2023 Somerville Middle School Youth Health Survey Full Report

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About the Youth Health Survey

The Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System (YRBSS) monitors health behaviors, conditions, and experiences among middle and high school-aged students throughout the United States. The system includes a national Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), conducted by CDC, as well as separate state, local school district, territorial, and tribal school-based YRBSs, which are referred to as site-level surveys. These site level surveys use sampling methodologies that collect information from a relatively small but representative group of youth, which allows for these sites to generalize to the broader population. On the other hand, many municipalities, like Somerville, conduct their own version of the YRBS, often modifying the CDC survey, so that they can gather information on their entire student body, and then segment their analysis by age, race, ethnicity, grade, special education status, and other respondent characteristics.

The YRBSS is designed to gather information related to a series of prioritized, health risk behaviors known to contribute to the leading causes of death, poor health, and disability among youth and young adults. These include:

- Behaviors that contribute to unintentional injuries and violence
- Sexual behaviors related to unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases (STDs), including HIV infection
- Alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use
- Unhealthy dietary behaviors
- Inadequate physical activity

The YRBS also measures other high priority health-related behaviors and protective factors. These include:

- Prevalence of obesity
- Attitudes and perceptions related to substance use
- Food and housing insecurity
- Youth assets
- Academic achievement
- Sexual identity and sex of sexual contacts

Somerville Public Schools has administered an adapted version of the middle school YRBS every two years since 2003.

Administration of the Youth Health Survey

Somerville Public Schools engaged with John Snow, Inc. (JSI), a public health consulting firm, to support this initiative. Somerville Public Schools and JSI worked to develop, administer, and analyze the middle school survey.

SURVEY DEVELOPMENT

Somerville Public Schools and JSI developed the 2023 Somerville Middle School survey using past Somerville youth surveys, the CDC YRBS, and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's Youth Health Survey (YHS) for guidance.

SURVEY ADMINISTRATION & CONSENT PROCESS

Once the survey content was finalized, JSI designed self-administered, online surveys for the middle school using a nationally recognized, specialized survey platform called Alchemer. In addition to English, the survey was translated into Spanish, Portuguese, and Haitian Creole. JSI then worked with each school to develop a standard survey administration plan and schedule. Survey administration occurred two week period, during the students' regular class time in February.

Prior to administration, Somerville was provided additional, tailored assistance with respect to implementing the student opt-out process, confidentiality practices, and other procedures to ensure the quality and integrity of the data collection process. Schools obtained passive parental permission. Parents were mailed a form explaining the purpose of the survey and given the opportunity to have their child "opt out" of taking it. Individual student surveys are never shared, but are combined to create school-specific datasets.

DATA CLEANING

Online administration of the survey allowed for results to be immediately transferred to JSI's secure computer servers, where the data were aggregated and analyzed using SAS 9.4 (SAS Institute Inc., Cary, NC). The raw data set was reviewed for completeness and the amount of time students took to respond to the questions. Records where a student started but did not complete any of the survey questions, completed less than 50% of the questions, or had a high rate of response but took less than 50% of the average time to complete the survey were marked as incomplete and excluded from the analysis.

Reporting on the Youth Health Survey

The purpose of this report is to highlight key middle school findings for five six core domains. Data is reported and analyzed for all students in Somerville, as well as by grade, gender identity, sexual orientation, race, and ethnicity. The information provided below is meant to highlight key themes and provide a perspective on how the district-specific data compares to the prior year and state benchmark data. Confidence intervals were used to test for the significance of the findings within each cohort. If the cohorts had three or more variables (i.e., grade, gender, race), the confidence intervals were compared to the average to determine significance. If cohorts had two variables (i.e., sexual orientation, ethnicity), the confidence intervals were compared to each other to determine significance. Somerville has been provided detailed data outputs and raw reports that allow them to look more carefully at data from each question on the survey, including information that allows the school districts to analyze their data by specific demographic cohorts.



Overall, 11% of middle school students skipped school because they felt unsafe on their way to or from school in the past 30 days.* *There is no statewide comparison data.*

EXPEREINCED DISCRIMINATION

Middle school students were asked different ways in which they had experienced bad or unfair treatment in school during this school year (since September) Overall, 9% of middle school students reported that they were sometimes, most of the time, or always treated badly or unfairly in school because of their race or ethnicity, 4% because of their sexual orientation, and 3% because of their religion. *There is no statewide comparison data.*

Gender: Gender minority students were significantly more likely than the average middle school student to experience discrimination because of their sexual orientation, and significantly less likely than the average middle school student to experience discrimination because of their religion.

Sexual Orientation: Sexual minority students were significantly more likely than heterosexual students to have experienced discrimination because of their sexual orientation and religion.



EXPEREINCED DISCRIMINATION

Middle school students were asked different ways in which they had witnessed or heard discriminatory actions or language from school students, teachers, or staff. Overall, 9% of middle school students reported that they had witnessed discrimination from teachers or school staff based on someone's race and 5% based on someone's gender identity. Thirty-five percent of middle school students reported that they had witnessed discrimination from students based on someone's race and 25% based on someone's gender identity. There is no statewide comparison data.

Sexual Orientation: Sexual minority students were significantly more likely than heterosexual students to witness gender-identity based discrimination by students.

Race: American Indian/Alaska Native students were significantly less likely than the average middle school student to witness racial discrimination by students or school staff. Asian students were significantly less likely than the average middle school student to witness racial discrimination by school staff. American Indian/Alaska Native and Asian students were also significantly less likely than the average middle school student to witness gender-identity based discrimination from students or school staff.



Race: American Indian/Alaska Native and Asian students were significantly less likely than the average middle school student to have experienced sexual violence.

Dating Violence

Overall, 4% of middle school students have experienced sexual dating violence, 2% have experienced physical dating violence, and 6% were monitored or controlled by someone they were dating or going out with in the past 12 months. This is the first year that this question was asked so there is no trend data. *There is no statewide comparison data*.

Sexual Orientation: There were no significant differences.




The 2023 Somerville YHS defined bullying as when one or more student's tease, threaten, spread rumors about, hit, shove, or hurt another student over and over again. It is not bullying when two students of about the same strength or power argue or fight or tease each other in a friendly way. Electronic bullying is things such as someone spreading a rumor or something untrue about you online; someone sending you a threatening or aggressive message; someone posting an embarrassing picture of you online without your permission; someone taking a private message you sent them and forwarding it to someone else or posting it where others could see it.













Overall, 20% of middle school students felt sad or hopeless almost every day for two or more weeks in a row that they stopped doing some of their usual activities (i.e., experienced depression) in the past 12 months.










































