Monday – Luke 6

What are the similarities and differences between the beatitudes recorded in Matthew 5 and those recorded in verses 20–26?

What is the benefit of loving those who love you? Why is this the case? (vv. 32–36)

According to verse 45, why do people say what they say?

Tuesday – Luke 7

What is so extraordinary that causes Jesus to marvel? (vv. 1–10)

How would you explain John the Baptist's apparent doubt? How does Jesus respond? (vv. 18–35)

Why does Jesus allow a prostitute to wash his feet? (vv. 36–50)

Wednesday – Luke 8

Why does Jesus say that He speaks in parables? (vv. 9–15)

Why does Jesus respond to His family the way that He does? (vv. 19–21)

Why do the crowds in the country of the Gerasenes want Jesus to leave, even after He did a public service? (vv. 26–39)

Thursday - Luke 9

Why do you think Jesus had the twelve take nothing on their missionary journey? (vv. 1–6)

What does being a disciple of Jesus require? (vv. 23–27, 57–62)

What is the significance of Jesus's transfiguration? (vv. 28–36)

Friday - Luke 10

What were the cities of Chorazin and Bethsaida? Tyre and Sidon?

How is the trinity present in verses 21–22?

How does Jesus answer the question, "who is my neighbor?" (vv. 29–37)
