- *What is the point the passage is making?*
- *What does this say about God?*
- *How should I apply this in my life?*

Monday – Acts 27

Why is it significant that Paul survived a shipwreck?

What does the precise detail of chapter 27 tell us about Luke's reliability?

Why did the men have to stay in the boat in order to be saved? (v. 31)

Tuesday – Acts 28

How is the narrative of the snake similar to the narrative of the shipwreck? (vv. 1–6)

How did Paul's imprisonment work out for him?

Why does Acts end "unresolved"?

Wednesday – Galatians 1

What is Paul's emphasis in his greeting? (vv. 1–5)

What is a "different gospel?" (vv. 6–9)

What role does Paul's autobiography have in his argument? (vv. 11–24)

Thursday - Galatians 2

Why does Paul mention the incident with Peter (Cephas)? (vv. 11–14)

What is the false teaching in Galatia that Paul is writing to refute? (vv. 3, 12, 16)

What is justification by faith in contrast to justification by works of the law? (vv. 16–21)

Friday - Galatians 3

Why can works of the law not justify someone? (vv. 10–14)

What does it mean for believers to be "one in Christ Jesus"? (v. 28)
