HISTORY AT A GLANCE

In 1920, eight men representing six colleges from the state of Texas met to discuss collegiate athletics and the many challenges that face their respective institutions. By the time the session in Houston had concluded, they had founded an athletic league that has slowly become one of the leading sports associations in the world of collegiate athletics, the Southwestern Athletic Conference. The founding fathers of the original Super Six were:

Willie Simmons was named the 18th full-time head football coach of the Florida A&M storied program on December 12, 2017. Simmons enters his sixth season (33-12, 26-5) in 2023.

Simmons, a native of Quincy, was a phenomenal prep athlete at Shanks High School before embarking on a stellar collegiate football playing career that featured stints at Clemson University and The Citadel (S.C.). Simmons comes to Florida A&M University from Prairie View A&M (Tex.) University), where he spent three seasons (2015-2017) as head football coach. Simmons is considered one of the collegiate game's most creative and innovative offensive minds.

In 2022, Simmons led the Rattler to their third straight nine-win season, finishing with a 9-2 record. The Rattlers earned their third consecutive top-25 ranking, finishing 23rd in the FCS Coaches Poll after finishing the season with a nine-game winning streak and a 41-20 win versus Bethune-Cookman in the Florida Classic. Simmons also coached 15 players to the Phil Steele SWAC All-Conference Teams, 12 to the SWAC All-Conference Teams, six BOXTOROW All-Americans, two FCS Stats Perform All-Americans, two HERO Sports All-Americans, and one AP All-American. Smith also coached Xavier Smith, who was named a Walter Payton Award finalist, and Jose Romo-Martinez, the BOXTO-ROW Special Teams Player of the Year. Simmons also coached Isaiah Land, who participated in the Reese's Senior Bowl and NFL Scouting Combine. Simmons saw Land sign with the Dallas Cowboys and Smith with the Los Angeles Rams following the 2023 NFL Draft.

In 2021, Simmons led the Rattlers to another nine-win season, finishing with a 9-3 record and making the FCS Playoffs for the first time since 2001. The Rattlers finished the season ranked

as the number one HBCU in the final NCAA Power Rankings. The biggest win of the season came in the regular-season finale when the Rattlers dominated the Wildcats 46-21 in the Florida Classic, Simmons coached Isaiah Land, who led the nation in sacks and tackles for loss and won several honors, including the Buck Buchanan Award and SWAC Defensive Player of the Year. Simmons coached nine players to the All-SWAC Team, six BOXTOROW All-Americans, four FCS Stats Perform All-Americans, three HERO Sports All-Americans, two AFCA All-Americans, and two AP All-Americans. Simmons also coached safety Markquese Bell, who participated in the NFL Scouting Combine and NFLPA Collegiate Bowl. In 2021. Simmons led the Rattlers to 22 national top-25 statistical

In 2019, Simmons brought the Rattlers back to national prominence, leading them to a 9-2 record and winning the 2019 HBCU National Championship. They finished the season ranked No. 24(STATS and Coaches' Poll) and ranked as high as No. 12 (STATS Poll, week 12). The biggest win of the season came against North Carolina A&T (Celebration Bowl Champion and ranked No. 10 at the time of playing). The Rattlers' air attack was unstoppable during the 2019 season, as their passing offense ranked No. 17 in the nation (291.1 YPG), team passing efficiency rated No. 22 (148.51), and the scoring offense ranked No. 26 (32.7 PPG).

On top of having one of the best passing attacks in the nation, the Rattlers were among the best when it came to turnovers (No. 21 for turnover margin), converting 3rd downs (No. 13), and keeping the quarterback upright (No. 4). Defensively, the Rattlers were shutting down opposing offenses. They ranked No. 21 in team passing efficiency defense (118.7), No. 25 in rushing defense (129.4 YPG), No. 42 in total defense (361.7 YPG), and No. 16 in passes intercepted (15).

In Simmons' first season as the Rattlers' head coach, the Rattlers saw an improvement in conference wins (from 2-6 to 5-2), total offense (No. 74 / 345.5 YPG to No. 57 / 391.2 YPG), total defense (No. 60 / 365 YPG to No. 34 / 354.8 YPG), and scoring defense (No. 81/28.1 PPG to No. 23 / 22.1 PPG).

