September 9, 2002

## I. CALL TO ORDER

Chairperson Dennis Sullivan called a Regular Meeting of the School Committee to order in the aldermanic chambers at 8:02 p.m., with a moment of silence and a salute to the flag of the United States of America.

## II. ROLL CALL

Present were Mr. Sullivan, Ms. Cardoso, Ms. Bauer, Ms. Murray, Ms. Rossetti, and Ms. Taylor.

Ms. Harris, Alderman White and Mayor Gay were absent.

#### III. AWARDS AND CITATIONS

There were no presentations made this evening.

## IV. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

# V. STUDENT ADVISORY COUNCIL

Student representative Kim Carvalho began by expressing she hoped everyone had a pleasant summer. She then reported on the following items for this evening:

Informed members she welcomed Mr. Ciccariello back to Somerville High School. She and the students are very happy to have him return and serving as the new SHS Vice Headmaster.

Kim reported on the new block schedule this year and expressed she believes it will work out successfully for all students.

# V. STUDENT ADVISORY COUNCIL (cont.)

Regarding the anniversary of the September 11<sup>th</sup> national tragedy, Kim reported that Somerville High School students will be involved in remembering the heroism of those firefighters and police officers who died in the line of duty serving their country, and also those who were innocent victims. The morning will begin with a moment of silence and later on, Senior Class President, Melinda Barbosa, will lead the school in saying the Pledge of Allegiance. Kim, along with many of the other members of the National Honor Society, will be rotating shifts, standing outside the high school with many American flags in honor the September 11<sup>th</sup>.

In closing, Kim expressed her excitement about her senior year of high school and stated she looks forward to attending the regularly scheduled school committee meetings to bring news to the school committee as well as the community.

#### VI. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

Dr. Argenziano reported on the following items:

- Thanked the students, staff and administration for a very successful first four days of school.
   Dr. Argenziano reported we had two hundred additional students enter our schools. Once the student entries and transfers are complete, it appears our enrollment, as planned, will be between 5,950 to 5,980 by October 1<sup>st</sup>.
- 2. Information concerning our drop out rates for the school year 2001 was provided to members. Dr. Argenziano expressed his congratulations to Somerville High School the dropout rate was reduced 4.9 to 3.3 percent. He thanked Mr. Galligani and his staff as a drop of 1.6% is something to applaud.
- 3. Also enclosed is a K-12 Coordination memorandum, provided with information of the schedule of the Coordinators in the K-8 buildings and where they can be reached.
- 4. Information regarding the enrollment projections (2002-2003) was given to members. This will continue to be updated right through the first week in October because the number of students entering or transferring hasn't been complete as of this date.
- 5. Also provided was the 2002 Advanced Placement Test Results. As previously discussed, advanced placement credit is usually given by colleges to students with a grade of 3, 4, or 5.
- 6. Dr. Argenziano informed school committee members he would provide information for them in next week's packet for the Long Range Planning Committee September 23, 2002 meeting, which will be held at the East Somerville Community School.
- 7. Correspondence from Rhoda Schneider, General Counsel for the Department of Education regarding MCAS graduation requirements was provided to members. Michael Long, Attorney for Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents sent a copy to all Superintendents and Dr. Argenziano wanted to share this information.
- 8. Enclosed is this week's packet is the July and August 2002 Personnel Report, providing members with all the resignations, retirements and relocation of our staff.

# VI. REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT (cont.)

- 9. A copy of the August 27<sup>th</sup> Boston Globe census article which mentions Somerville as one of the community snapshots was provided. Dr. Argenziano mentioned that a little over 18 months ago we were close to 50% majority, 50% minority and according to the recent census that number has gone up to 70% majority.
- 10. Announced that Judy Reardon, Executive Secretary to the Commissioner of Education asked if he would be willing to speak on Thursday, September 12<sup>th</sup> at 12:30 when Commissioner Driscoll gives out the 2003 Graduates MCAS scores publicly. He explained to the committee he was selected to say a few words because Somerville was outstanding and showed the greatest improvement of the number of potential non-graduates and that number has been reduced. Dr. Argenziano expressed he is very pleased and proud to have the opportunity to publicly thank the students, teachers and administrations for their work.
- 11. The Parent Curriculum Guides for Grades Pre-K through Eight were distributed to the school buildings and every parent of every grade level will be receiving this information.
- 12. Informed members that all students have received the Somerville High School handbook.
- 13. Mentioned that our fall season is opening up in full swing in many sports. Football will be opening up at Watertown this coming Saturday, September 14<sup>th</sup>. We found out ten days ago that Conway won't be ready for our soccer team until October, so at the present time we are looking for a field.
- 14. Thanked the school committee for providing the school department with everything they needed to be able to have a smooth opening.

Ms. Rossetti informed members that, hopefully, by this February 1, 2003, we would be ready to have a grand opening ceremony for the Teen Connection Center and the new Heath Center.

# ✓ Free and Reduced Lunch Program

Brief discussion took place regarding the free and reduced lunch program. Regarding the percentages of our children taking advantage of this program, the numbers are diminishing. Previously, 78% of students within our school system were using the free and reduced lunch program and as it stands today, that percentage is 50%. Further discussion will take place at an upcoming meeting, on the projection of how the Foodservices Department plans to handle their budget with this loss.

## VIII. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

## A. <u>Tufts University - Scholarships</u>

# B. <u>Storage of Medications/Inhalers in School Buildings</u>

Regarding the storage of medicines and or inhalers in the school buildings, Ms. Taylor asked how a student would have access, if necessary, to their medication, in the absence of the school nurse. The Superintendent provided members with the MASC Somerville Public Schools Policy – page 9, File: JLCD, *Self Administration of Prescription Mediations*. Dr. Argenziano referred to requirement #8 and informed the committee that according to

the nurses he has spoken to across the city, the inhalers are not part of the locked medication that is in the policy under requirement #8. More importantly, before school and after school, especially for the K-5 students, most parents have been asked to give a back up in case he child loses their inhaler or cannot find it. In most buildings the inhalers are in an unopened area, they are marked with the student's name and there is a back up especially for before-school and after-school programs when nurses are not on duty. A building Principal or Assistant Principal can open the office so a student has access to their medication.

Ms. Cardoso asked that we revise our group efforts to defeat the Unz Amendment, Referendum Question #2 on the Ballot. Please work with Linda Vitiello, STA President and Roger Rice, to get the word out as much as possible between now and the November election. We need to have our teachers go back to the cities and towns where they live and tell their families, friends and neighbors how devastating this proposal is to students and teachers.
