A Bill to Restrict Possession of Exotic Animals to Protect Domestic Welfare

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

Article I: All private ownership of exotic animals as personal property is hereby prohibited except as follows: An employee or contractor of an animal sanctuary or other organization whose purpose it the preservation of species or promotion of biodiversity may own exotic animals.

Article II: No one may possess, release, import, export, or assist in the possession, releasing, importing, or exporting of exotic animals except as permitted by Article I.

Article III: Exotic animals are non-domestic and feral animals, including canines, felines, mammals, reptiles, bears, monkeys, birds, and endangered species.

Article IV: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service shall adopt regulations further defining exotic animals in a manner consistent with this Act and setting forth activities that violate this Act.

Article V: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service shall oversee and enforce the implementation of the legislation.

Article VI: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Article VII: This legislation shall take effect on March 1, 2020.

A Bill to Allow Employed Individuals Above Age Sixteen to be Granted Suffrage Rights

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. Employed Individuals over the age of sixteen shall be granted suffrage rights.
- SECTION 2. A. "Employed" entails any individual receiving more than \$3,000 annually

 B. "Suffrage" being the right to vote in public, political elections
- **SECTION 3.** The Federal Election Commission shall oversee the suffrage rights of employed individuals about sixteen years of age.
 - A. Employed Individuals above the age of sixteen shall be granted suffrage rights two years after the most recent president election.
 - B. Employed Individuals older than age sixteen shall be permitted to vote in local, state and federal elections.
- **SECTION 4.** The suffrage rights of employed individuals over age sixteen shall begin two years following the most recent presidential election.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Expand Health Coverage to Undocumented Immigrants BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT

Section 1: The passage of this legislation would allow undocumented immigrants to enroll in Medicare, Medicaid, and Children's Health Insurance Program and to purchase coverage through the Affordable Care Act Marketplaces.

Section 3: Any necessary funds for this legislation would be allotted from the Defense Budget.

Section 4: The Department of Health and Human Services will regulate the enforcement of this legislation.

Section This legislation will take effect at the beginning of the 2021 fiscal year.

Section All other laws and regulations that violate this bill are declared null and void.

A Bill to Allow Felons to Vote in Federal Elections

- 1. Be it enacted by the Student Congress assembled that:
- 2. Section I: Felons will be able to vote in federal elections, regardless of whether they are
- 3. incarcerated and/or have completed their sentence.
- 4. Section II: Voting in federal elections by felons can be encouraged but not
- 5. forced.
- 6. Section III: Each State is in charge of overseeing the unbiased application of this
- 7. policy in its own administrative region.
- 8. Section IV: This law shall require no funding.
- 9. Section V: This law will take effect January 1, 2021.
- 10. Section VI: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
- 11. and void.

A Bill for Every Prison to be a Government Run Prison

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT

Section 1: This passage of legislation would abolish all current non-government prisons along with all non-government programs that reside within the current prisons.

Section 2: Non-government prisons are classified as prisons that are contracted by a government agency such as: private or for-profit prison to obtain a profit. Non-government programs classify as any program that is offered by a non-governmental agency for profit.

Section 3: This bill will be enforced by the Federal Bureau of Prison.

Section 4: This piece of legislation will take effect at the beginning of the 2027 fiscal year.

Section 5: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Arm Personnel in West Virginia Public Schools

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. No less than one school personnel or security officer shall be armed in each public school. Said person(s) shall be armed with institutionally approved defensive material. A minimum of one school personnel or security officer must have some form of defensive material in the event of a school wide assembly. The person(s) wielding the item of defense must have taken a certified training course and pass a psychological exam prior to the wielding of the defensive item on school property. The defensive object may be carried on certified personnel, if they so wish.
- SECTION 2. Oxford dictionary defines "defensive material" as a means of gaining an advantage or defending oneself in a conflict or contest. A "School" refers to any institution educating children kindergarten through twelfth grade.
- SECTION 3. The West Virginia Board of Education would oversee the enactment of said bill and cooperation of local state Board of Education organizations. shall be permitted to vote in local, state and federal elections.
- **SECTION 4.** The bill shall be completely enforced before the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A RESOLUTION TO REMOVE THE REPUBLIC OF TURKEY FROM NATO

