I. Historical Association

Historical Context: Highland Avenue ran through to Central Street by 1852 and was added to incrementally. As of 1874, the road was penciled in from Cherry Street to Grove Street and finally put through the Tufts Brickyards to Davis Square by 1874. The 1874 Hopkins map shows the plat at 251 Highland Avenue attributed to the ownership of C. Smith. No house was located on this property until the early 1890s. The house and storefront are adjacent to a private right of way or snicket that runs from Hudson Street to Highland Avenue. The right of way was originally a portion of Porter Street that ran to Broadway was never constructed.

A wide range of owners and tenants have lived in this house. The most prominent of



the owners was Charles E. Shaw, painter and paper hanger who was also a member of the Prescott-Robert A. Vinal Hook & Ladder Company No.1 in Union Square and later a Lieutenant at the Highland Avenue Hook & Ladder Company No.2. In 1911, a store was added to the front of the house for the grocery of William C. Jones who lived around the corner on Conwell Street. Small stores were located wherever there was a streetcar stop. Frank W. Weeks who lived 251 from 1919-the 1960s was listed a clerk and manager of a grocery store. See attached table for more information on owners and tenants.



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Site: 251 Highland Avenue

Architectural Description: 251 Highland Avenue is a 2 ½-story 2-family wood-frame house with a square-bay by a single story brick façade storefront that was added on in 1911 by W. Jones. The current storefront dates to 1972. The house is sided with vinyl and has replacement windows.

Summary: This ca. 1895 house has been home to a number of working class and middle class owners. The addition of a storefront in 1911 changed the character of the house, bringing the building closer to the street and making it less domestic. This type of alteration was made to homes located near transportation lines where the clientele would be able to pick up needed goods on their way home. Other houses in this block also have similar alterations.

Findings on Historical Association

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (b) are at the end of the next section.

(a) In accordance with the historic information obtained from Findings on Historical Association, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, such as Somerville Past and Present, Staff do NOT find 251 Highland Avenue to be importantly associated with one or more historic persons or events, but do find it to be associated with the broad architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.

The subject building is NOT found importantly associated with one or more historic persons or events but is associated with the broad architectural, cultural, economic and social history of the City. There is no association with any particular persons or events but is associated with the development of Highland Avenue as an important and commercial corridor.

This *ca.* 1893 house at 251 Highland Avenue has been home to a number of working class and middle class owners. The addition of a storefront in 1911 changed the character of the house, bringing the building closer to the street and making it less domestic. This type of alteration was made to homes located near transportation lines where the clientele would be able to pick up needed goods on their way home. Other houses in this block also have similar alterations. The number of small retail shops along this section of Highland Avenue indicates that this was a major node of local commerce for those commuting to and from Boston by streetcar.

II. Historical and Architectural Significance

The findings for historical and/or architectural significance of a historic property address the period, style, method of building construction and association with a reputed architect or builder of the subject property, either by itself of in the context of a group of buildings of structures (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B).

The period of significance for 241 Highland Avenue begins with its construction circa 1890 and continues to the present day.

Integrity

The National Park Service identifies historic integrity as the ability of a property to convey significance. A property should possess sufficient integrity to convey, represent or contain the values and qualities for which it is judged significant; therefore, the following is an identification

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and evaluation of these qualities and alterations as they affect the ability of the subject property to convey significance.

- a. <u>Location:</u> The house is located on a major local arterial in a group of similar buildings, many of which have *ca.* 1910-1920 storefronts added to them or have ground floor retail.
- b. <u>Design:</u> The building is a Queen Anne style home with a square two story bay that has been altered over the years. It has a gable end toward the street and symmetrically placed windows. The ground floor has been obscured by the addition of a storefront.
- c. <u>Materials:</u> The building is wood frame construction with an overlay of vinyl siding and an asphalt roof. The windows are all replacements except one Queen Anne style stair window.
- d. <u>Alterations:</u> A storefront was added to the building in 1911 and given a more modern façade in 1972.

Evaluation of Integrity: The building bears strong architectural relationships to other nearby buildings on the block constructed circa 1895 where every other house has an added storefront and where ground floor retail can be found on larger scale buildings of later construction.

Findings for Historical and Architectural Significance

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (a) can be found at the end of the previous section.

(b) In accordance with the Finding on Historical and Architectural Significance, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, which assess the ability of the property to convey significance, Staff find 251 Highland Avenue historically or architecturally significant.

The subject building at 251 Highland Avenue is found historically and architecturally significant in the context of a group of buildings. The building bears strong architectural relationships to other nearby buildings on the block constructed circa 1895 where every other house has an added storefront and where ground floor retail can also be found on larger scale buildings of later construction.

III. Recommendation

Recommendations are based upon an analysis by Historic Preservation Staff of the permit application and the required findings for the Demolition Review Ordinance, which requires archival and historical research, and an assessment of historical and architectural significance, conducted prior to the public meeting for a Determination of Significance. This report may be revised or updated with a new recommendation and/or findings based upon additional information provided to Staff or through further research.

For a Determination of Significance, the structure must be either (A) listed on the National Register or (B) at least 50 years old.

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(A) The structure is NOT listed on or within an area listed on the National Register of Historic Places, nor is the structure the subject of a pending application for listing on the National Register.

OR

(B) The structure, circa 1895, is at least 50 years old.

AND

For a Determination of Significance under (B), the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant.

(a) In accordance with the Findings on Historical Association, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission do NOT find 251 Highland Avenue importantly associated with one or more historic persons or events but do find it to be associated with the broad architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.



AND/OR

(b) In accordance with the Findings on Historical and Architectural Significance, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, the ability to convey significance, Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission find 251 Highland Avenue historically and architecturally significant.


