

A BILL TO LOWER THE NATIONAL MINIMUM DRINKING AGE TO
19

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

Article I: The National Minimum Drinking Age Act will stay the same except the minimum age of purchasing and publicly possessing alcohol will be lowered to 19.

Article II: This means that the consequences each state faces should they decide to lower the minimum age below 19 will also be upheld.

Article III: This bill will be implemented immediately upon passing.

Article IV: This bill will be enforced by the Department of Transportation.

Article V: All other federal laws in conflict with this new policy shall hereby declared null and void.

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**A Bill To Extend The Ban For White House and Congressional Officials from
Lobbying**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: Under the "Honest Leadership and Open Government Act",
3 signed in 2007, former senators and top executive branch
4 officials are restricted from becoming lobbyists for two years
5 after leaving office. This bill will extend the restriction from
6 two to ten years for all White House and Congressional
7 officials.

8 Article II: A lobbyist is defined as a person who takes part in an organized
9 attempt to influence legislators.

10 Article III: The Department of Justice will oversee the enforcement and
11 implementation of this bill.

12 Article IV: This legislation will be implemented on June 1st, 2019.

13 Article V: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
null 14 and void.

A BILL TO INCREASE THE MINIMUM WAGE IN THE UNITED STATES

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1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Article I: The United States Federal Government shall establish a \$10.10 minimum
3 wage via gradual increases in the current minimum wage.

4 Article II: "Gradual increase" is defined as increasing the minimum wage by \$0.25
5 the first year and \$0.52 every year after until the \$10.10 minimum wage is
6 reached.

7 Article III: This legislation shall go into effect in the fiscal year 2019.

8 Article IV: The United States Department of Labor will oversee the enforcement of
9 this legislation.

10 A. Any governmental agency or business employing more than 50
11 employees who violates this policy shall be subject to a fine of
12 \$100,000 for the first offense and \$500,000 for each subsequent
13 violation.

14 Article V: All other laws in conflict with this new policy shall hereby declared null
15 and void.
