Four Candidates Vie for Two Supervisor Positions

Election Day is April 2, 2019 and there are numerous local positions on the ballot. Sample ballots are posted on the Town of Neenah's website and can be viewed on the My Vote Wisconsin website.

Town Chairman: Incumbent Town Chairman Robert Schmeichel is seeking his sixth term as Town Chairman and is running unopposed.

Town Supervisors: Four Candidates are running for two positions on the Town Board of Supervisors. Brooke Cardoza, Elizabeth Duquaine, Brandon Nielsen and Tom Wilde.

Town Chairman and Supervisors each serve two-year terms.

Sanitary District Commissioners: Both Sanitary District #2 (which includes most of the Town's sewered area) and Sanitary District #3 (which includes parts of the Town's north end) each have one seat up for election to their respective three-member commissions. In Sanitary District #2, Steve Coburn is running unopposed. Sanitary District #2 Commissioner will serve a six-year term. There are no candidates running to fill the seat of Sanitary District #3 Commissioner. This seat will serve until July 31, 2019 when Sanitary District #3 will be dissolved.

Neenah Joint School District: There are six candidates running for three position on the Neenah Joint School District Board of Education and there is a Neenah Joint School District Referendum question on the ballot. For additional information on Neenah Joint School District visit their website.



Chairman Candidate: Robert E. Schmeichel

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FIRE DEPARTMENT

Town of Neenah Fire Department responds to massive I-41 accident



Ambulance, Fremont Ambulance and Kaukauna Fire Department made their way to patients from the north side of the crash site. From the south end of the crash site, five ambulances from Oshkosh Fire Department assisted with patient care, along with additional units from Ripon Guardian Ambulance and North Fond du Lac Fire and EMS.

Thank you. Fire Chief Ed King, Town of Neenah Fire Department.

On Sunday, February 24th at 11:17AM the Town of Neenah Fire Department along with Gold Cross Ambulance Service were the first emergency units dispatched to the massive I-41 131 vehicle serious and critically injured patients accident which quickly became the largest required longer hospital stays. incident of its type in the State of Wisconsin. The incident occurred in the Town of Neenah just south of County Highway G and just a couple of hundred vards north of Nee-Vin Road.

Twenty Town of Neenah firefighters and First Responders responded and immediately went to work treating the injured and performing a number of rescues and extrications to free dozens of victims. Even before Town of Neenah units arrived on scene, additional agencies were requested and put to work as soon as they arrived. Several extrications using the "Jaws of Life" were going on at the same time as units from Neenah Menasha Fire Rescue, Vinland Fire Department, Fox Crossing Fire Department, Town of Oshkosh Fire Department, Town of Algoma Fire Department and City of Oshkosh Fire Department assisted at the scene. With these crews, we had over 60 firefighters and First Responders working diligently to provide aid.

Multiple ambulances and paramedic units employees, and the towing company arrived from across the entire Fox Vallev to aid in transporting the injured to area hospitals. Units from Gold Cross

In all, 71 accident victims were transported to area hospitals with 66 being treated and released. Several Unfortunately, a 30 year old man from Oshkosh died as a result of his injuries. All of those who responded and assisted at the scene were very thankful that the injuries and fatalities were not greater given the number of vehicles involved and the speed at which many of the collisions took place.

Area hospitals called in additional employees to staff their emergency departments. Patients were transported to each hospital in Oshkosh (Mercy and Aurora), Neenah (Theda Care), Appleton (Theda Care and St. Elizabeth's) and St Vincent's in Green Bay.

Please join me in thanking not only the Town of Neenah firefighters and First Responders who responded to this incident but to the dozens of other firefighters, First Responders, EMTs, Paramedics, sheriff deputies, State Patrol and other law enforcement officials, county highway department employees who were vital in dealing with this very large incident.

Multiple offers on Town owned land

In 1999, the Town of Neenah purchased approximately 91 acres of land near the Oakridge Road and Tullar Road intersection, formerly called the Grimes Property. The purpose was to secure the Town of Neenah borders and block the City of Neenah from annexing more properties from the Town. The Town paid \$8,490 per acre. This strategic move in 1999 lead to the Town and City negotiating a border agreement for planned growth and development of both the Town and City. In 2008, the Town purchased an additional 18 acres in the same area at the price of \$21,610 per acre. In total the Town paid \$1.1 million dollars for these properties. All Loans taken to purchase the properties have been paid off. In 2014, the Town sold 34 acres to Wisconsin Department of Transportation for \$535,076 or \$15,362 per

The Town will keep approximately 7 acres on the north end by CTH O for a stormwater pond, while the remaining is available for sale and future development.

