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

II. Why study the book of Revelation?



"It is between fifty and sixty years since I read it (i.e. the Book of Revelations), and I then considered it merely the ravings of a maniac, no more worthy nor capable of explanation than the incoherence of our own nightly dreams."

My view of Revelation is that its ruthless, vengeful God who destroys the majority of the human race stands in sharp contrast with the God of Jesus.

Though it is the great prophetic Book of the New Testament, the last of all the writings of Inspiration, a special message from the ascended Savior to His Churches on earth, and pressed upon every one's attention with uncommon urgency, there are religious guides, sworn to teach the 'whole counsel of God,' who make a merit of not understanding it, and of not wishing to occupy themselves with it."

A. It is the word of God.

- From beginning to end, Revelation testifies to its status as *God's word*:
 - Revelation 1:1–2 "The Revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave Him to show to His bond-servants, the things which must soon take place; and He sent and communicated it by His angel to His bond-servant John, who testified to the word of God and to the testimony of Jesus Christ, even to all that he saw."
 - Revelation 22:18–19 "I testify to everyone who hears the words of the prophecy of this book: if anyone adds to them, God will add to him the plagues which are written in this book; and if anyone takes away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God will take away his part from the tree of life and from the holy city, which are written in this book."

- As the word of God, the book of Revelation must be a part of the Christian's spiritual diet:
 - Matthew 4:4 (Deuteronomy 8:3) "It is written, 'MAN SHALL NOT LIVE ON BREAD ALONE, BUT ON EVERY WORD THAT PROCEEDS OUT OF THE MOUTH OF GOD."
 - Matthew 28:19 20 "Go therefore and make disciples . . . teaching them to observe all that I commanded you . . ."
 - Colossians 3:16 "Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you."
 - 2 Timothy 3:16–17 "<u>All Scripture</u> is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; so that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work."

B. It promises blessing to those who study it.

- Scripture in general pronounces blessing on those who study it:
 - Psalm 1:1–2 "How blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked, nor stand in the path of sinners, nor sit in the seat of scoffers! But his delight is in the law of the LORD, and in His law he meditates day and night."
 - Luke 12:28 "Blessed are those who hear the word of God and observe it."

- Revelation in particular pronounces blessing on those who study it:
 - Revelation 1:3 "Blessed is he who reads and those who hear the words of the prophecy, and heed the things which are written in it; for the time is near."
 - Revelation 22:7 "And behold, I am coming quickly. Blessed is he who heeds the words of the prophecy of this book."

C. It reveals Jesus Christ.

- Jesus Christ is the culmination of biblical revelation:
 - Hebrews 1:1-2 "God, after He spoke long ago to the fathers in the prophets in many portions and in many ways, in these last days has spoken to us in His Son, whom He appointed heir of all things, through whom also He made the world."
- The dominant theme of Revelation is Jesus Christ, and Revelation reveals knowledge about Christ found nowhere else in Scripture.
 - Revelation 1:1–2 "The Revelation [ἀποκάλυψις, apokalypsis] of Jesus Christ, which God gave Him to show to His bondservants ..."

- John's vision of glorified Christ (1).
- Christ's self-descriptions in the letters to the seven churches (2–3).
- The vision of the Lamb in heaven (5)
- The description of Christ's Second Coming (19) and millennial reign (20).
- The description Christ's role in the new heavens and earth (21–22).
- Christ's final exhortation (22).
- The book of Revelation is indeed a collection of prophecies about the end times, but it is a collection centered around the person of Christ.

"Admittedly, no writer on this inestimable volume can or should claim he has the final word on this book of Scripture. But this is no reason either to neglect its glorious message or engage in fantastic flights of the imagination. We all do well to realize it is God's final unveiling of the glories of His blessed Son. Our focus must ever be on Him in this Grand Finale. The book is an incomparable Christology in itself."

It is a book of which Christ is the great subject and center, particularly in that period of his administrations and glory designated as the day of his uncovering, the day of his appearing. D. It provides vital truth to churches.

- The book of Revelation was written *to churches*.
 - **Revelation 1:4** "John to the seven churches that are in Asia: Grace to you and peace"
- These churches faced the same kinds of challenges we face today: ullet
 - persecution (Smyrna) incorrect priorities (Ephesus)
 - compromise (Pergamum)

 - self-sufficiency (Laodicea)

- tolerance of immorality (Thyatira)
- spiritual apathy (Sardis) ostracism (Philadelphia)

• "He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches" (2:7, 11, 17, 29; 3:6, 13, 22).

E. It reminds us the end is near.

- We share the same problems as the seven churches: either materialism, cultural compromise, or despair—all of which assume that things won't change.
- But the book of Revelation reminds us that this world as we know it is coming to and end.
 - Revelation 1:3 "Blessed is he who reads and those who hear the words of the prophecy, and heed the things which are written in it; for the time is <u>near</u>."
 - Revelation 22:10 "Do not seal up the words of the prophecy of this book, for the time is <u>near</u>."

- Revelation 22:7 "And behold, I am coming <u>quickly</u>...."
- Revelation 22:12 "Behold, I am coming <u>quickly</u>, and My reward is with Me"
- Revelation 22:20 "Yes, I am coming <u>quickly</u>...."
- One of the greatest needs in our day is the recovery of the doctrine of *imminency*.
 - "Imminence" describes "the condition of something that could happen at any time or is about to happen. When applied to the second coming, the term means that Christ could return at any moment" (MacArthur & Mayhue, *Biblical Doctrine*, 931).
- Revelation is the antidote to *materialism, compromise,* and *despair*.

"Like a magnet, it lifts the heart of the believer out of the world, and out of his low self, and enables him to stand with Moses on the mount, and transfigures him with the rays of blessed hope and promise which stream upon him from those sublime heights. It is the most animating and most sanctifying subjects in the Bible. It is the soul's serenest light amid the darkness and trials of earth. . . . And just in proportion as he who is awake to the great truth of the Savior's speedy coming, and is engaged in waiting and preparing himself accordingly, is a better man than the half-Christian and the lukewarm, in that same proportion is he who reads, hears and keeps the words of this prophecy blessed beyond all other people."
