

Mother Child Community Corrections Project Preliminary Mother Child Program Inventory

The purpose of this list is to help jurisdictions and organizations that are considering or developing programs that serve women offenders and their children to identify other programs that may be able to serve as models and/or sources of information.

This list is based primarily on information from the initial round of the National Institute of Corrections Women Offender Program Survey. The survey was designed to identify programs developed specifically to meet the needs of female offenders. The following list has been gleaned from the survey to include only programs that reference women offenders and their children. The list is not a complete inventory of existing mother-child programs, but will continue to be revised and expanded as additional information is obtained. The programs that follow include residential, day reporting/treatment programs, and case management strategies. They indicate either a facility that provides for women and their children, a target population of pregnant and/or parenting women, or a program or strategy specifically designed to support women in their parenting role. In addition, the list includes some institutionally-based programs along with community-based programs since there may be program components in each that are useful to consider. Further investigation is needed to determine the extent to which some of the programs focus on parenting, family, and children's issues. Materials listed as available (brochures, reports) are materials that the Mother Child Community Corrections Project (MCCC) has on hand. It is not meant to suggest all that is available from the program itself. Contact people listed may be from the public agency or the contract organization.

The inventory is divided into the following five categories, with programs listed alphabetically by state and city:

1. Residential programs serving sentenced women only.
2. Residential programs serving both sentenced and non- or pre-sentenced women.
3. Non-residential programs including day reporting/day treatment, work or education release, or home detention/electronic monitoring.
4. Programs involving specialized case management for female offenders with children.

5. Community programs for women with children that accept offenders.
