Monday – Luke 1

How did Luke gather the material to write his gospel? Why is this significant? (vv. 1–4)

Why did Elizabeth say that Mary was blessed? (v. 45)

What was Mary thankful for in her song? (vv. 46–55)

Tuesday – Luke 2

Why was it important that Jesus be born in Bethlehem? (v. 11)

How would you expect the King of the universe to be received when He is born? How was Jesus received when He was born? (v. 7)

What did Jesus mean in verse 49?

Wednesday – Luke 3

Why did John the Baptist rebuke the crowds? (vv. 7–8)

How was the Trinity present in verse 22?

Why did Luke include a genealogy of Jesus? (vv. 23–38)

Thursday – Luke 4

How did Jesus respond when He was tempted by Satan? (vv. 1–13)

Why did Jesus read the section from Isaiah 61? (vv. 18–19)

Why did the crowds in Nazareth want to kill Jesus? (vv. 23–30)

Friday – Luke 5

How did Peter respond to Jesus' miracle? (v. 8)

What do the stories of the leper and the paralytic demonstrate about Jesus? (vv. 12–26)

Why did Jesus minister to the outcasts of society? (vv. 31–32)
