Congress Legislation

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B1. A Bill to Minimize Plastic Pollution

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	A 2% tax will be added, for those who sell them, to single use plastic
3		products
4	SECTION 2.	A single use plastic product, according to the UN Environmental
5		Programs is "often also referred to as disposable plastics, are
6		commonly used for plastic packaging and include items intended to be
7		used only once before they are thrown away or recycled. These include,
8		among other items, grocery bags, food packaging, bottles, straws,
9		containers, cups and cutlery.
10	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will oversee the implementation of
11		this tax.
12		A. All funds collected from the Single Use Plastic Product Tax shall
13		be directed towards the Environmental Protection Agency
14		B. The funds directed towards the EPA shall be used for pollution
15		minimization efforts
16	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented by January 1, 2020.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

B8. A Bill to Designate Puerto Rico as a State of the United States of America

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THIS S	TUDENT CONGRESS THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Enable the a	dmission of the territory of Puerto Rico into the Union as
3		the 51st stat	e.
4	SECTION 2.	Admission in	to the Union shall be defined as granting all rights reserved
5		for states of	the USA to Puerto Rico.
6	SECTION 3.	The governm	nent of Puerto Rico will conduct a vote to determine
7		whether the	y will join the Union.
8		A.	If a majority of the votes cast in the vote conducted are for
9			Puerto Rico's admission into the Union as a State, then
10			within 90 days of receipt of the certified results, the
11			President shall appoint a commission on the Equal
12			Application of Federal Law to Puerto Rico.
13		В.	Puerto Rico, along with obtaining the rights of becoming a
14			state, will also elect senators and representatives
15			beginning in 2024.
16	SECTION 4.	This bill will	go into effect on January 3rd, 2025
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in co	onflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
18		void.	



B10. A Bill to Reform the Electoral Process

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THIS S	TUDENT CONGRESS THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The followin	g reforms to the U.S. electoral system shall hereby be made.
3		A.	All federal elections for the office of President and U.S.
4			House of Representatives 4 shall be carried out under
5			Single Transferable Vote using a Droop quota.
6		В.	U.S. Presidential elections shall require Electors to
7			collectively vote according to the results of the national
8			popular vote.
9		C.	States with 10 or more occurrences of violations of the
10			Voting Rights Act in the last 25 years shall be subject to
11			preclearance under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act for a
12			period of 10 years.
13		D.	\$500,000 shall be allocated towards developing a federal
14			open-source computer algorithm to check redistricting
15			plans for gerrymandering.
16	SECTION 2.	Popular vote	e shall be defined as the total number of votes each
17		candidate re	ceives. Gerrymandering shall be defined as purposefully
18		drawing unre	epresentative district lines that favor one party over the
19		other.	
20	SECTION 3.	The Election	Assistance Commission shall work in conjunction with local
21		and state ele	ectoral commissions in carrying out this legislation.
22		A.	The Federal Election Commission shall be tasked with
23			delivering a fine of \$2,500 to Electors not in compliance



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24			with Section 1B.
25		B.	The Federal Districting Office shall henceforth be created
26			and tasked with managing Section 1D. They shall
27			additionally require state redistricting plans be determined
28			by the algorithm to have not been gerrymandered before
29			being implemented.
30	SECTION 4.	This bill will	go into effect January 1st 22 , 2019.
31	SECTION 5.	All laws in co	onflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
32		void.	



B11. A Bill to Ban the Importation or Selling of Slave-made Products within the United States of America

ı	BE II ENAC	IED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	Section 1.	Whereas slavery is still a major problem in the world and annually
3		grosses over \$150 billion, the importation or selling of all slave-made
4		products shall be banned in the United States (US).
5	Section 2.	The following terms are defined as
6		Slavery : the economic system where people labor for another without
7		compensation and are in the state of a slave.
8		Slave : a person who is the legal property (as determined by the Justice
9		Department) of another and is forced to labor for them.
10	Section 3.	The Federal Trade Commission and the Justice Department will oversee
11		the enforcement of this bill.
12		A. Upon implementation, all current products within the United
13		States that are a result of slave production shall be declared
14		contraband and seized by the Justice Department, following the
15		due process of law. The US companies of all products seized shall
16		be compensated.
17		B. 120 days after implementation, all US companies who buy
18		slave-made products will have those products seized and
19		destroyed without compensation upon importation.
20	Section 4.	This legislation shall take effect as of January 1, 2020.
21	Section 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null

B12. A Bill to Provide Rehabilitation in Federal Penitentiary Institutions to Lower Recidivism Rates

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1. All federal penitentiary institutions are to provide adequate
3	psychological and medical rehabilitation to inmates serving
4	non-life or death row sentences.
5	SECTION 2. Federal penitentiary institutions are to constitute any place of
6	holding for criminals operated by the national government.
7	SECTION 3. The Department of Justice will oversee the enforcement of this
	bill
8	and will be given the power to provide immediate closure to any
9	institution found in violation.
10	SECTION 4. This bill will go into implementation on January 1, 2020.
11	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
12	and void.

