

A McHeard Moment: Why?

One of the most widely used words in our language. Why. Why is the sky blue? Why is there suffering in the world? Why do I have to eat my vegetables? Why is there evil in the world? Why do we only have 'fore' fathers and not five? It is good to ask questions and to seek answers. Somewhere along the way most Christians think it is wrong to ask the 'why' questions in church. Questions like, Why do we say the creeds every Sunday? Why is the church service so long? I will answer the first question and leave the other one alone.

We say the creeds every Sunday because they express in words what we believe as a community of faith. These creeds have helped Christians throughout the centuries form their identity as a people of God. I believe it is important for us to either be reminded or informed about the words we affirm weekly and once and week. The two creeds I will consider are The Apostles and the Nicene Creed. The Apostles Creed, probably first formed in the first century, is otherwise known as the Baptismal Covenant. Baptisms in the early church were conducted on Easter Sunday. Candidates of baptism would be asked as series of questions. Do you believe in God the Father? The candidate would say, "I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth" Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God? I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son our Lord,... and finally, Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? The answer would be "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church...." By the fourth century we have what we call the Apostle's Creed.

During the first few centuries of the early church a question arose regarding who Jesus Christ was. Was he truly human only? Was he truly God only? Was he part of both or all of both? Or was he neither human nor divine? Some of the questions some would fear to ask in churches today were asked in the early centuries of the Christian Church. The Nicene Creed written in 325CE (CE is Common Era, scholarly writings today have replaced AD and BC with BCE (before common era) and CE) in part as a response to the heresies of Arius.

Halloween. Separating Christian from Pagan

The Halloween holiday has its roots in the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (a Gaelic word pronounced "SAH-win"), a pagan religious celebration to welcome the harvest at the end of summer, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honor saints. Soon after, <u>All Saints Day</u> came to incorporate some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before All Saints Day was known as All Hallows Eve, and later, Halloween.

The act of going door-to-door for handouts has long been a part of Halloween revelries. But until the mid-20th century, the "treats" children received were not necessarily candy. Things like fruit, nuts, coins, and toys were just as likely to be given out. Trick-or-treating rose in popularity in the 1950s and it inspired candy companies to market small, individually wrapped candies. People began to favor the confections out of convenience, but candy did not dominate at the exclusion of all other treats until the 1970s when parents started fearing anything unwrapped.

Other academics believe Halloween began solely as a Christian holiday, being the vigil of All Hallow's Day. Celebrated in Ireland and Scotland for centuries, Irish and Scotlish immigrants took many Halloween customs to North America in the 19th century, and then through American influence Halloween had spread to other countries by the late 20th and early 21st century.

By the end of the 12th century, the celebration had become known as the holy days of obligation in Western Christianity and involved such traditions as ringing church bells for souls in purgatory.

In Britain, these customs came under attack during the Reformation, as Protestants berated purgatory as a "popish" doctrine incompatible with the Calvinist doctrine of predestination. State-sanctioned ceremonies associated with the intercession of saints and prayer for souls in purgatory were abolished during the Elizabethan reform, though All Hallow's Day remained in the English liturgical calendar to "commemorate saints as godly human beings". For some Nonconformist Protestants, the theology of All Hallows' Eve was redefined; "souls cannot be journeying from Purgatory on their way to Heaven, as Catholics frequently believe and assert. Instead, the so-called ghosts are thought to be in actuality evil spirits". Other Protestants believed in an intermediate state known as Hades (Bosom of Abraham). In some localities, Catholics and Protestants continued souling, candlelit processions, or ringing church bells for the dead

Christian groups through the years have routinely attempted to demonize and denigrate the observance, in part by repeating the erroneous claim that Sam Hain was the Celtic **god** of the dead and Halloween his feast. This error comes from the 18th-century British engineer Charles Vallancey, who wrote on the Samhain festival with a poor understanding of the **culture** and language, and has been repeated uncritically since. It was actually the Church itself, however, which preserved the Samhain tradition in the West by Christianizing it in the 9th century, setting the course for a pagan Northern European religious tradition's transformation into a worldwide secular holiday which has become the most popular – and commercially lucrative – of the year, second only to Christmas


