When the Bubble Bursts

The nature of the material world is that happiness, and the material accouterments we associate with happiness, come and go. Our modern economies are based on the idea that the more things we acquire, the happier and more successful we will be. Despite our best endeavors to acquire more, however, we can accumulate wealth, only to see it disappear in a flash. Because we measure wealth in "assets" that have no tangible existence, we are ever more vulnerable to financial loss. As Srila Prabhupada pointed out, in former times assets were largely land, precious metals, and other items that can actually be held in the hand. The emergence of paper money moved us to a system where wealth is measured by a marker that has no inherent value. Paper money has value only because we all agree on that value.

The growth of the virtual world means wealth is now measured by "assets" that exist only in a computer database. Crypto currency, electronic forms of payment created using computer encryption algorithms, has emerged as an alternative to paper currencies backed by national governments. The recent collapse of FTX, a leading cryptocurrency trading platform, highlights the imaginary nature of "wealth" in the material world.

Last month, at least \$1 billion of customer funds vanished from FTX. Current reports are that the missing assets are valued at between one and two bil-



lion dollars. FTX's bankruptcy marked a stunning reversal for Sam Bankman-Fried. The 30-year-old had set up FTX in 2019 and led it to become one of the largest crypto exchanges, accumulating a personal fortune estimated at nearly \$17 billion. FTX was valued in January at \$32 billion. Now that those billions of dollars have "disappeared" we are left asking exactly what was being valued in the first place.

This is not the first time that the collapse of a major industry has wiped out "wealth" that ultimately existed only on paper or in



computer records. Before its bankruptcy on December 2, 2001, Enron, an American energy company, employed approximately 20,600 staff and was a major electricity, natural gas, communications, and pulp and paper company, with claimed revenues of nearly \$101 billion during 2000. At the end of 2001, it was revealed that Enron's reported financial condition was sustained by an institutionalized, systematic, and creatively planned accounting fraud.

Bursting economic bubbles have periodically erased fortunes over the past century. Financial planners respond by advising investors to diversify, placing assets in different categories to minimize the impact of a downturn in any particular industry. But the nature of the material world means that there is no way to guarantee that wealth can never be lost. Real knowledge addresses how to deal with loss rather than how to prevent it.

The Pandavas acquired unimaginable wealth when they settled in Indraprastha. They were strong, well-trained and intelligent. Yet within a short time, they were homeless and impoverished. With each setback, however, they demonstrated both resiliency and faith in Krishna's plan. In a world where loss is inevitable, we must learn to cope with the disappearance of the material things we value. Spiritual knowledge is the real treasure and the only asset we can never lose. Whether we are "wealthy" or struggling against inflation, disappearing assets or other financial stress, we can invest confidently in our connection to Krishna.

project is to allow cows to be happy, grow organic produce for the Juhu temple and offer a village experience to visitors, while providing them with basic modern amenities during their stay.

ISKCON Official Speaks at PaRD Annual Conference in Indonesia

Recently, in Bali, Indonesia, ISKCON India's Director of Communications Yudhistir Govinda Das spoke at the annual conference of the International Partnership on Religion and Sustainable Development (PaRD), a Germany-based organization whose members include 123 faith-based organizations (FBOs) and 15 government and multilateral entities.

The four-day conference organized on the sidelines of the G20 Summit saw the participation of government officials, faith leaders, academicians, and civil society leaders from more than 30 countries who came together to discuss practical measures in advancing sustainable development through the participation of religious actors.

"As per several surveys, nearly 70% of the population identifies themselves through a religious identity. Governments and policymakers around the world are now waking up to the fact that faith-based organizations and religious leaders play a major role in the process of development. This is why agencies like the United Nations are more actively engaging with faith communities to find solutions that are realistic and practical." said Yudhistir Govinda Das, who is also a Fellow of KAICIID, a multilateral institution based in Lisbon which works for promoting dialogue among religious communities.

Speaking in a 90-minute panel discussion on the topic of the 'Role of Religious communities in responding to Natural

Disasters,' Yudhistir Govinda Das explained the challenges responders face during such events and the importance of collaborating with FBOs when they occur. He stressed the need for members of religious groups to promote and practice a simpler and self-satisfied life, the absence of which leads to various social and ecological challenges.

He highlighted the work of ISKCON'S members and volunteers who have served as first responders during various natural and man-made calamities by providing food relief, medical aid, and counseling to the victims.

"While some members knew the work of ISKCON in the areas of spirituality and culture, exchanges like these highlight the important contributions of ISKCON be it for disaster relief, environmental preservation, providing rural literacy and employment opportunities. These are the main pillars of a sustainable model at the heart of which are the spiritual teachings," added Yudhistir Govinda Das.

Notable speakers included Ministers and senior government officials from Denmark, Indonesia, Italy, Germany, USA along with officials from various UN and multilateral agencies. According to the feedback of the participants, the addition of major civil society groups made the conference a success.

Dear Friends,

Please accept my humble obeisances. All glories to Srila Prabhupada.

Euphemism is a strange word. It refers to a gentler way of phrasing things. For example, one can say "unusual" instead of "horrible" or "unpalatable" instead of "bitter."

One of the 26 qualities of a devotee mentioned by Sri Caitanya Mahaprabhu (*Caitanya-caritāmṛta: Madhya lila 22.78-80*) is *mṛdu* (mild).

In Srila Prabhupada's *Bhagavad-gita As It Is*, it is said in the 17th chapter, 15th verse: "Austerity of speech consists in speaking words that are truthful, pleasing, beneficial, and not agitating to others, and also in regularly reciting Vedic literature."

In one of Jiva Goswami's *Sandarbhas*, it is indicated that harsh words are more painful to the heart than an arrow that pierces the body close to the heart.

In one of his lectures Srila Prabhupada tells of a medical doctor who murdered one of his male patients. The crime was discovered by an off-duty policeman who was driving a car on an Indian road. The car in front of him was pulling a closed wooden trailer that was dripping blood.

The murder occurred when the medical doctor learned that his patient "was implicated" [euphemism for "having an affair"] with the doctor's wife.

Srila Prabhupada wasn't always using euphemisms, because he regularly employed such terms as 'fools, devils, criminals, crooks, swindlers, rogues, thieves, villains, window smashers, miscreants, cheaters, and con artists.' He spoke of learned men attempting to remain in *Brahmananda* who came back to the material world, put on a show, took money from their

audiences and then went away. Such tricksters were in the category of persona non grata, and their misdeeds were to be carefully avoided, along with members of the 13 pseudo-*sampradayas*. This was an integral part of his teaching. He took on the popularity of modern science and technology as one of his key enemies, and insightful individuals – devotees in search of truth, appreciated his adroit perception and spiritual alternatives.

But gentility in personal dealings was one of his most outstanding traits. When his own disciples fell from grace for years (including sannyasis who had relations with women), he was extremely welcoming and forgiving, just like a benevolent father who loves to see prodigal sons and daughters return home. He could be soft as a rose and hard as a thunderbolt.
