I had a fear of dead bodies that came from what I was told as a kid. Some of you know that I was an orphan that was reared in an abusive foster home. The father of that foster home, who did not like us, died when I was young and back in those days the dead bodies would rest in the living room of the house until the funeral. I vividly remember seeing him lay in his coffin with a net spread over the lid. One of his children (who likewise did not like the foster kids) told me that the net was there to keep him in the coffin and if I got too close, he would reach up and take me where he was! Sadly, I believed that for the longest time. I never shall forget the fear I had conducting funerals where the remains were behind me where I could not see them...every noise made me jump. I am over that fear now and have been for a few years now. The thing that helped me get over that fear was being with people as they died and staying hours with the body until the funeral people could take possession of the remains. Many times, I would sit and read my Bible and pray. Those quiet moments were filled with opportunities to touch the brow of God through the vale of sorrows. The things we say to children matter and really affect them for years to come. God's grace of healing and affirming is more than able to soothe the fears and foreboding of others. Thanks be to God. Do you know how Decoration Day/Memorial Day Started?

Decoration Day

Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2023 will occur on Monday, May 29. Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971.

On May 5 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. "The 30th of May 1868 is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Civil War soldiers buried there.

Many Northern states held similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor the dead-on separate days until after World War I.

The Civil War, which ended in the spring of 1865, claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries. By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

Memorial Day

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. And some records show that one of the earliest Memorial Day commemorations was organized by a group of formerly enslaved people in Charleston, South Carolina less than a month after the Confederacy surrendered in 1865. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Waterloo—which first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866—was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

On this Memorial Day let us remember our fallen brothers and sisters. All gave some, but some gave all.





History of Woestina Church

Have you seen this NYS Historical Marker? You may ask what does this have to do with me? If you attend Woestina Reformed this marker is describing our church. The Woestina Reformed congregation was formed in 1784 on Wolf Hollow Road in Hoffmans on the other side of the Mohawk River. It is the second oldest Dutch church in Schenectady County. *In 1814 the original building was taken* apart and transported over the river to its new location in Rotterdam Junction, and in 1935 that church was destroyed in a fire. The current building was dedicated on Dec. 10, 1936.

Happy Mother's Day to all the Mothers

Do you know how it came about?

The origins of Mother's Day as celebrated in the United States date back to the 19th century. In the years before the <u>Civil War</u>, Ann Reeves Jarvis of <u>West Virginia</u> helped start "Mothers' Day Work Clubs" to teach local women how to properly care for their children. These clubs later became a unifying force in a region of the country still divided over the Civil War. In 1868 Jarvis organized "Mothers' Friendship Day," at which mothers gathered with former Union and Confederate soldiers to promote reconciliation.

Another precursor to Mother's Day came from the abolitionist and suffragette <u>Julia Ward Howe</u>. In 1870 Howe wrote the "Mother's Day Proclamation," a call to action that asked mothers to unite in promoting world peace. In 1873 Howe campaigned for a "Mother's Peace Day" to be celebrated every June 2. Other early Mother's Day pioneers include Juliet Calhoun Blakely, a <u>temperance</u> activist who inspired a local Mother's Day in Albion, <u>Michigan</u>, in the 1870s. The duo of Mary Towles Sasseen and Frank Hering, meanwhile, both worked to organize a Mothers' Day in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Some have even called Hering "the father of Mothers' Day."

The official Mother's Day holiday arose in the 1900s as a result of the efforts of <u>Anna Jarvis</u>, daughter of Ann Reeves Jarvis. Following her mother's 1905 death, Anna Jarvis conceived of Mother's Day as a way of honoring the sacrifices mothers made for their children.

After gaining financial backing from a Philadelphia department store owner named John Wanamaker, in May 1908 she organized the first official Mother's Day celebration at a Methodist church in Grafton, West Virginia. That same day also saw thousands of people attend a Mother's Day event at one of Wanamaker's retail stores in Philadelphia.

Following the success of her first Mother's Day, Jarvis—who remained unmarried and childless her whole life—resolved to see her holiday added to the national calendar. Arguing that American holidays were biased toward male achievements, she started a massive letter writing campaign to newspapers and prominent politicians urging the adoption of a special day honoring motherhood. By 1912 many states, towns and churches had adopted Mother's Day as an annual holiday, and Jarvis had established the Mother's Day International Association to help promote her cause. Her persistence paid off in 1914 when President Woodrow Wilson signed a measure officially establishing the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.
