



 - 1. Greg: Data is collected annually, varies a lot by school, walking generally increasing.



- ii. Question: What are SRTS' goals? How are we measuring them?
 - 1. Greg: Overall goal is to make walking/biking/rolling/taking transit to school a safe option for every student, which might include reducing driving near schools and slowing down traffic on major streets surrounding schools. We don't currently have funding specifically for street reconstruction for SRTS but it's a priority in the general pool of reconstruction projects.
- iii. Question: Crossing guard shortage?
 - 1. Greg: Yes, a staffing shortage exists. Hiring/management of crossing guards done by Police. There's a system to prioritize which intersections get available staff.
 - 2. Suggestion: Community outreach to recruit parents at their kids' schools.
 - a. City doesn't have the capacity to organize bike/walk trains, but encourages parents to organize within their own communities and provides some resources.
- iv. Question: Possible to close streets around schools at pickup/dropoff?
 - 1. Greg: Collecting data and considering it, but nothing solid planned yet.
- v. Question: Argenziano and construction around it?
 - 1. Lots of discussion with the Principal, actively working on making improvements.
- vi. Suggestion: Freedom trail, but to schools.
 - 1. Need to collect more data about the most popular routes first, but would love to see it happen.

Executive Summary			
Purpose	Low-Income Fares expands fare affordability across the MBTA modes, addressing an existing gap for the low-income population ages 26-64.		
Development & Launch	Developing and launching a Low-Income Fare program is currently estimated to require at least 12 months with project implementation costs of approximately \$5 million. Key elements include the standard fare change process, changes to fare collection technology and fare media, the implementation of an online application, and onboarding of internal and partner staff in Community Based Organizations.		
5-Year Cost	We expect \$2.4 million of ongoing annual administrative costs, with fare revenue losses and operating costs growing from \$22 million in year 1 through a steady state of \$53 million in year 5.		
Broad MBTA Financial Context	Low-Income Fares are not currently in the MBTA budget. Implementing this would incrementally increase our funding gap and would require additional funding and/or reprioritization with other important initiatives impacting the Operating Budget.



Code of Conduct

One valuable way for residents to do this is by becoming a member of Somerville's boards, commissions and committees. These bodies are tasked with a wide variety of duties and services. The city strives to ensure that residents from all demographic sectors are participating on our boards, commissions and committees, along with ensuring these are safe spaces where members can all contribute equally. Members are important agents of the city, and thus must uphold high standards of conduct and professionalism. In order to achieve this, all members must comply with the following Code of Conduct when serving on any board, commission or committee:

- ust comply with the following Code of Conduct when serving on any board, commission or committee:

 1. Members will strive to appreciate differences in approach and point of view and treat recidents, city employees, partner organizations and other board, commission or committee members with courtesy, respect and professionalism.

 2. Members must administer board positions with integrity, honesty, truthfulness and adherence to the absolute obligation to safeguard the public trust. Members are also expected to maintain professional working relationships with other members. City staff and members of the public or commission or committee. While it is understood that members have the obligations, the expectation is that members will make every effort to attend and participate in meetings, and whenever possible communicate any hardships to attendance.

 4. In some instances, members may find that various laws may apply to boards, commissions and committees and to member participations, such as the Depen Meeting Law and the Public Records Law. Members are expected to comply with the applicable laws, and may seek guidance from city staff, the City Clerk's office or the City Solicitor's office. Members are expected to have a basic understanding of these laws and how they apply to their membership.

 The committee chair will be tasked with ensuring that all members have the opportunity to provide input and encourage the exchange of fair and balanced involvedge and perspectives.

 Members cannot unitaterally act on behalf of a board, commission or committee without authorization from the board, commission or committee.
- members cannot unitate any act on benair or a board, commission or commission or commission and authorization from that board, commission or committee.

 Members should commit to studying and analyzing the problems and issues that come before them, listen to requests/questions, ask for clarification if necessary, and provide complete,
- knowledgeable, accurate, precise information regarding inquiries.
