10		forbidden from collecting data on citizenship in the Census.

### A Bill to Implement a National Political Knowledge Test When Voting in Presidential Elections

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The United States formally enforce that all voters in presidential elections
- must take a political knowledge attesting to their knowledge on
- 4 presidential candidates and political policy.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. A political knowledge test defined as an exam assessing voters' basic
- knowledge on presidential candidates as well as their standings on
- various concepts concerning politics, economics, immigration, and
- 8 environmental issues, as well as governmental policy.
- 9 **SECTION 3.** Implementation of this newly established bill will transpire in the fiscal
- 10 year of 2020.
- 11 **SECTION 4.** The responsibilities of this agency will be managed by the Department of
- Education as well as the Department of Justice to ensure the test's
- 13 legality.
- **SECTION 5.** Exceptions to this bill shall include the existing Voting Rights Act of 1965
- which would be amended to allow solely one official political knowledge
- test within presidential elections.

8	WHEREAS,	we must assure the safety and constitutional rights of our citizens; now,
9		therefore, be it
10	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here assembled that the legal age to purchase a firearm
11		be raised to 18 years.

1	WHEREAS,	approximately 500,000 people in the U.S. are homeless; and
2	WHEREAS,	the U.S. pays \$18,500-\$44,000 for each instance of emergency care

4	WHEREAS,	giving people homes cures the root of homelessness; and
5	WHEREAS,	it is more cost effective to give individuals homes than paying for
6		emergency health care; and
7	WHEREAS,	an individual's employment, health, and financial problems can be more
8		effectively addressed once housing is secure; and
9	WHEREAS,	states that have implemented housing programs have seen great
10		outcomes; and
11	WHEREAS,	the type of homes may be built based on what best suits the region
12		within each state, and may include apartment buildings, town homes,
13		and single-family detached homes; now, therefore, be it
14	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here assembled that states will receive funding to build
15		homes to decrease their homelessness rates, maintain these buildings,
16		and provide compensation for the land they build on.

#### A Bill to A Bill to Fix Puerto Rico's Concerns

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Puerto Rico shall be granted full statehood.
- 3 **SECTION 2.** Initial representation in Congress will consist of two senators and one
- 4 representative, with proportional representation to be determined by
- 5 the 2020 census results.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Treasury shall immediately discharge Puerto Rican
- debt related to pension liabilities and bonds. Additionally, the Federal
- 8 Emergency Management Agency shall make \$100 billion available for
- 9 rebuilding infrastructure and utilities...
- 10 **SECTION 4.** This shall take effect on January 1, 2020.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Pay Reparations to African Americans

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The United States government will pay financial reparations of \$100
- billion to African Americans for the historical injustices that have
- 4 occurred in our society..
- 5 **SECTION 2**. African Americans eligible for these reparations shall be those who can
- trace their genealogy to the continent of Africa, or who can demonstrate
- that their ancestors were slaves, or would have been endangered by the
- Fugitive Slave Act.
- 9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice will oversee the process for determining the
- individuals eligible for financial reparations.
- 11 **A.** The \$100 billion will be distributed evenly to all eligible members.
- B. The \$100 billion will be issued as tax credits, and shall be
- administered by the Internal Revenue Service
- 14 **SECTION 4.** The Department of Justice will open the process for determining
- eligibility one year after passage of this legislation. Distribution of tax
- credits should be processed for the tax year following the identification
- of eligible individuals.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### **The Comprehensive Immigration Reform Act of 2019**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. Individuals currently residing in the United States without proper documentation or authorization shall be permitted to apply for citizenship provided that they meet the following conditions:
  - **A.** They have previously met the qualifications for the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, or
  - **B.** They can demonstrate that they have resided in the United States for ten consecutive years, have not been arrested for any crime, and have paid all applicable taxes on income earned.
- **SECTION 2.** Upon demonstration of the above, the person may apply for citizenship following the process currently in place.
- SECTION 3. Fees for this form of citizenship application shall be set at \$1500 per applicant, with \$500 of that fee placed in an account for the purpose of strengthening border security.
- **SECTION 4.** The Department of Homeland Security, through Immigration and Customs Enforcement, shall oversee implementation of this legislation.
- **SECTION 5.** This shall take effect ninety days after passage.
- **SECTION 6**. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