During his tenure at Prairie View A&M, Simmons revived the flagging fortunes of the Panthers. Simmons elevated them to prime contenders in the rugged SWAC Western Division. Simmons fashioned a 21-11 overall record and a 19-6 league record, highlighted by an 8-2 debut campaign in 2015, which included an 8-1 runner-up finish in the division to eventual division champion Grambling State, after dropping a sizzling 70-54 wild west shootout in the State Fair Classic in Dallas, Texas.

Simmons worked three seasons at Alcorn State (2012-14) under Jay Hopson and helped initiate a meteoric revival of a proud Braves gridiron

program, which had won just (2) games the previous season. The 2014 campaign was an even better year for Simmons and the Braves, as they won the Southwestern Athletic Conference Championship over Southern University and were named Black College National Champions.

Before his successful run at Alcorn, Simmons' first full-time work as an assistant coach on the college level came at Middle Tennessee State (2007-11) under head coach Rick Stockstill, who recruited Simmons to Clemson. After three seasons as the running backs coach, Simmons was promoted to Pass Game Coordinator. The following season, he was promoted to Offensive Coordinator. By age 30, he was one of the youngest coordinators at the FBS level.

Simmons began coaching in 2005 at Lincoln High School in Tallahassee, where he coached the quarterbacks and was also the Passing Game Coordinator. He had the opportunity to coach former NFL and USF quarterback B.J. Daniels there. After one season, he returned to his alma mater Clemson as a Graduate Assistant Coach working with the quarterbacks in 2006.

Simmons had a distinguished prep career at Quincy's James Shanks High School, earning All-American honors as a quarterback. He led the Tigers to their first district championship in 22 years and was named Big Bend Offensive Player of the Year. He received over 25 scholarship offers, signing with Clemson, where he lettered three years (2000-2002).

Simmons earned a bachelor's degree in Services (Sports) Marketing from Clemson in spring 2002, just three years after he enrolled. He initially transferred to Florida A&M University for his senior season. After being deemed ineligible because FAMU was in provisional status as a Division I-A (now FBS) program, he enrolled at The Citadel, where he led the Bulldogs to a 6-6 record (the first non-losing season in 10 years). Simmons then played one season of Arena Football for the Sioux City Bandits.

Simmons is married to the former Shaia Rene Beckwith (also a Quincy native)., who is a two-time graduate of Florida A&M University. They have six children, Louis III, Amerie, Raven, Shailoh, Wraylon, and Truth.



Leonard "Bubba" McDowell enters his second season as the head of Prairie View A&M's football program. McDowell was named the head football coach of PVAMU on January 4, 2022. The former NFL defensive standout is in his 12th season as a part of the Prairie View A&M coaching staff including four seasons as an assistant head coach. He also coached the Panther cornerbacks in the last three seasons.

In his first season, McDowell led the Panthers to a back-to-back Western Division Title, although PVAMU was tied with the Southern Jaguars, who had the same conference record sharing the 2022 title.

During the 2019 season, Jaylen Harris asserted himself as one of the most disruptive cornerbacks in the nation, leading the SWAC in total passes defended and ranking among the top 10 nationally in the category on his way to first-team All-SWAC honors.

In 2018, Ju'Anthony Parker earned first-team All-SWAC and BOXTOROW All-America honors for the second straight year while Harris had a career-high in interceptions, and both players had interception returns for touchdowns.

While coaching safeties in 2017, Reggie Stubblefield emerged as the fourth leading tackler on the team (51 stops) while tying for second in interceptions (two), and leading the team in pass breakups (10).

In 2016, Marquice O'Leary was fourth on the team in tackles and third in pass

defense. Running back turned nickel back Arthur Lockett was sixth in tackles, tied for the team lead in interceptions, returning one for a touchdown, and ranked second on the team in pass defense

In 2015, O'Leary earned second-team All-SWAC honors after ranking third on the team in both tackles (51) and pass defense (five) and second in interceptions (two).

In 2014, true freshman defensive back Damond Jackson flourished under McDowell's guidance as he earned a spot on the AII-SWAC second team. Jackson finished third on the team with 80 tackles and 5.5 tackles for loss. He also broke up five passes and forced a fumble with one interception.

