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TFA Fall 2018 Item 1. A Bill to Implement a Cap and Trade System to Curb Carbon Dioxide Emissions

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2	SECTION 1.	A Cap and Trade System be implemented in order to reduce Carbon Dioxide emissions
3		within the United States. The regulations shall cap and reduce annually the CO2
4		emissions each calendar year such that— in 2019, the quantity of CO2 emissions does
5		not exceed 83 percent of the quantity of CO2 emissions from such sources in 2005; in
6		2030, the quantity of CO2 emissions from capped sources does not exceed 58 percent of
7		the quantity of greenhouse gas emissions from such sources in 2005. The emissions
8		allowances will begin at 5,000 million metric tons of CO2 and decrease by 120 million
9		annually.
10	SECTION 2.	A. "Cap" shall be defined as the upper limit on CO2 emissions that companies,
11		businesses, and firms shall not exceed.
12		B. "Trade" shall be defined as the exchange of those CO2 permits between companies
13		allowing for more flexibility within the market.
14		C. "Cap and Trade System" shall be defined as the federal approach to minimizing
15		pollution by creating and distributing carbon dioxide emission permits to companies
16		that permit them to emit a certain amount of carbon dioxide.
17	SECTION 3.	The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will
18		oversee the enforcement of the bill.
19		A. The EPA will sell a predetermined amount of Carbon emissions permits to
20		companies based on Carbon emissions guidelines set yearly.
21		B. The EPA will oversee the trade of CO2 permits from organization to organization.
22		C. The IRS will fine companies found to be exceeding the upper limit of CO2 emissions
23		5% of their total revenue every year they fail to meet the limits.
24	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be enacted on January 1, 2020.
25	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

TFA Fall 2018 Item 2. A Resolution to End the Cuban Trade Embargo

1	WHEREAS,	The United States trade embargo on Cuba was put into place under the Foreign
2		Assistance Act of 1961, to protest the highly oppressive regime of Fidel Castro,
3		which violated many international human rights laws; and
4	WHEREAS,	This embargo stays in place to this day, nearly six decades later, even though
5		Fidel Castro's regime no longer exists; and
6	WHEREAS,	Under the Foreign Assistance Act, the United States will place an embargo on
7		any nation that has been shown to violate multiple international human rights
8		laws; and
9	WHEREAS,	Ever since the administration of Raul Castro came to power, we observed a
10		drastic change in treatment of the Cuban people, and an effort by the
11		government to reform the quality of life in their nation; and
12	WHEREAS,	The government is trying to do so through economic means which are currently
13		being hindered by the American trade embargo; and
14	WHEREAS,	There is no more observable harm being done by the government that
15		surpasses the harm being done in other nations without embargoes on them;
16		now, therefore, be it
17	RESOLVED,	By this Congress here assembled, that the United States of America hereby
18		removes the trade embargo placed on the nation of Cuba.

3		which time they must successfully complete both the written and driving
4		aspects of license screening. After the date of birth in an individual's 70 th
5		year, each driver will have 60 days to acquire a new license. Following the
6		60-day grace period, drivers' licenses will expire and penalties will be
7		levied against drivers for driving with an expired license.
8	SECTION 2.	License to drive is a document permitting a person to drive a motor
9		vehicle. At all renewal dates following the driver's 70th birthdate, drivers

4	WHEREAS,	the World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that more than 10
5		percent of all medicines sold worldwide, including the United States and
6		Canada, are counterfeit; and
7	WHEREAS,	Counterfeit and falsified drugs with reduced potency have allowed
8		diseases to adapt and have contributed to global microbial resistance,
9		leading to drug-resistant forms of shigella, cholera, malaria, salmonella,
10		and tuberculosis; and
11	WHEREAS,	As many as one million people die each year from the administration of
12		falsified or counterfeit pharmaceuticals; and
13	WHEREAS,	Legal enforcement and penalties for trafficking in counterfeit
14		pharmaceuticals is exceptionally lax, with convictions often resulting in

17	WHEREAS,	The majority of these counterfeit drugs are manufactured in countries

21		the penalties for counterfeiting or trading in counterfeit pharmaceutical
22		drugs to be commensurate with those for trafficking in narcotics; and

24		against countries who fail to implement and enforce regulations
25		combatting the manufacture and trafficking of counterfeit
26		pharmaceuticals within the next three years.

