

A-A Bill to Repeal The Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act of 2006

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Internet gambling will no longer be illegal in the United States of
3		America.
4	SECTION 2.	Gambling is defined as playing a game for money or property.
5		Internet an electronic communications network that connects
6		computer networks and organizational computer facilities around
7		the world
8	SECTION 3.	The International Revenue Service will oversee the modification and
9		implication of this bill
10		A. Each state will be allowed to implement gambling as they see fit
11	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implicated January 25, 2020

B-A Bill to Require a Minimum of Two Years of Spanish Language in Order to Graduate High School

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Every high school student will be required to complete a minimum of two
- years of the Spanish Language
- 4 **SECTION 2**. High school shall be defined as the grades 9-12 in a publicly funded
- 5 educational institution.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The board of education will oversee the implementation of this
- 7 legislation.
- 8 **SECTION 4.** This bill will take effect at the beginning of the 2019/2020 school year,
- and will apply to the freshman class, and every class following them.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

C-A Bill to Reallocate Funds to Further Medical Research

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Funds from the Department of Defense (DoD) base budget (\$574.5
- billion) shall be reallocated to the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to
- 4 further medical research for the benefit of the American populous.
 - **SECTION 2**. Reallocation shall be defined as: to set apart for a purpose. Medical
- Research is defined as: involving research in a wide range of fields, with
- 7 the goal of developing new medicines or medical procedures or
- improving the application of those already available. Funds will come
- from the DoD base budget and be spread over a five (5) year time frame
- before being revaluation. Funds will be no more than \$18.4 billion per
- year. No more than 20% of funds received shall go to new facilities,
- building expenses, or employees etc.

- SECTION 3. The Department of Treasury in junction with the Department of Defense
- as well as the National Institutes of Health.
- A. All departments shall work together in collaboration to maintain fund
- allocation and distribution amongst the two main branches involved.
- 17 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect in the year 2020.

- 6 AH-64 Apache helicopter, AGM-158C anti-ship missile, cybersecurity
- 7 infrastructure, Virginia and Seawolf class submarines.
- 8 **SECTION 3.** The Joint Chiefs of Staff shall decide how and when to appropriate funds
- 9 in accordance with the legislation.
- SECTION 4. This legislation shall take effect starting on the 1st of October, 2019. The
- United States Department of Treasury shall procure the funds to institute
- this legislation with the sale of treasury securities.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 2 **SECTION 1**. Employers will be hereby required to provide 10 days of paid vacation to
- full time employees annually. Part-time employees will be provided 4
- 4 days annually.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. Vacation will be defined as a period spent away from business in travel or
- recreation. Full-time will be defined as 35+ work hours weekly. Part-time
- 7 will be defined as 20-34 work hours weekly.
- 8 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Labor will oversee the enforcement of this bill.
- A. If a company is found violating this bill upon passage they will be
- fined 15% of their annual revenue.
- 11 **SECTION 4.** This bill shall be implemented on January 1st, 2020.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

F-A Bill to Ban the Death Penalty

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The use of the death penalty for punishments of crime will be illegal in all 50 states and U.S. territories.
- SECTION 2. Death penalty is defined as the punishment of execution administered to someone legally convicted of a capital crime.
- The government agencies that will oversee the enforcement of this bill will be the Department of Justice and the U.S. Court System.
- A. States and court systems will determine alternative punishments to capital crimes.
- B. All convicts currently sentenced to the death penalty will be commuted to life in prison directly after the passage of this bill.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect immediately upon passage.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

G-A Bill to Replace the Current Federal Income Tax with a Flat Income Tax

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The current federal income tax will be replaced by a flat tax on all
3		individuals and corporations.
4	SECTION 2.	A flat tax will be defined as "a system under which all taxpayers pay taxes
5		at the same percentage rate of their total income."
6	SECTION 3.	The IRS (Internal Revenue Service) will be in charge of the
7		implementation and oversight of this bill. The current tax code will be
8		repealed and replaced with a flat tax of 20%. This is subject to change
9		based on federal budget and projected tax revenues.
10		A. All money earned below the poverty level will be exempt from this
11		flat tax. The poverty level for a single person in 2017 is \$12,140
12		dollars, according to the Department of Health and Human Services.
13		B. An additional \$4,320 dollars per child will be added to the amount
14		exempt from taxes, up to four children.
15		C. Money given to charities will also be tax exempt, up to 10% of your
16		income.
17		D. This tax applies to all income received through any means: work,
18		investment, gifts, inheritance, etc.
10	SECTION 4	This law will take effect within six months of nassage

