

A Bill To Make Vaccination For Certain Diseases Mandatory

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS GOVERNMENT THAT:

SECTION 1. A. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) shall make it mandatory for all children entering kindergarten in all 50 states, to have vaccines to the following diseases: Hepatitis A, Flu, and Haemophilus Influenzae.

Subsection A: States must check vaccination records for each student yearly to ensure that students are vaccinated for the diseases above.

SECTION 2. A. Hepatitis A is a disease that causes acute liver failure, which can be deadly. The Flu is very viral infection that can be very deadly and has killed thousands of people. The Haemophilus Influenza can cause vomiting and trouble breathing and lead to death.

SECTION 3. A. The Department of the Secretary of Health and Human Services will overlook the implementation of the bill.

SECTION 4. A. This bill will go into effect immediately after its passage.

SECTION 5 A. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO PERMIT THE IMPORTATION OF PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION FROM CANADA

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. A. The United States Department of Health and Human Services shall allow prescription medication that has been approved for use in Canada to be imported into as well as sold in the United States.

B. On behalf of Medicare Part D, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall be authorized to negotiate drug prices with domestic pharmaceutical companies as well as Canadian manufacturers of drugs approved by Health Canada.

SECTION 2. A. "Prescription medication" shall be defined as a pharmaceutical drug that requires a medical practitioner's authorization for access.

B. Medication that has been approved for use in Canada must have been approved by the department Health Canada.

SECTION 3. The Department of Health and Human Services will oversee the implementation of this bill.

SECTION 4. This bill will take into effect immediately after passage.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize Prostitution

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. Prostitution shall be legalized throughout the entire United States. Brothels will become legalized, licensed, and overseen by the Department of Labor. Prostitutes must be at least 18 years of age, have HIV and STD testing monthly, and they must use condoms in their work. Brothels will also have restrictions, them being that they cannot be located within 400 yards of schools or places of worships, and cannot be located on a principal street. There shall also be a \$5 tax on each and every instance a customer engages in sexual conduct with a worker, with the money going to the state governments.

SECTION 2. Prostitution shall be defined as “Engaging in sexual conduct with another person in return for a fee, money, or something else of value.” Sexual conduct will be defined as, “Sexual intercourse, oral-genital contact, or any touching of the sexual organs (or another intimate part) of a person for the purpose of arousing or gratifying the sexual desire of either party.”

SECTION 3. The U.S. Department of Labor and the U.S. Department of the Treasury will oversee the implementation of this bill.

SECTION 4. This bill shall go into effect one month after the passage of this bill.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**A BILL TO GIVE AID TO
THE PEOPLE OF IRAQ**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall give 1 billion dollars in the form of humanitarian
3 and developmental aid to Iraqi citizens in Iraq recovering from the Islamic
4 State War.

5 **SECTION 2.** The aid shall work at the grassroots level to rebuild Iraq's water and
6 electricity systems; provide food, health care for its people; and take care
7 of those who were forced from their homes in the fighting.

8 **SECTION 3.** USAID, Peace Corps, and Department of State will all oversee the
9 implementation of this bill to ensure effective implementation.

10 **SECTION 4.** At the beginning of the 2020 fiscal year, the effectiveness of the aid will
11 be Determined, and if 10% or more of the aid is said to be improperly
12 distributed or inefficiently utilized, humanitarian aid to Iraq in the form of
13 this bill will stop. However, if the aid is deemed effective, an additional 3
14 billion dollars each year shall be given to help the Iraqi people recover.
15 This legislation will be implemented on March 1, 2019

16 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Comprehensive Immigration Reform Act of 2019

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Congress shall set aside an additional \$5 billion per year for a period of 10
3 years with which to increase the budgets of the departments of
4 Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and U.S. Customs and
5 Border Patrol (CBP), in order to add manpower and improve enforcement
6 of existing immigration law, and to better patrol the border.

7 **A.** Congress shall specifically deny funds for a “wall” along the border
8 with Mexico, excepting only intermittent fences or barriers where the
9 Department of Homeland Security (DHS) deems prudent.

10 **SECTION 2.** The DHS shall expand by 25% the maximum number of slots for both
11 temporary work visas, and lawful permanent residency (or green cards)
12 per year.

