# Chapter Four: The God of the Bible is Holy None Other by John MacArthur

"The holiness of God is not to be conceived of as one attribute among others; it is rather a general term representing the conception of His consummate perfection and total glory. It is His infinite moral perfection crowning His infinite intelligence and power."

# Warm-Up:

- 1. **Memory Verse:** Who is like You among the gods, O LORD? Who is like You, majestic in holiness, Awesome in praises, working wonders? (Ex. 15:11)

  - d. Share a time in your own life when you were overwhelmed by God's holiness. In what way was your response like Isaiah?