At this time, the Town has received multiple offers for the 37-acre parcel outlined with a heavy green line on the map. The Town Board and Town Plan Commission are in negotiations and working toward the best possible sale price for the Town of Neenah with reassurances that the property will remain in the Town of Neenah and be developed for additional growth to the Town tax base.

A Special Meeting of the Electors will be held asking for Town residents to authorize the Town Board to sell this Town owned property. The meeting date has not been set yet, please watch the website, Facebook page and Town posting boards for additional information about this important Meeting of the Electors.

Glenn Armstrong

This month, Glenn shares some interesting reading on the history of towns in Winnebago County.

Winnebago County was established in 1840. The Town of Neenah was established in 1847. However, the original Town of Neenah, included Towns of Clayton, Vinland, Menasha and Winneconne. The Town of Neenah of today was separated from these other towns in 1855. All area that is presently in the City of Neenah was part of the Town of Neenah in 1855.

The population for the Town of Neenah was 1,413 in 1850, 2,654 in 1870 and 588 in 1880. Today the population is estimated at 3,572.

Winnebago County. Established 6 Jan. 1840, from parts of Brown, Calumet, Fond du Lac, and Marquette Counties. Attached to Brown Co., 1840-1842. Organized 18 Feb. 1842, 4 Apr. 1842. Judicially attached to Brown County, 1842-1844, and to Fond du Lac County, 1844-1847.

(Unless otherwise noted, towns were established by County Board)

Algoma Est. 12 Feb. 1820, from Winnebago.

Black Wolf Est. 12 Nov. 1850, from Nekimi.

Bloomingdale Name changed by Legislature, 15 March 1849, from Butte des Mortes (2).

Changed by Co. Bd. to Omro, 10 Nov. 1852.

Brighton Est. by Legislature, 11 Feb. 1847, from Winnebago.

Name changed by Co. Bd. to Nekimi, 12 Feb. 1850

Butte des Mortes (1) Est. by Legislature, 8 March 1839.

First town meeting in Winnebago Co., 4 Apr. 1842. Absorbed by Winnebago, 1 Apr. 1843.

Butte des Mortes (2) Est. by Legislature, 11 Feb. 1847, from Winnebago.

Name changed by Legislature to Bloomingdale, 15 March 1846.

Clayton Est. by Legislature, 21 March 1849. From Neenah and Winneconne.

Menasha Est. 6 Jan. 1855, from Neenah. Incorporated in 2016 to Village of Fox Crossing

Neenah Est. by Legislature, 11 Feb. 1847, from Winnebago.

Nekimi Name changed, 12 Feb. 1850, from Brighton.

Nepeuskum Est. Nov. 1849, from Rushford.

Omro Name changed, 10 Nov. 1852, from Bloomingdale.

Orihula Est. 4 Jan. 1855, from Winneconne. Name changed to Wolf River, 10 Jan. 1861.

Oshkosh Name changed, 10 Nov. 1852, from Winnebago.

Perry Est. by Legislature, 2 Jan. 1838. Apparently dropped at an early date.

Poygan Est. 11 Nov. 1852, from Winnebago. Originally to have been named Hale.

Rushford Est. by Legislature, 11 Feb. 1847, from Winnebago.

Utica Est. by Legislature, 11 March 1848, from Rushford.

Name changed to Weelaune, 1855/1856. Changed back to Utica, 1857.

Vinland Est. by Legislature, 15 March 1849, from Neenah and Winnebago.

Weelaune Name changed, 1855/1856, from Utica.

First appears in Circuit Judge election returns, Apr. 1856. Nov. 1857 election returns show Utica.

Winchester Est. 11 Nov. 1851, from Winneconne.

Winnebago Est. by Legislature, 8 March 1839.

Enlarged by Legislature, 1 Apr. 1843, to include entire Winnebago Co. Name changed to Oshkosh, 10 Nov. 1852.