H-A Bill to Require Anyone Attending School Grades K-1 Through K-12 in America to Say the Pledge of Allegiance

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED TH

- 2 **SECTION 1**. This bill shall require all students grades k-1 through k-12 to say the pledge of allegiance.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Allegiance shall be defined as loyalty or commitment of a subordinate to
 5 a superior or of an individual to a group or cause. Pledge shall be defined
 6 as a solemn promise or undertaking. K-1 and K-12 shall be defined as
 7 These grades are kindergarten (K) and the 1st through the 12th grade.
- SECTION 3. The United States Department of State will oversee this bill. The way that

 it shall be enforced is anytime you are saying the pledge of allegiance

 your teacher shall require every student to say it.
 - A. This bill will help all students attending school in America grades k-1 through k-12 to appreciate the freedom they have.
 - B. Failure to do so shall be reported from teacher to admin and then to police. Jail time would then be served as a consequence for not following this law.
- **SECTION 4.** This law shall come into effect as soon as this law is passed by congress.
- 17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

I-A Bill to Establish Independent Commissions for Congressional Redistricting

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Each state government be required to conduct Congressional redistricting
3		through an independent commission. This will be used to combat any
4		gerrymandering in states. A nonpartisan agency will be implemented to help
5		with the choosing of approved members.
6	SECTION 2.	Nonpartisan as in not showing allegiance to any political party. Gerrymandering
7		shall be defined as manipulating the voting districts so as to favor one party or
8		class.
9	SECTION 3.	The Federal Election Committee shall be responsible for the implementation and
10		administration of this Bill. Individual States will be responsible for creation and
11		administration of their independent committees. The member chosen for each
12		state must follow this criteria:
13		A. Must be registered to vote.
14		B. The individual has had to have voted for the last three years for the same
15		party, or affiliated with no party at all.
16		C. A written statement containing an assurance that the individual shall commit
17		to carrying out the individual's duties under this bill in an honest,
18		independent, and impartial fashion.
19	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented on January 1 2020.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

J-A Bill to Federally allow Euthanasia to take place in Federally Funded Hospitals

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The United States should federally allow Euthanasia to take place in
- 3 federally funded hospitals,
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Euthanasia is defined as physician assisted medically accepted painless
- 5 death. This can only be done with patient permission.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The purpose of this bill is to give the patient peace, to relieve them of
- 7 persistent suffering,
- A. This bill will require at starting amount of two million dollars
- 9 transferred to the United States department of Health
- B. The United States Department of Health and Human Services will
- oversee the implementation of this bill.
- **SECTION 4.** The implementation of this bill with start January 1st 2019.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

K-A Bill to Bring Our Veterans Home by Granting Them Citizenship

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. All veterans that have served in the U.S armed forces for more than 2
- years and can pass the citizenship test shall be granted citizenship.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Veterans is defined as anyone who has served in the U.S. armed forces.
- 5 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Citizen and Immigration Services along with the Department of
- Defence will be charged with implementation of the bill.
- A. All veterans who meet the previous guideline that have been
- 8 deported will be given the option to come back to the U.S.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect immediately upon passage of this legislation.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

L-A Bill to Ensure that any Investigation within the Executive Branch Occurs with no Obstacles

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Congress must take action and allow investigations within the United States
- Executive Branch. There will be no obstacles in place for the said investigator.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Investigation shall be defined as the action of investigating something or
- someone; formal or systematic examination or research.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The United States Department of Justice will oversee the implementation of this
- 7 bill.
- 8 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will be implemented immediately after passage.
- 9 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