B13. A Bill to Guarantee A Universal Basic Income

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 Section 1. American citizens over the age of 18 and who have not been convicted of a crime shall receive \$10,000 of untaxable income from the U.S. 3 Government on an annual basis. Individuals who make more than 4 5 \$125,000 and/or couples who make over \$200,000 annually will not receive the annual base income. 6 7 Section 2. Children under the age of 18 shall have a basic annual income of \$5,000 8 given to their parents in the child's name. Funding for Social Security will 9 be halved, beginning in the next fiscal year and continue for 5 years. 10 After the end of the Five (5) years, Social Security will be eliminated. Medicare and Medicaid shall also be permanently cut by 50% and 11 12 spending may only increase with inflation after the Five (5) year period. 13 The payroll tax and federal minimum wage are abolished. The 14 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program will be eliminated. 15 Section 3. Each program mentioned in Section 2 will be responsible for carrying out its specific role as outlined in said section. 16 The Internal Revenue Service will verify eligibility for the annual 17 A. 18 payment.

B14. A Bill to Promote Marriage and End Child Poverty

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 Section 1. A. Congress shall end all marriage penalties within the United States tax 3 system. B. Congress shall end all marriage penalties within all United States 4 welfare programs. 5 Section 2. A. A "marriage penalty" in the tax system will be defined as when a wife 6 7 and husband pay more income tax filing jointly as a couple than they would if they had remained single and filed as individuals. 8 B. A "marriage penalty" in the welfare system will be defined as when 9 married couples receive lower benefits from government programs than 10 they would if they had not married. 11 C. "Marriage penalties" also apply to all homosexual marriages 12 13 considered legal in their respective states. 14 Section 3. The Department of Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will be responsible for implementing this bill. 15 This bill will take effect June 1, 2019. 16 Section 4. 17 Section 5. R2. A Resolution to Provide Alternate Sentencing Options to Nonviolent Offenders within the United States

1 **WHEREAS**, the United States houses about five percent of the world population and 2 contains about a quarter of the prison population; and WHEREAS, approximately two-thirds of prisoners will re-enter society without 3 training or skills to make a living in non-criminal enterprises; and 4 WHEREAS, about twenty five percent of convicts are nonviolent offenders without 5 opportunities for gainful employment during their sentence; and 6 a majority of inmates do not receive proper rehabilitation treatment for 7 WHEREAS, drug offenses following sentencing; and 8 9 **WHEREAS**, paid labor and/or rehabilitation programs for nonviolent offenders 10 would decrease the prison population; and **WHEREAS,** paid labor and rehabilitation programs provide the opportunity for 11 12 non-violent offenders to reenter the job market and society as dignified 13 citizens of the United States; now, therefore, be it 14 **RESOLVED,** By the Congress here assembled that paid labor and rehabilitation 15 programs should be federally funded as sentencing options for nonviolent offenders. 16



R6. A Resolution to Increase Economic Engagement with North Korea

1	WHEREAS,	Tensions between the United States and North Korea are quickly rising;
2		and
3	WHEREAS,	the recent exchanges between the two governments have increased the
4		chances of nuclear conflict; and
5	WHEREAS,	this would be detrimental to the national security of the U.S. and have
5		negative economic and political effects on the United States and global
7		community at large; and
3	WHEREAS,	an impending military conflicts could lead to strained relations between
9		U.S. trade partners and have lasting effects on the people and relations
10		between said countries; now, therefore, be it
11	RESOLVED,	that the Congress here assembled make the following recommendation
12		to increase trade between the United States and North Korea to ensure
13		global tranquility.



R8. A Resolution to Improve Educational Standards for Inmates

1	WHEREAS,	The rehabilitative purposes of imprisonment are currently	y undermined
2		by the removal of educational grants and programs for in	mates under
3		the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 19	994; and
4	WHEREAS,	Under these current conditions, many rehabilitated crimin	nals who cannot
5		afford education struggle to reinstate themselves in soc	ety,
5		andtherefore, risk becoming recidivists; and	
7	WHEREAS,	The increasing population of inmates, fueled by recidivism	n, is
3		additionally detrimental to taxpayers due to the immense	e cost of
9		feeding and housing 2.2 million inmates; and	
10	WHEREAS,	Allocating a fractional amount of funding to educate our	nation's
11		inmates would not only lower recidivism rates but would	also ensure a
12		brighter and more productive future for those who cannot	ot afford to
13		pave their own way; now, therefore, be it	
14	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled amend the Violent Cri	me Control and
15		Law Enforcement Act of 1994 to reinstate Pell Grant fund	ling for
16		inmates; and, be it	
17	FURTHER R	ESOLVED, That this Congress endeavor to provide high	ner education



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18	opportunities to inmates in collaboration with the Federal
19	Bureau of Prisons.



R10: A Resolution to Regulate Google and Facebook as Public Utilities

1	WHEREAS,	Google and Facebook have become a prime source of news and internel
2		search results for most Americans; and
3	WHEREAS,	Facebook has engaged in the insertion of fake news and an over-
4		abundance of anti-conservative stories; and
5	WHEREAS,	Google has manipulated search results in a way that gives illegal
6		advantage to its own services while harming the company's rivals; and
7	WHEREAS,	Google and Facebook earned 99% of new digital ad spending last year;
8		and
9	WHEREAS,	The Google-Facebook advertising duopoly forms an insurmountable
10		barrier to entry of any new digital ad provider; and
11	WHEREAS,	Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg has referred to Facebook as a "social
12		utility"; and
13	WHEREAS,	Utility regulation does not mean government ownership but rather
14		righter regulation of what it is able to do and prices it is able to charge;
15		now, therefore, be it
16	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here assembled will regulate Google and Facebook as a public
17		utility including regulation under anti-trust laws and pricing practices.