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Congress finds that animal agriculture contributes significantly to
3		greenhouse gas emissions, is a leading cause of deforestation, water and
4		air pollution, and biodiversity loss, and therefore mandates the following:
5		A. A \$.10 tax is hereby levied on every pound of meat sold from animal
6		agriculture enterprises.
7		B. A \$.10 tax is hereby levied on every gallon of milk sold from animal
8		agriculture enterprises.
9		C. A \$1.00 tax is hereby levied on each gross of eggs sold for
10		consumption from animal agricultural enterprises.
11		D. A \$2.00 tax is hereby levied on every ton of grass, hay, corn, silage,

14		E. Animal agriculture enterprises will be paid \$25.00 per acre per year
15		for up to 10 years for each acre of land which is converted from
16		animal agriculture purposes to plant-based agriculture.
17	SECTION 2.	Animal agriculture enterprise is defined as a commercial enterprise which
18		contains at least 100 animals whose meat or dairy will be sold.
19	SECTION 3.	The Department of the Treasury will oversee Sections 1(A)-(D) of this act.
20		The Department of Agriculture will oversee the implementation of
21		section 1(E) of this act.
22	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect six months from the date of passage.
23	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

6		B. Healthy Supermarkets that open locations in impoverished areas or existing
7		supermarkets that change focus to healthy alternatives will receive a 10%
8		tax subsidy.
9		C. An excise tax of 10% will be implemented on all products that contain added
10		sugars above 25 grams.
11		D. The money collected from this tax will be invested into lowering the cost of
12		healthy alternatives.

15	SECTION 3.	The Department of Veterans' Affairs along with the Department of Health
16		and Human Services and the Department of Defense will oversee the
17		implementation of this legislation. A budget of \$12 billion from the
18		existing Department of Defense budget will be transferred to the VA to
19		fund the new practitioners.
20	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect in FY 2020.

TFA Fall 2018 Item 14. A Bill to Fund Infrastructure Initiatives to Improve Native and Indigenous Health Systems

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1. Indian tribe communities will be provided grants for the development of
3	sustainable infrastructure and utilities for health care services.
4	SECTION 2. The following standards are necessary:
5	A. "Indian tribe" is established in section 4 of the Indian Self-Determination and Education
6	Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 5304).
7	B. "Emergency Medical Systems" are out-of-hospital care that provide emergency assistance
8	and transportation to health care facilities.
9	C. "Municipal broadbands" are defined as broadband Internet access operated by local tribal
10	authorities
11	SECTION 3. The Bureau of Indian Affairs, respective Indian tribe authorities, and other
12	federal agencies will implement the following primary health steps:
13	A. For the planning, construction, and maintenance of Emergency Medical Systems at all IHS
14	care facilities, the Department of Health & Human Services and Indian Health Service will b
15	allocated \$3.5 billion.
16	B. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services will exempt American Indian tribe
17	members from state community/work engagement or work requirements for CMS
18	eligibility.
19	C. To create a grant dedicated to renewable and sustainable energy cooperatives in tribal
20	territories, the Rural Electrification Authority will be allocated \$5 billion.
21	D. The Federal Communications Committee Office of Native Affairs and Policy will provide \$1
22	billion in grants for the creation of municipal broadbands by Indian tribal authorities.
23	SECTION 4. This legislation will go into effect as of FY 2020.

1	BE IT ENACTED BY	HE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED TH	IAT:
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2	SECTION 1. Mentally ill individuals deemed a danger to themselves or other people will
3	be mandated by law to enter a psychiatric hospital to reduce crimes
4	mentally ill individuals.
5	SECTION 2 . A. "Mentally ill individual" shall be defined as anyone suffering from a
6	mental health condition.
7	B. "Psychiatric hospital" shall be defined as any official, accredited hospital or ward
8	designed to handle and meet the needs of the mentally ill.
9	C. "Crimes" refer to any criminal offenses committed by mentally ill individuals.
10	SECTION 3. The United States Department of Health and Human Services will work
11	alongside the FBI, as well as state and local police forces to enforce this bill.
12	The Department of Health and Human Services will be responsible for ensuring the
13	various psychiatric hospitals across the country meet legal standards, as well as