M-A Bill To Eliminate The Wage Gap Between The Male And Female Gender

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Companies will be required to compensate their employees equally
- 3 regardless of gender.
- 4 SECTION 2. Wage Gap -The gender wage gap is unadjusted and is defined as the
- 5 difference between median earnings of men and women relative to median
- earnings of men.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Labor will oversee the implementation of this bill.
- A. All money needed will come from the Department of Labor's budget
- B. This will be implemented in tandem with the Equal pay Act of 1963
- SECTION 4. This bill will be beginning its implementation following the 2018
- midterms and finalize its implantation by 2020.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

N-A Bill to ban the use of Microbeads

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The use of microbeads in products will be banned.
- 3 **SECTION 2**. Microbeads will be defined as any piece of plastic that measure from 10
- 4 micrometers to 1 millimeter, used in products such as lotions, facial
- 5 cleansers, exfoliators and other similar products.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will oversee the
- 7 enforcement of this bill.
- A. If a company is found violating this bill, they will be fined 25% of their
- 9 annual revenue.
- SECTION 4. This legislation will go into effect 1 year upon passage, products must be
- clear of microbeads after implementation of this bill.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Nampa High School.

O-A Bill to Enforce a Federal Legalization of Recreational and Medical Marijuana

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The use of marijuana, both consumption or buying will become legal
- across the United States.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. The minimum age to purchase any amount of marijuana will be limited to
- 5 21 years old.
- The consumer will be limited to only posses 1 ounce of marijuana per
- 7 transaction.
- 8 DUI laws will continue to apply to those driving under the influence of
- 9 both medical or recreational cannabis.
- Transactions are limited to purchase an ounce per day.
- 11 **SECTION 3.** This bill will be enforced by both the federal government and local police
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will take place 6 months following passage.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

P-A Bill to Institute a New Organization to Closely Monitor News Sources

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	A new organization known as the National News Regulations (NNR) will
3		be used to monitor all news sources. The NNR will flag news sources for
4		the public to know of factual errors, misleading information, and
5		anything else seen as unacceptable. Any news that is flagged will remain
6		"flagged" until the error that was marked is fixed or is removed
7	SECTION 2.	News source: information from corporations that is spread through
8		different mediums that is used to inform the public in this case we will be
9		referring to digital only.
10		Flagged: A term that will used for when a news source is deemed
11		unacceptable according to the terms in section 1.
12		Unacceptable: will be used to describe sources that contain erroneous
13		information, plagiarism or any misleading news.
14	SECTION 3.	It will be its own government agency that will receive its funding from the
15		Department of Defense (DOD). Editors will check all media and will flag
16		them for the public
17		A. News editors will be cycled out every two years.
18		B. All editors will undergo a background check and will be closely
19		monitored for disinterestedness.
20	SECTION 4.	This bill will come into action following the immediate hiring of editors.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Q-A Bill to Equalize the Amount of Pay

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The state shall allow employees to be paid equally by basing pay off of
- the amount of hours an employee has put into their job instead of using
- 4 smoking breaks count as hours being worked.
 - **SECTION 2**. Smoke breaks are when employees who smoke take multiple amounts of
- 6 breaks, excluding the ones provided for lunch, to take a couple of
- 7 minutes to smoke during their work hours. Currently in our system
- smokers in the workplace are allowed breaks within every hour of the
- 9 work day and are being paid equal to those who don't smoke and only
- take lunch breaks.

- SECTION 3. The United States Department of Labor shall make sure that this bill is
- implemented.
- A. The United States Department of Labor shall ensure that all employees
- get paid equally by requesting time cards and time clocks be assigned to
- all public workplaces in the state.
- B. It will be required that breaks must be marked with the use of time
- cards that will be given to each employee in the workplace.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall come into effect starting the 1st of January 2019.
- 19 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

R-A Bill to Establish Comprehensive Sexual Education Course

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Sex education will be implemented starting the fifth grade all over the
- nation. As grade and age increases so will the depth of sexual education.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Sex education shall be defined as Comprehensive Sex Education which
- teaches about abstinence as the best method for avoiding STDs and
- 6 unintended pregnancy, but also teaches about condoms and
- 7 contraception to reduce the risk of unintended pregnancy and of
- infection with STDs, including HIV. It also teaches interpersonal and
- 9 communication skills and helps young people explore their own values,
- goals, and options.
- 11 **SECTION 3.** The U.S Department of Education shall make sure this bill is being
- implemented. If any schools fail to implement this program, said schools
- shall not receive federal funding.
- A. For every 200 students, schools shall receive 500 dollars for the sex
- ed program.
- 16 **SECTION 4.** This bill shall be implemented the beginning of the 2019-2020 school
- 17 year.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Mountain Home High School.

