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A McHeard Moment: YHWH

I was asked one day, "what do you do to relax?" The answer may surprise you! To relax I study Bible Hebrew and koine Greek. I did not always love the Biblical Languages. I took Greek in College and both Greek and Hebrew in Seminary and the truth is that I struggled in both educational environs. Therefore, it is strange that those things I struggled and disliked during my matriculation process became my greatest delight. General Synod is in session today as I write this and there was a time when the Synod was asked to remove the language requirements from the Master of Divinity credentials, but it failed. I am so glad it did. A working knowledge of the Biblical Languages for Theologians is essential! Let me just end with one example that I believe breathes life into my assertion. The incommunicable name of God given to Moses in Exodus chapter three is represented by four letters, namely, YHWH. This tetragrammaton is the Hebrew Name of transliterated in four letters. If you were to pronounce it (which we really do not know how it was pronounced), but if we were to pronounce it we would find that it is just like breathing in and out. When you breathe in it sounds like Ya,,, when you breathe out it sounds like WH (Pronounced "Way"), Every breathe is pronouncing the name of God! Think about that from the first time a baby takes a breath until the last time breathe leaves our body, we are affirming God's name!

What was happening prior to our Independence from Great Britain in 1776?

These events led up to the signing of the Declaration of Independence

- The Stamp Act (March 1765)
- The Townshend Acts (June-July 1767)
- The Boston Massacre (March 1770)
- The Boston Tea Party (December 1773)
- The Coercive Acts (March-June 1774)
- Lexington and Concord (April 1775)
- British attacks on coastal towns (October 1775-January 1776)

leave British rule. On April 19,1775 the British attack the towns of Lexington and Concord, marked the start of the American Revolutionary War. On May 10, 1775, the Second Continental Congress meets and appoints George Washington as Commander and Chief of the Continental Army. The Americans try to take the British held city of Boston known as the Battle of Bunker Hill. The Americans are cleared from the hill but 40% of the British army is killed. It's considered a moral victory. In January of 1776, Thomas Paine's pamphlet Common Sense is published, advocating independence. Paine's 50-page pamphlet, couched in elegant direct language, sells more than 100,000 copies within a few months. It greatly strengthens the colonists' resolve. More than any other single publication, **Common Sense** paves the way for the Declaration of Independence. On June 7,1776 Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee formally suggests that the colonies declare independence from Britain. The Continental Congress later appoints a committee to write the formal document declaring independence. Thomas Jefferson will write the first draft. On June 28,1776 the committee presents its final draft to the Congress, which later debates the document. The most heated debate is over the issue of slavery. In the list of charges against George III, Jefferson had attacked the king for his role in the slave trade. Representatives from slaveholding Southern colonies refuse to accept the clause containing this criticism. Some New England delegates representing merchants who profit from the slave trade also object. The issue threatens to divide the colonies at a time when unity is crucial. To ensure support of all the colonies for the Declaration and the war for independence, the delegates drop the clause. On July 2,1776 the Continental Congress votes to declare Independence from Great Britain, and on July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence is signed.

King George III had some support in the colonies as not all the colonists wanted to


