Chi flow


Good chi:

- Has the opportunity to circulate




Bad chi:








Good chi flow—stairs







Tidbit: Bed placement

- ✓ Bed in "command" position
- ✓ Bed against solid wall
- x Bed againstwindow
- x Bed in line with door



Tidbit: Desk placement

- ✓ Desk in "command" position
- x Sitting with back to the door



Tidbit: Stove placement


- √ Cook faces the entry, in "command" position
- ✓ Stove on island is good, if facing door



Tidbit: Poison arrows

X Square corners, pointed objectsFrom neighboring buildings or objects inside

Tidbit: Previous occupants

- ✓ Seller moving to better house, better neighborhood, better job—house has good chi
- x Seller moving because of divorce, death, bankruptcy—house has bad chi

UBC study: Where Chinese concentration more than 18% (Richmond), house number ending in 4, buyers pay 2.2% less, house number ending in 8, buyers pay 2.5% more

Tidbit: Crying babies

- Very young children use their sixth sense more keenly than adults
- May bring toddlers to a house and then watch how the child behaves
- Crying? Unsettled? House has bad chi
- Happy? Relaxed? House has good chi

About Chinese buyers

- Some Chinese believe in Feng Shui
 - Older generation more likely to have strong beliefs
 - Younger generation less so; but still influenced by family
- Will walk away rather than buy a house they feel has bad Feng Shui
- Because banned in China, may be reluctant to openly disclose beliefs

In a neighborhood

Good Chi

- Meandering streets
- Lush parks
- Water nearby (clean, active)
- Well maintained properties

Undesirable Chi

- Major traffic arteries
- Decaying or dying energy (cemeteries, hospitals)
- Noisy (fire hall)
- Poorly maintained properties

On a lot

Good features

- Expansive front lawn—
 allows chi to collect
- Regular shaped lot
- Middle of gentle slope

Undesirable features

- Shortened front lawn
- House at T-intersection
- Irregular shaped lot
- Steep hill or cliff
- House at top or bottom of slope

In a house

Good features

- Expansive foyer allows chi to collect
- Main stairs oriented away from front door
- Beds, desk, stove in command position
- Regular shaped house

Undesirable features

- Stairway too close to door—chi rushes down stairs and escapes out
- Front door lined up with back door
- Irregular shaped house
- Clutter