McDowell was challenged with working with one of the youngest units on the team entering the 2013 season as the majority of players in his unit had limited NCAA playing experience. At the end of the season, a pair of redshirt freshman cornerbacks Joshua Holley and Foster Brown II finished fourth and fifth, respectively, on the team in tackles while also combining for 10 pass breakups.

McDowell played a big part in the career performance of safety Brian Medlock in 2012 as he earned All-SWAC Second Team Honors at safety during his senior campaign. Medlock led the Panthers with four interceptions in 2012 and finished tied for second in SWAC play in addition to defending a total of eight passes. Under McDowell's watch, safety Korey Alston also had a big season as he completed his inaugural season at Prairie View A&M with 41 tackles and three pass breakups.

In his first year at PVAMU in 2011, McDowell inherited the youngest unit on the defensive side of the ball as only one player had made a start in a collegiate game. Despite the lack of experience, the Panthers received career highs from all of its safeties as Medlock led the way after finishing fifth on the team in tackles along with four pass breakups.

Born in Georgia and raised in Florida, McDowell was a four-year letterman at the University of Miami and earned a National Championship ring as a starter on the undefeated 1987 squad under former head coach Jimmy Johnson. McDowell was also recognized by ESPN for his play on the gridiron that season as his knockdown of a two-point attempt against longtime rival Florida State was featured as the 11th-best play that defined college football. He graduated with a degree in business management in 1989.

McDowell was drafted by the NFL's Houston Oilers in 1989 and immediately became a

starter en route to earning First Team All-Rookie Accolades from Pro Football Weekly and Football News. After a solid rookie year, McDowell played a big part in the Oilers' success on the field as they posted five consecutive winning seasons and five AFC Playoff berths from 1989 to 1993. In 1991, McDowell earned NFL All-Pro Honors and was honored by the Oilers with the "Ed Block Memorial Courage Award" which acknowledged his courage in the pursuit of professional excellence.

During his final season with the Oilers in 1994, McDowell was selected as the Houston Oilers' NFL Man of the Year for his work in the community. McDowell moved to the state of North Carolina prior to the 1995 season and helped usher in a new era as he played on the inaugural roster of the Carolina Panthers before retiring the next season.

Despite concluding his career in North Carolina, McDowell remained popular in the city of Houston for his work in both the business and community sectors. In 1995, he became one of the first two professional athletes to receive the Human Enrichment of Life "Young African American Achiever" award. During the same year, he became the first athlete ever to receive the Friends of Friends "Positive Influential African American Male" award. In 1996, McDowell earned the first "Warren Moon Athletic and Community Service Award" from Houston's United Negro College Fund which recognized former professional athletes who have excelled in their particular sport while improving the lives of others.

McDowell remained active in a variety of athletic ventures across the Houston area in addition to coaching on the high school level for several years. He has also completed NFL Minority Coaching Internships with the Green Bay Packers, Miami Dolphins, and Houston Texans.

McDowell has two sons, Trey and Myles.



CHAMPIONSHIP GAME HISTORY

The SWAC Football Championship Game began in 1999, with conference teams beginning play in an East-West divisional format, allowing division winners to meet on the field to decide a champion.

Through an agreement forged with the City of Birmingham, Ala. the Southwestern Athletic Conference staged its first championship game at historic Legion Field. On December 11, 1999, Jackson State (East champion) and Southern University (West champion) kicked off the inaugural SWAC Football Championship game. Southern came from behind for a 31-30 win.

In the 24 championship games since 1999, ten of the 12 conference schools have earned a berth to play for the title. From the Western Division, Grambling State has earned a trip to the championship ten times — the most of any SWAC school — and posts a 8-2 record. Southern has played in the title game eight times with a 3-5 record, while Arkansas-Pine Bluff has made three appearances capturing its first outright league title in football in 2012. Prairie View A&M and Texas Southern have each won a title.

Alcorn State is 4-2 in the title game, winning back-to-back championships in 2014 and 2015 and again in 2018 and 2019. Alabama A&M has represented the Eastern Division seven times and posted a 2-5 record in the championship game. Alabama State is 1-3 in its four appearances, winning in 2004, while Jackson State is 3-4 in four championship games as it won in 2007, 2021 and 2022.

The football championship game was held at NRG Stadium, home of the NFL's Houston Texans, from 2013 to 2017. Beginning in 2018, the SWAC Football Championship game has been played at the home field of the highest-ranked finalist.
