Get Cruisin'



For many families, boats - especially large boats like our Ferries - aren't exactly common modes of transportation. With that in mind, the Ferry provides a taste of a cruise experience without having to commit to day(s) on the water. One round-trip cruise across the Bay and back will take about three hours if you stay on board, but don't let the shorter trip length fool you; the journey is packed with sightseeing opportunities, from lighthouses to wildlife, including the occasional whale or dolphin.

For kids, you can ask the crew for special Pirate Pete coloring books, wildlife bingo cards and other free activities including rope tying cards or boat baseball cards. If you're lucky enough to catch the Captain walking through, you can also ask for a Captain's card and get to know a little bit more about how our Captains came to

"sail up" to their current positions.

In fact, many families have made annual pilgrimages to the other side of the Bay without ever getting off the boat. That said, it's not unusual for families to set sail for the other side and take a shuttle into town once they arrive. Exploration opportunities abound in both Lewes, DE and Cape May, NJ, so whether it's sightseeing, shopping or dining, there's plenty to do on both sides of the Bay. If you plan your

trip to arrive around lunchtime, you can grab a bite, explore the town, and be back to your home vacation port with enough time to clean up for dinner and reminisce about memories made and sights seen.

Ferry Gazing & Pedal Pushing



It's not unusual to see families come to the Ferry terminal to just spend time on the boardwalk and watch the boats come in, without ever stepping foot on board. For many, it's the first time they get to see a boat this big, this close by. Even for the experienced sea-goer, it's a true wonder to watch the Ferry captains manuever the vessels into the dock and hear the various horns and signals being called out as the big boats tie up.

The Ferry is also a great stopping point or end destination for local bike treks, as there are numerous shoreline trails nearby. In Lewes, families can drive up and park for free at the terminal, rent bikes and start a pedal powered journey right there. Cape Henlopen State Park is an easy, flat road ride located directly down the street from the

Ferry terminal.

In Cape May, bikers more commonly pedal their own bikes to the terminal. The ride from downtown Cape May to the Ferry terminal takes about a half an hour, and once you arrive you can stay and hang out, or take your bike aboard the Ferry (bikes travel FREE, riders just pay foot passenger fare) and explore the trails on the Delaware side.

Explore Lighthouse Lore



in 1885, it separates the Delaware Bay on the breakwater rocks built to protect the Delaware coast from higher force waves. When visitors have a swim in the calm waters off of Lewes beach, they have the breakwater (and the lighthouse that alerts mariners to the breakwater) to thank.

There are people who travel across the country in an attempt to see all of the almost 1,000 lighthouses still in existence in the United States. Luckily - for them, as well as for the rest of us - there are three lighthouses not only in close proximity to the Ferry, but in easy view during a normal crossing. Each of the three is distinctive from the others, and clearly show the variety of lighthouse constructions employed over the years.

When leaving Lewes, the first lighthouse you'll spot is called the Breakwater, a reddish lighthouse that can be seen from shore. Built

Next, there's the white Harbor of Refuge lightouse a bit farther out at the mouth of the Delaware Bay. The lighthouse is named so because it was built to protect the maritime area known as the National Harbor of Refuge. Built in 1926, it was contstructed to withstand the harshest of Atlantic storms, and has already survived several fierce hurricanes.

Finally, when coming into Cape May, passengers can spot the lean and tall Cape May Lighthouse. Located in Cape May Point State Park, it is the oldest and tallest of the three, built in 1859.

Visitors to the park can climb the 199 steps to the top to get a spectacular view of the area all the way from Wildwood back to Cape Henlopen, Delaware.


