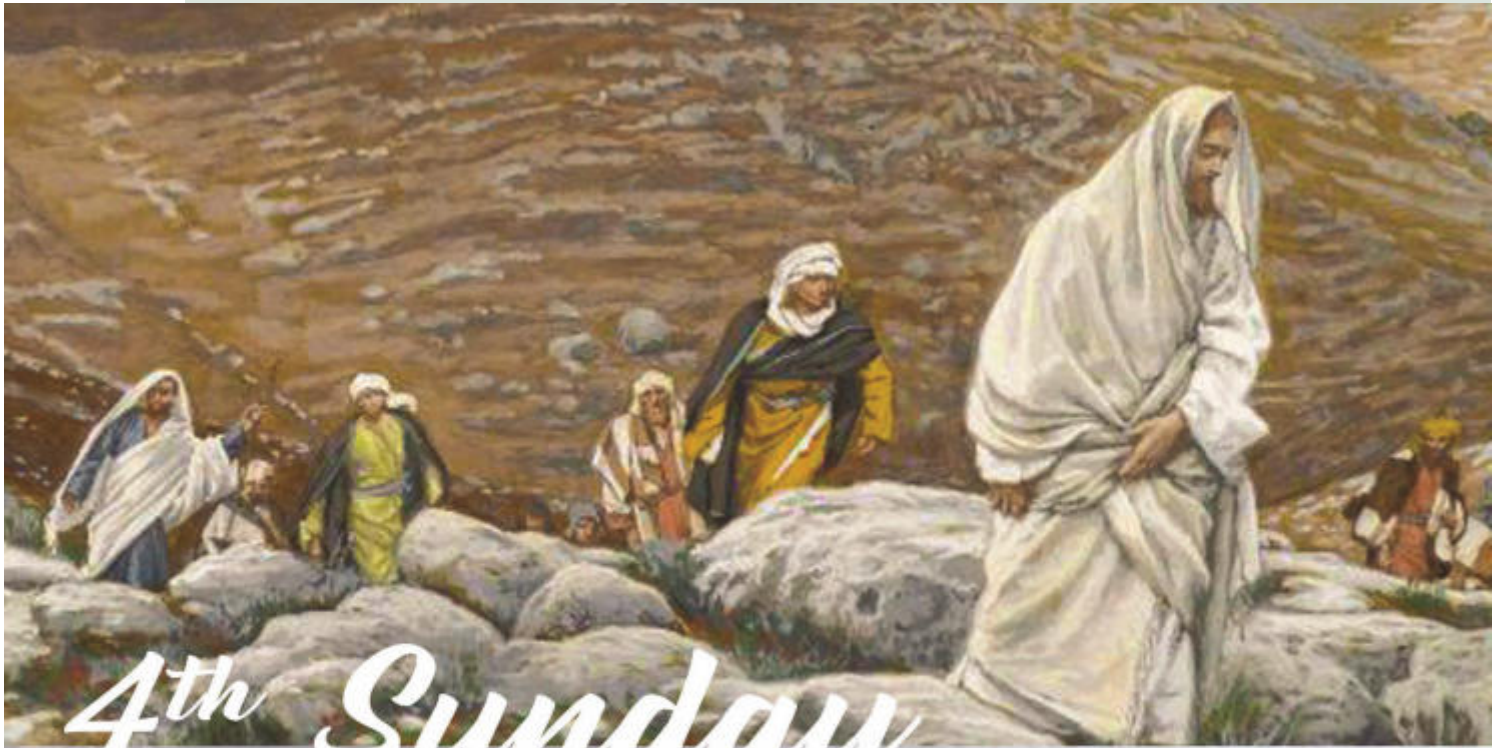

As we continue our considerations regarding sins against the First Commandment, I want to look today at a very prevalent problem in our society: the rejection of human dignity. I will take this topic up again next month, but from a different perspective. However, this problem, which has so invaded our minds and hearts, most people are not even cognizant of, let alone consider it a violation of God's Law. It violates the First Commandment because we are made in the image and likeness of God, so violations against the dignity of a human person violate God in Whose image we are made.

Several months ago I received a package in the mail from a woman named Mallory Millett. It was filled with some brochures she had made entitled *Marxist Feminism's Ruined Lives*. Mallory Millet is the sister of Kate Millett, an atheist, communist with a PhD. who has written a number of books frequently used in Women's Studies courses in colleges and universities across the country.

Mallory describes a meeting to which she was invited by her sister which was called a "consciousness-raising group," the same kind as was used in China under Chairman Mao. The meeting began with something of a litany which went back and forth between the leader and the participants. She quotes the dialogue: "Why are we here today?" *"To make revolution."* "What kind of revolution?" *"The Cultural Revolution."* "And how do we make Cultural Revolution?" *"By destroying the American family."* "How do we destroy the family?" *"By destroying the American Patriarch."* "And how do we destroy the American Patriarch?" *"By taking away his power."* "How do we do that?" *"By destroying monogamy."* "How do we destroy monogamy?" *"By promoting promiscuity, eroticism, prostitution, and homosexuality."*

In order to advance these goals, they established the National Organization of Women. They also determined that they had to permeate every American institution, something that would be accomplished through the media, the educational system, universities, high schools, and school boards, then the judiciary, legislatures, the executive branches and even the library system. This sounded insane but, unfortunately, they were able to pull it off. Kate Millett has written a number of books and was featured on the cover of Time magazine.

Not even attempting to hide what she was about, Time called her the "Mao Tse Tung of the Women's Movement." The basic thesis of her writings, according to her sister, is that "the family is a den of slavery with the man as the Bourgeoisie and the woman and children as the Proletariat." The only way out of this slavery was women's liberation. What does this mean?