13 **SECTION 3.** Persons currently residing illegally in the U.S. who qualified for
14 consideration under Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)
15 shall, additionally, be eligible to receive lawful permanent residency.

16 **SECTION 4.** The legislation shall take effect October 1, 2019.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO BUILD ZUMWALT CLASS DESTROYERS

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The Department of Defense shall allocate 50 Billion dollars in funds to the
3 further development of current Zumwalt class destroyer and construction
4 of further Zumwalt class destroyers.

5 **SECTION 2. (A)** This bill will create 7 New Zumwalt class destroyers after a committee
6 of engineers and Navy Commanders, created by the Department of
7 Defense, determine that the current Zumwalt class destroyers are fit for
8 combat.

9 **(B)** The new destroyers will be built based off of any developments or
10 improvements on the current destroyers.

11 **(C)** Further developments shall be defined as developments to the
12 Zumwalt class of destroyers that will improve its combat and
13 seaworthiness.

14 **SECTION 3. (A)** Five of the seven destroyers shall be made available for sale to any of
15 the following eligible client nations: Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, or any
16 member to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). The other 2
17 will be used by the discretion of the US Navy.

18 **(B)** The base sale price for these destroyers shall be seven billion dollars.

19 **SECTION 4.** The Department of Defense shall be responsible for carrying out this
20 legislation.

21 **SECTION 5.** This bill will go into effect six months from the date of passage.

22 **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Remove the Trade Embargo on Cuba to Totally Remove Government Violations

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The following sanctions on the Republic of Cuba: the Cuban Assets
3 Control Regulations of 1963, and the Helms-Burton Act of 1996
4 shall be removed.

5 **SECTION 2.** No other acts shall be removed until further investigation concludes
6 favorable results.

7 **SECTION 3.** "Favorable results" shall be defined as the disappearance of human
8 rights violations, censorship, and corruption stemming from the
9 Cuban government.

10 **SECTION 4.** The U.S. Department of Defense shall oversee the implementation
11 of this legislation

12 A. The Department shall conduct quarterly reports on instances of
13 government related violations.

14 **SECTION 5.** This legislation shall go into effect on the first day of the next Fiscal
15 Year.

16 **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
17 void.

**A Bill to Change All Current Mandatory Minimum Sentencing for Offenses
Regarding the Possession of Scheduled Substances**

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS THAT:

Section 1: The Sentencing Commission of the United States shall change the mandatory minimum sentencing for offenses regarding the possession of scheduled substances under the following reforms:

Subsection A: Reduce all 5-year minimum sentencing to no more than 2 years imprisonment, and 2-year parole.

Subsection B: Reduce all 10-year minimum sentencing to no more than 5 years imprisonment, and 3 years parole.

Subsection C: Reduce all 20-year minimum sentencing to no more than 10 years imprisonment, and 7 years parole.

Section 2: The Sentencing Commission of the United States shall expand “Safety Valves” to all nonviolent offenses regarding the possession of scheduled substances that use mandatory minimum sentencing.

Section 3: This bill shall be applied to all federal and state prisons.

Section 3: This bill shall be passed by the House ethics committee. These laws will be enforced in all public prisons.

Section 4: This bill shall take effect 91 days after passage.

Section 5: All laws regarding the distribution or possession of scheduled substances shall be declared void, with the implementation of the new ones above.

A Bill to End the Oppression of the Filipino People

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall impose targeted sanctions on the
3 Philippines to combat the extrajudicial killings encouraged by
4 President Rodrigo Duterte. Sanctions will be lifted after sufficient
5 reforms are made to the War on Drugs carried out by his
6 administration.

7 **SECTION 2.** “Targeted sanctions” refers to sanctions on the Philippines’
8 government, police forces, and all other groups implicated in the
9 War on Drugs. “Sufficient reforms” requires the Filipino government
10 to end their sponsorship of extrajudicial killings and to make
11 significant efforts to reduce the violence in their War on Drugs.

12 **SECTION 3.** The US Department of Treasury is responsible for maintaining
13 these sanctions.

14 A. The US Department of State will oversee the condition in the
15 Philippines and assess whether sufficient reforms have been
16 made.

17 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will go into effect on the first day of the next Fiscal
18 Year.

19 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
20 void.
