - o Projects are generally not designed and none are fully funded.
- Highlighted need for regional collaboration.