It means each female is to be worn down to lose all empathy for boys, men, and babies. She must become an outlaw, because the laws of the West are designed to enslave women to men. Millett says: "all women are prostitutes." Sexuality, in this

system, means being promiscuous, seeking your own pleasure in order to develop as a full free human being "just like men;" women can also be professional prostitutes which they see not only as a viable business for women, but call it "empowering." The traditional idea of marriage, according to these people, causes a woman to prostitute herself to one man as she falls under the heavy hand of "the oppressor."

Women are taught to be heartless and non-sentimental. A woman is to live her own life, and no man or baby is to get in the way. Sexuality is used as a power over a man. Engaging in sex, with anyone, is now called "making love." Any man needs to know that a woman's body is her own, so she can destroy the body of a baby growing within her because "it's my body." She is not to have relations with anyone who disagrees with this idea. Furthermore, a woman is not to allow a man to open a door for her or to be considered a lady, because that is not only insulting, but a means of ownership.

All of this was planned and carried out by a group of Marxists often known as the "Frankfurt School." These were professors who came from Germany to flee Hitler; they imposed their Marxist propaganda on America. It all began in 1933 and they have been very diligent in carrying out their scheme. They went after women knowing women are the foundation of the family, and the family is the foundation of the Church and society. The destruction of women will lead invariably to the destruction of men and of children. The goal of the Frankfurt School was to destroy the society by destroying morality, family, and patriotism. They had to destroy men so men would not stand up for their families or for their country. The two means to do this were feminism and homosexuality. If one will accept the extremes of immorality, abortion and homosexual acts, then anything less is also acceptable.

The professors of the Frankfurt School stated that theirs would be a new kind of revolution, a revolution not of bullets and battles, but a revolution of ideas. They have been tragically successful. Women, please recognize what these people are trying to do to you. Their brand of liberation is slavery, not freedom. They are destroying not only you, but your husband and children with you. Men, the war is ultimately against you! If you do not stand against evil, it will destroy everything that is truly important in your life. Be a man, protect your family, be the spiritual and moral leader in the family. If you do not know how to do this, look at Jesus. On the Cross He shows us what it is to be a real man.

This is how the enemy of humanity is attempting to destroy us all. If we do not recognize our dignity, protect and defend that dignity, and act according to that dignity, then the vile creature has won. Just as with Adam and Eve, the temptation was directed to their minds. This is a revolution based on ideas. Reject the lies. Learn the truth and live in accordance with that truth.

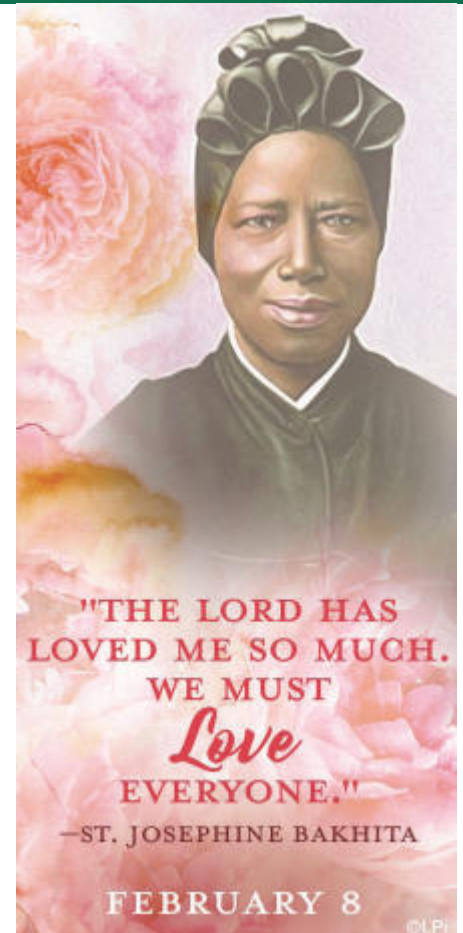

website may not always reflect updated closing information on the weekend.

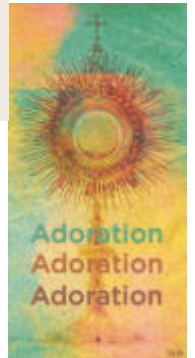
There is always a need for new committed adorers and for substitutes. Currently, new adorers are needed for the following hours:

SAINT OF THE DAY - SAINT ANSKAR

Anskar was born around the year 801 near Amiens, in northern France. He was educated at the nearby monastery of Corbie. He entered monastic life there and then moved to Corvey, Corbie's daughterhouse in Saxony, in what is now the eastern part of Germany. Anskar proved to be a great preacher and so was sent as a missionary to evangelize the Danes. His mission to them, encouraged by the local king, met with initial success as many Danes became Christians. But then a king came to power who was not as supportive, and Anskar returned to France, bringing with him a number of converts to be educated at Corvey and other monasteries. Then, in 829, an opportunity came up for Anskar to go to Sweden. There again his mission met with initial success. In 831, Anskar was appointed abbot of Corvey, then archbishop of the new diocese of Hamburg. In his thirteen years there, he organized more missions to Denmark and Sweden and to Norway. He also built churches and a library. The Church grew for a while in Scandinavia, but was decimated by Viking raids there and weakened by the sacking of Hamburg by the Vikings in 845, whose adventures in foreign lands included murder, rape, theft, destroying churches, monasteries and homes and enslaving people. Christianity did not thrive again in Scandinavia until the end of the Viking age in the eleventh century. Anskar was not only a great preacher, he was also known for his charity to the poor. He took the Gospel literally, washing their feet and waiting on them at table. He also led an austere life, wearing a hair shirt and living on bread and water for as long as his health permitted. Anskar died in 865 and was buried in Bremen, Germany. Saint Anskar, pray for us!
