


# Overview of Covered Programs

- <u>CDBG Funds</u> used in a flexible manner for economic development, improvements to parks and open space needed for public services, and affordable housing projects and programs.
- <u>HOME Investment Partnership Funds</u> used to further affordable housing programs and projects.
- <u>Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Funds</u> used to support shelters, homelessness prevention, and rapid re-housing programs for the homeless and those at risk of homelessness.




# Action Plan Goals and Objectives


- <u>Stabilize and Revitalize Diverse Neighborhoods</u> neighborhood infrastructure; parks and open space; economic development projects for targeted low to moderate-income areas
- <u>Preserve and Maintain Existing Affordable Housing CDBG</u> and HOME funding for homeowner rehab; energy system replacements; homebuyer assistance; tenant-based rental assistance
- <u>Family Stabilization and Job Readiness</u> supports public services agencies in providing family economic stabilization activities through CDBG funding
- <u>Ending and Reducing Homelessness</u> utilizes ESG funds to target efforts to reduce and end homelessness.
- <u>Infrastructure and Urban Environment Improvements</u> \_ \_utilizes CDBG funds to address a lack of recreational space in low- and moderate-income areas; mobility/safety improvements; tree planting.





# Assessment of Goals & Objectives Economic Development

- Main Street Technical Assistance- In PY 2022, the Union Square and East Somerville Main Streets organizations continued to provide critical technical assistance and community outreach to local small businesses. With the City's shift from pandemic response back to resuming its projected development track, the Main Streets organizations are playing a more important role than ever in assisting small local businesses navigate the city's changing economic and commercial landscape.
- These organizations serve as key liaisons between small businesses and the city administration and provide critical technical support with policy issues such as outdoor dining, traffic impacts, digital footprints, and other technical issues.
- Main Streets Organizations provided direct technical assistance to 10 individual eligible micro-enterprise businesses as well as providing district-wide support.





#### PUBLIC SERVICE EXPENDITURES CDBG-CV