- 1. WHEREAS: The Republic of Turkey is under a dictatorial regime led by Recep Tayyip
- 2. Erdogan, characterized by racism, genocide denial, press censorship, military aggression
- 3. against ethnic minorities, and other such gross abuses of human rights, and;
- 4. WHEREAS: The Turkish government still refuses to recognize the genocide of
- 5. Armenian, Greek, and Assyrian peoples during World War I, and;
- 6. WHEREAS: The Turkish government has for over forty years been violating Kurdish
- 7. self-determination, most recently with its invasion of the Rojava Federation, and;
- 8. **WHEREAS:** The Turkish government has repeatedly provoked its NATO allies through
- 9. the invasion of Cyprus and violations of Greek airspace, and;
- 10. WHEREAS: The actions taken by the Turkish government has proven its disdain for the
- 11. democratic ideals which NATO was created to defend, therefore be it;
- 12. **RESOLVED:** By the Student Congress here assembled that the Republic of Turkey be
- 13. removed from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization as soon as practicable, and be it;
- 14. FURTHER RESOLVED: That the United States halts all military aid to the Republic of
- 15. Turkey until the government thereof recognizes the charges levied against it by this
- 16. resolution and takes appropriate measures to atone for its actions.

2	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:			
3	SECTION 1.	ION 1. All public elementary schools shall now offer optional "Universal" Pre-K to		
4		students regardless of their families' income level.		
5	SECTION 2.	A.	Public elementary schools are defined as any government funded	
6			facility that educates grades kindergarten and up.	
7		В.	"Universal" being defined as free to all students enrolled in	
8			elementary school in the United States, regardless of income	
9			level.	
10	SECTION 3. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will collect the funds needed to enforce this			
11	bill, following the current procedures regarding taxation and collection. The			
12	Department of Education will oversee compliance with this bill in coordination			
13	with state education departments.			
14		A.	\$21.6 billion will be needed to fund this bill.	
15		В.	This will be funded by a 0.10% tax on those whose	
16			assets surpass \$999,999,999.99.	
17		C.	Schools and/or districts that do not comply with Section	
18			1 will lose federal funding for Kindergarten, 1^{st} grade, and 2^{nd}	
19			grade until proof of compliance.	
20	SECTION 4. This bill will be implemented at the beginning of the 2022-2023 school year.			
21	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Stop the Production of Single-Use Batteries

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. Section 1: This bill will ban the manufacturing of single-use batteries.
- 3. Section 2: Single-use batteries will be defined as batteries that cannot be charged and
- 4. used repetitively.
- 5. Section 3: The punishment for breaking this law will be a fine of up to \$200,000 per day,
- 6. of which will be given to the Environmental Protection Agency to spend how they see fit.
- 7. Section 4: This bill requires no budget outlay at this time.
- 8. Section 5: The implementation of this bill will be overseen by the Environmental
- 9. Protection Agency.
- 10. Section 6: This law will go into effect January 1, 2024.
- 11. Section 7: All legislation in conflict with this bill will be declared null and void.

- 4. Section 2: People who do not want to be (or refuse to be) an organ donor, will have to fill
- 5. out paperwork in order to have the symbol be removed and not be considered a donor.
- 6. Section 3: This bill requires zero funding.
- 7. Section 4: The Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) would be in charge of executing
- 8. this bill.
- 9. Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2022.
- 10. Section 6: All laws in conflict are hereby declared null and void.

- 1. BE IT ENACTED IN THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 3. free bus transportation.

A Bill to Shorten School Days in West Virginia

- 1. Be it enacted by the Student Congress assembled that:
- 2. Section 1: High Schools in West Virginia will start at 8:30 am and end at 2:57 pm.

A Bill to Decrease the Cost of EpiPens
