The Mysteries of the Rosary, Chapter Twenty-eight: The Presentation, continued...

Saint Luke writes that Simeon was **“looking for the consolation of Israel.”** (Luke 2:25) The Greek word translated as “consolation” is *paraklesis*,

which can also mean “comfort” or “encouragement.” When Simeon saw the baby Jesus, he recognized the consolation, comfort and encouragement he had been looking forward to, along with so many of his fellow Israelites.

One thing they had been looking forward to, guided by God’s messages through the prophets, was the overthrow of the foreign, pagan rulers who had conquered them and the establishment of God’s rule over them through a Savior, the Messiah or Anointed One, who would establish a kingdom at once divine and earthly that would one day extend over all the earth.

It seems remarkable to me that Simeon could say that by seeing one little baby, Jesus, he had seen that salvation. The Romans still ruled Israel. People still fought each other, got sick and died. Pride, hypocrisy, hardness of heart and lack of faith infected many of Simeon’s countrymen—as Jesus later would point out. But in the midst of the darkness, Simeon could see the light of salvation.

That took a lot of faith—the kind of faith the author of the Letter to the Hebrews wrote about: **“Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.”**

That definition of faith could be interpreted as having one’s gaze fixed on the future. In a way, it is. Simeon had faith that the baby Jesus would in the future manifest God’s saving plan to the whole earth. One day the Romans would be gone from Israel—except as friars, nuns or tourists—and through Jesus Christ the words of the Prophet Habakkuk would come true: **“The earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD, as the waters cover the sea.”** (Habakkuk 2:14)

But I think there was more to Simeon’s spiritual sight than just being able to trust in God’s actions in the future. He also had a share in God’s perspective. God is outside of time, and those who are close to God are blessed to sometimes share that way of perceiving reality. We know Simeon was close to God because we read that **“he was righteous and devout”** and **“the Holy Spirit was upon him.”** (Luke 2:25) So even though he was present only at

the very beginning of the Messiah’s life on earth, he was able to rejoice as if he were living in the fullness of Christ’s Kingdom.

God’s perspective is something people really need today, too. Without it, many folks live in a fog. That fog can be very different to different people—fear, resignation, frantic activity, self-medication with addictive behavior, withdrawal into fantasy worlds or attempts to build one’s own kingdom here and now through political activity, interpersonal conquests, thrills, excitement or popularity. But it is all like rearranging deck chairs on the Titanic as the hidden iceberg cuts deeper into the hull of the ship—the iceberg of despair that comes from distance from God, who is Love greater than any created being or thing can provide.

To open oneself to that Love usually takes some action on our part. Simeon went into the Temple. (Luke 2:27) Anna was always in the Temple, fasting and praying night and day (Luke 2:37). Zacchaeus climbed a tree to see Jesus. (Luke 19:1-10) Saint John lay close to Jesus’ chest. (John 13:23) Long before, Jacob wrestled with God in the appearance of a man. (Genesis 32:22-30) Moses approached the burning bush. (Exodus 3:1-6) Elijah challenged the prophets of Baal to a contest (1 Kings 18:20-40) and later walked forty days and forty nights to the mountain of God. (1 Kings 19:8) Saint Francis of Assisi gave up all the comforts of this life other than prayer, friendship and the beauty of nature, and found Christ in the lepers. Saint Teresa of Calcutta left a secure job teaching girls from rich families for the insecurity of serving the poorest of the poor and depending totally on God’s providence. Other people find God serving meals to the hungry, visiting people in care centers, building homes in Haiti, praying in the Adoration Chapel, or walking hundreds of miles on the Camino de Santiago de Compostela in Spain.

Whatever we do to make more time for God in our schedules, our attention and our hearts, we will become more open to seeing his consolation, salvation and love, now, in the future and beyond time.

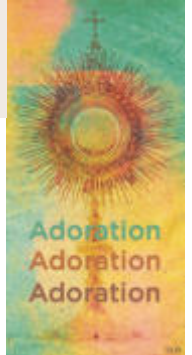

SAINT OF THE DAY - SAINT WILLIAM OF MALAVALLA

William was a French soldier who led a dissolute life as young man, repented and made a pilgrimage to Rome, asking Pope Blessed Eugenius III to impose a penance on him. Eugenius told him to make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. He did so, then spent the next eight years making other pilgrimages. Then, in 1153, William settled in the northern Italian region of Tuscany. He tried to live the life of a hermit, but he gained such a reputation for holiness that he was constantly sought out by would-be religious and disciples, and he was eventually persuaded to govern a monastery near Pisa. William found the laxity of the monks' way of life intolerable and withdrew to nearby Monte Pruno. Disciples joined him here, but they turned out to be no better than the monks, so he withdrew once more, this time to a wilderness near Siena, in a remote valley known in Italian as *Malavalla*, "bad valley." At first, he lived there in a cave or hole in the ground, then the local lord of Buriano built him a cell. He lived alone on roots and herbs for a year and then was joined by a disciple named Albert, who later wrote an account of the last thirteen years of William's life, which included details such as his hair shirts, prayer, contemplation and mortification. A doctor named Rinaldo also joined them shortly before William died. A chapel was built over his grave, followed by a hermitage. The community grew, taking the name of Gulielmites, or Hermits of St. William. They later spread to other parts of Italy and into France, Belgium and Germany. Saint William of Malavalla, pray for us!
