1) A Bill to Mandate Schools to Start at 9:00AM

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1: Any educational institution whether public, private, parochial, charter,
- 2. or magnet with grades between 9-12 are hereby ordered to begin instructional time no
- earlier than 9:00 in the morning.
- 4. SECTION 2: Any educational institution between the grades of 9-12 that does not
- comply shall lose all government funding.

- SECTION 4: This legislation shall go into effect on January 5, 2019.

6. A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Abolish Congress

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
- 2. proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be
- 3. valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the
- 4. legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its5. submission by the Congress:
 - 6. ARTICLE --
 - **7. SECTION 1:** The House or Representatives and the Senate are hereby ordered to 8. disband.
 - 9. A) For purposes of this legislation, 'disband' will be defined as the ending of any 10. activities
 - 11. done by Congress that will will influence the government, economy, or people of the
 - 12. United States. Elections for members of Congress will cease after this legislation is 13. ratified.

7. A Bill to Implement Adequate Food Recalls by the F.D.A.

- 2. carried out by The Food and Drug Administration in order to remove contaminated food
- 3. from store shelves.
- 4. SECTION 2. The recalls will require the F.D.A to evaluate food-borne hazards in a
- 5. timely manner and require that companies initiate recalls when hazards are detected.
- A. Define food-borne hazards as illness from consuming food contaminated with bacteria or viruses.
- B. Define timely manner as the period in which food is recalled with as little exposure to consumers as possible. C. Define recalls as the process of removing contaminated or inadequate to sell foods from store shelves and consumers.
- 6. **SECTION 3.** The United States Department of Health and Human Services shall
- 7. oversee this legislation.
- 8. All companies failing to remove contaminated foods in a forty day period will be fined
- 9. \$10,000 a day until recalls have been followed through.
- 10. **SECTION 4.** This law shall take effect 90 days after passage.

8) A RESOLUTION TO MEDIATE IN INDO-PAKISTANI AFFAIRS

9) A BILL TO RESCIND THE GLOBAL GAG RULE

- 1. **SECTION 1:** International health funding shall be provided to qualified
- 2. organizations with no limitations as to the discussion of contraception abortion.
- 3. **SECTION 2:** This legislation shall not be considered a repeal of any rule prohibiting
- 4. U.S. finds from being used directly to directly provide abortion or abortion services.
- 5. **SECTION 3:** The US Agency for International Development shall oversee the
- 6. implementation of this legislation.
- 7. **SECTION 4:** This legislation shall be made effective immediately upon passage.

10) A Bill to Grant Amnesty to Current Undocumented Residents

- 2. 2019 and ending on December 31, 2029 to all residents who entered the United States
- 3. illegally prior to its enforcement date.
- 4. **SECTION 2.** Residents must prove that they have not committed repeated serious
- 5. felony offenses. No other standards or requirements may be implemented except
- 6. those required for clerical purposes.
- 7. **SECTION 3.** Residents granted amnesty through this bill may begin voting in the
- 8. Presidential election following their amnesty and in every election thereafter. State
- 9. and city legislatures may not abridge this right.

- 10. **SECTION 3.** This bill shall go into effect March 1, 2019.
- 11. **SECTION 4.** The Department of Homeland Security shall implement this bill.
- 12. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
