3		transferable parental leave to one parent of a biological or adoptive child.
4	SECTION 2.	A. Paid leave is defined as the parent being excused from their
5		employment and receiving either

7		2) pro-rated salary for the weeks missed.
8		B. Non-transferable is defined by only one parent being able to take a

A Bill to Minimize Air Pollution to Make a Healthier Living Environment

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1: All states in the United States shall lower their air pollution levels 15% from their
3	current levels by the end of a one-year period, effective upon passage.
4	SECTION 2: Air pollution is defined as gases, dust, fumes or odor that are harmful to the health
5	or comfort of humans or animals. Air pollution will be measured by the levels of
6	carbon monoxide (CO), nitrogen dioxide (NO2), ozone (O3), particulate matter
7	(PM2.5 and PM10), sulfur dioxide (SO2), and hydrogen sulfide (H2S) in a given
8	area.
9	SECTION 3 : The Environmental Protection Agency will oversee the enforcement of this bill.
10	A. If a state does not lower their air pollution levels by 15% over a 12 month period,
11	then that state will be fined \$10,000,000 for each 1% they failed to lower. For
12	example, if a state lowers the air pollution by 13%, they will pay \$20,000,000.
13	The proceeds from the fines will be allocated to the Environmental Protection
14	Agency to be used as the agency sees fit.
15	B. The penalties shall not be imposed until after one year since the bill is passed.
16	That one year will be allotted so states can adapt to the new regulations of this
17	bill.
18	SECTION 4: This bill will take effect immediately after passage.
19	SECTION 5: All laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Fund Oversight of Organ Procurement Centers to Ensure a Proper Organ Donation System

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) shall be allocated
2		\$900 million to initiate effective oversight of organ procurement
3		organizations and ensure adequate transport of organs.
4	SECTION 2.	A. An "organ procurement organization" is an organization authorized by
5		the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), under Section
6		1138(b) of the Social Security Act, to procure organs for transplantation.
7		B. "Adequate transport of organs" refers to the successful transport of the
8		organ(s) from the donation site to the recipient, meaning organs are stored
9		in a proper environment and responsibly monitored.
10	SECTION 3.	This bill will be implemented over a two year period by the HHS in
11		conjunction with the CMS and specifically the Organ Procurement and
12		Transplantation Network (OPTN) of the HHS.
13		A. The \$900 million used for regulatory infrastructure will come from the
14		HHS budget.
15		B. The HHS will be able to terminate the federal contracts of organ
16		procurement centers that it identifies as improperly managed.
17	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be implemented in the following fiscal year.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