Winneconne Est. by Legislature, 11 March 1848, from Winnebago, Butte des Mortes (2), and Neenah.

PARKS AND TRAILS

Spring is right around the corner and that means the Town of Neenah Parks and Trails Committee will begin their monthly meetings and our contractor will be getting the parks ready to open. Weather dependent, the parks will be open in early April.

The Parks and Trails Committee has been working on plans for constructing a new shelter with restrooms at Franzoi Park along with a half-court basketball court with planned construction in 2019.

The Town manages four parks and the CTH CB Trail. Conservancy Park; 1674 South Park Avenue Mahler Park; 1536 South Park Avenue Franzoi Park; 1450 Radcliff Road Keating Park; 128 Klompen Court

2019 Road Construction



Winnebago County plans to construct a roundabout at the CTH CB and Oakridge Road intersection during the 2019 construction season. Both CTH CB and Oakridge Road will be closed during the construction. However, the contract has not yet

been awarded so the timetable for closure is unknown at this time. Visit Winnebago County Highway Department website for updates on this project. When information is available, the Town will post to our website and Facebook .

The Town of Neenah 2019 budget for road maintenance and construction is \$450,068. Courtney Court is a mixture of Town residents and City residents so the Town of Neenah and City of Neenah will work together on a joint project to reconstruct the sanitary sewer, water main, stormwater sewer and road. Additional details will be available later this spring and information will be mailed to the residents on Courtney Court.

The Town will also continue their maintenance program with chip sealing to protect and extend the life of our roads.

Residents on the impacted roads will be notified of the work.

Open Book and Board of Review

What is Open Book?

Open Book is a period of time that property records and the Assessor are available to property owners for review. Property owners can ask questions regarding how an assessment was determined and check that characteristics of the property are correct. Minor errors and misunderstandings can often be easily corrected at the Open Book session.

What if I don't agree with my assessment?

If after meeting with the Assessor at Open Book, you still think the assessment is incorrect, you may appeal to the **Board of Review**. Notify the clerk of your intention to file an objection and complete the required form. The Clerk will schedule a time for you to meet with the Board of Review.

The schedule for Open Book and Board of Review will be posted on the Town of Neenah website and posting locations when the schedule becomes available. Both of these meetings are typically held during the month of May each year.

Property Revaluation Underway

Bowmar Appraisal has been retained by the Town of Neenah to conduct a revaluation of all taxable property for the 2020 assessment year. Representatives from Bowmar Appraisal will begin reviewing properties starting in the Spring of 2019. They will have an ID badge visible and will carry a signed letter from the town. Assessment Notices will be mailed to each property owner when the revaluation is complete, sometime in 2020. Revaluation is required by State Law. The main purpose is to make sure that all properties are valued on a fair and uniform basis and reflect current market value. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated. All dogs over 5 months of age are required to be licensed annually in the Town of Neenah. A valid current rabies certificate is required to issue a license.


FEE: \$5 for altered dogs \$10 for unaltered dogs. A \$5 late fee is imposed if the license is purchased after March 31, 2019.



TNSD2 is your municipal resource for sanitary sewer. We manage the miles of underground pipe, manholes, and lift stations throughout the Town to ensure the system is working correctly and efficiently. The Town is broken into five televising districts so that in a five-year rotation the entire sanitary system is televised and investigated. In the Spring, we televise a specific area looking for sources of Infiltration and Inflow (I&I). I&I is not a mystery but a misunderstood acronym for sources of clear water entering the sanitary sewer system. Groundwater infiltrates into the sanitary system through such means as, but not limited to, defective pipes, pipe joints, connections or manhole walls. Inflow is water discharged into a sewer system from such sources as, but not

limited to, roof gutter drains, yard drains, foundation drains, manhole covers, sump pump connections. The District is charged for every gallon transported to the Treatment Plant. Every effort is made to minimize I&I to help reduce the fees associated with pumping clear water. The District attempts to investigate sources contributing ½ gallon per minute or more. By reviewing televising reports and lift station pump run hour logs, sources of I&I can be detected and corrected to ensure that the District's system is working efficiently. When a problem is detected in a private lateral, it is the homeowner's responsibility to repair. The District will work with the homeowner to help advise on a corrective measure. We appreciate everyone's cooperation when your neighborhood is being televised.