S-A Bill to Provide Alternate Language Testing to Accurately Evaluate English Language Learner Students

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Standardized testing in mathematics and science will be available in the
- student's original language for the first three (3) years after entrance into
- 4 the American school system.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. Standardized testing is defined as any test required by a majority of students
- 6 enrolled in that course.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** Tests are to be purchased and provided by the Department of Education
- with a special budget increase of \$1,000,000 specifically for the purchase
- 9 of the tests.
- SECTION 4. Implementation shall begin after passage of this bill, with complete
- implementation expected by the 2020-2021 school year.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Timberline High School.

T-A Bill to Reduce Bail for Lower Crimes Awaiting Trial

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Those accused of a low-level crime awaiting trial in excess of 100 days
- shall be immediately given the option of reduced-rate bail based on
- 4 income.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. Accused shall be defined as persons charged with a low-level crime
- 6 awaiting trial. Low-level crimes will encompass all infractions and up to
- 7 class 2 or B misdemeanor crimes and drug possession.
- 8 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice will oversee the safe implementation of this
- 9 legislation.
- A. Those released as a result of this legislation will undergo the same
- security measures as ordinary bail.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall go into effect immediately upon passage of this legislation.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

U-A Bill to Ban Unpaid Internships to Reduce Prevalence of Free Labor

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. We will make unpaid internships illegal to reduce unpaid free labor
- 3 **SECTION 2.** Unpaid internships are jobs where you shadow a mentor without
- 4 payment. This limits the opportunities that people receive because they can't afford
- to have an unpaid job.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The United States Department of Labor will be enforcing this
- 7 **SECTION 4.** This will be implemented as of January 1st of 2019
- 8 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Centennial High School.

V-A Resolution to Renounce Solitary Confinement to Protect the Sanity of Inmates

- WHEREAS, Solitary Confinement, used to prevent gang attacks, as well as protect at-risk convicts and the mentally ill, hurts the sanity of inmates; and
- WHEREAS, As many as 80,000 to 100,000 are in Solitary Confinement, and are at risk of greater harm to their mental health; and
- WHEREAS, Many prisoners do not deserve this modern form of torture for the sheer convenience of prisons across the US; and
- WHEREAS, If this resolution is not put into action the continued negative discrepancies of Solitary Confinement will only accelerate.
- RESOLVED, That the Congress here assembled make the recommendation to prisons in the United States to end the practice of Solitary Confinement.

W-A Bill to Repeal the Dickey Amendment to Prevent Gun Violence

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Title II of Public Law 104, Statute 3009, known as the Dickey Amendment,
3		is hereby amended to strike "Provided further, That none of the funds
4		made available for injury prevention and control at the Centers for
5		Disease Control and Prevention may be used to advocate or promote gun
6		control".
7	SECTION 2.	Advocate shall be defined as publicly recommending a particular practice
8		or policy. Promote shall be defined as supporting or actively encouraging.
9	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of the Treasury shall oversee the
10		implementation this bill.
11		1. No monetary restrictions shall be placed by Congress on research of
12		firearm related violence within the allotted budget for the Centers for
13		Disease Control and Prevention.
14 15	SECTION 4.	This shall go into effect upon passage of this legislation.

X-A Bill to get rid of the Mountain time zone in the United States

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1.** UPON PASSAGE OF THIS BILL, THE UNITED STATES WILL ONLY SPAN 3 TIME
- 3 ZONES. IDAHO, MONTNA, WYOMING, ARIZONA, EASTERN OREGON AND
- 4 NORTHERN UTAH WILL BE PART OF THE PACIFIC TIME ZONE. ALL OF
- 5 TEXAS WILL BE IN THE CENTRAL TIME ZONE
- 6 **SECTION 2.** A time zone is a range of longitudes where a common standard time is
- 7 used.
- 8 **SECTION 3.** The enforcement of this bill will be overseen by the Department of
- 9 Transportation
- 10 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect immediately
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
