A Bill to Implement a Nationwide Vehicle Mile Tax (VMT)

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The federal gasoline excise tax is hereby abolished and replaced with a
3		nationwide vehicle mile tax (VMT) of 0.6 cents per rural mile and 4.2
4		cents per urban mile. This money will be allocated to the Highway Trust
5		Fund (HTF).
6	SECTION 2.	A VMT is an excise tax levied on drivers based on the distance they drive
7	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service in conjunction to the Department of
8		Transportation shall be in charge of the implementation of this
9		legislation.
10		A. No vehicle point location may be tracked or saved.
11	SECTION 4.	This bill shall be implemented beginning fiscal year 2020.
12	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Stop Military Aid to Pakistan to Fight Terror

7	initiative, it wi	II need to alter its terms and conditions to better protect
8	users' privacy	and improve security measures to prevent future breaches.

A Bill to Limit the President's Pardoning Power in Order to Prevent Abuse of Power

2	amended to s	state: The President shall have Power to grant Reprieves
3	and Pardons	for Offenses against the United States, except in Cases of
4	impeachmen	t and personal relations to the president.
5	SECTION 2.	Personal relations will be defined as any person:
6	A. Who has	previously worked with the president, both in and outside of
7 8		aided the president through campaign donations. helped facilitate impeachable offenses.
9	SECTION 3.	This amendment will be implemented by the subcommittee
10	on the Consti	tution, under the Committee on the Judiciary.
11	SECTION 4.	The above goes into effect on January 1, 2020.

A Bill to Reform Drug Rehabilitation to Alleviate the Opioid Crisis

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SPBG) will
3		receive an additional \$500 million annually for five years, with additional
4		funds reserved for rehabilitation programs utilizing evidence-based
5		therapies focusing on the implementation of Medication-Assisted
6		Treatment. SPBG recipients must reapply every three years.
7	SECTION 2.	MAT is defined as Medication-Assisted Treatment under the guidelines
8		outlined by The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services
9		Administration (SAMHSA).
.0	SECTION 3.	A. The SAMHSA will implement this piece of legislation.
1		B. The CBP (U.S. Customs and Border Protection) Office of Field
.2		Operations, and ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) will have
13		their budgets reduced respectively by \$1 billion and \$1.5 billion, spread
L4		evenly over a five-year period to fund this piece of legislation.
15	SECTION 4.	This bill will take into effect in FY2021
16	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Tobacco Products to Promote Public Health

1	BE IT ENACTED	BY	THE	CONGRESS	HERE	ASSEMBLED	THAT

- **SECTION 1.** The manufacture or sale of tobacco products in herby banned.
- SECTION 2. "Tobacco products" include but are not limited to cigarettes, hookahs, and e-cigarettes.
- A. "Cigarette" is defined as a cylinder of finely cut tobacco rolled in paper made for smoking.
- B. "Hookah" is defined as a tobacco pipe that draws the smoke through water contained in a bowl.
- 9 C. "E-cigarette" is defined as an electric nicotine delivery system.
- SECTION 3. The Department of Justice specifically, The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives will oversee implementation of this legislation.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect January 1, 2022.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO ESTABLISH MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS IN SCHOOLS

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All state middle and high schools are now required to have mental health
3		programs that adequately address the mental illnesses of their students.
4		The federal government shall provide funds for the training and hiring of
5		qualified therapists.
6	SECTION 2.	(A) State and local school systems that receive any federal education
7		funding are subject to the revocation of such funds if they are deemed not
8		to be in compliance with this legislation.
9		(B) Mental illnesses include, but are not limited to: depression; anxiety;
10		drug addiction; and eating, mood, and personality disorders.
11		(C) A school is considered to have fulfilled the requirement of Section 1
12		when they provide treatment and/or appropriate referrals that have aided at
13		least 75% of students deemed to be in need of assistance.
14	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education and the National Institute of Mental Health
15		(NIMH) will oversee the legislation. The Department of Education will
16		disburse \$15 billion over three years for the hiring and training of
17		qualified therapists sufficient to address the requirements of this
18		legislation.
19		(A) The NIMH shall create and enforce guidelines which define the
20		minimum qualifications for these therapists, as well as the required
21		standard of care.
22	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect within one year from the date of passage. The
23		bill's requirements, and the potential revocation of funding, shall take
24		effect within four years of passage.
25	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Quantum Computer Research Among Civilians to Prevent the Creation of Dangerous Artificial Intelligence

1	BE II ENACIE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All Quantum Computing Research among civilians must cease and be
3		archived and sent to the government.
4	SECTION 2.	Quantum computing is the area of study focused on developing
5		computer technology based on the principles of quantum theory, which
6		explains the nature and behavior of energy and matter on the quantum
7		(atomic and subatomic) level.
8	SECTION 3.	A new bureau called the Bureau of Technology and Digital Weapons will
9		be created to enforce this bill.
.0		A. This bureau will assess Quantum Computing threats as well as
1		regulate bans on dangerous technology.
12		B. This bureau will be allocated 150 million dollars from the Department
13		of Defense to begin government research on Quantum Computing.
L 4		C. The bureau shall be a merge of the technology section of the National
15		Science Foundation (NSF), the National Institute of Standards and
16		Technology (NIST), and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB).
L 7		D. The bureau shall be fully staffed by December 31, 2020.
18	SECTION 4.	All Quantum computing research must seize by December 31, 2020. Any
L9		company or individual who is found conducting Quantum Computer
20		Research will be tried for creating a weapon of mass destruction.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reform Federal Student Loans to Base Repayment on Future Income Equity

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. All Federal Direct Loans to students shall no longer be repaid in terms of the total amount borrowed plus interest. Instead, these loans shall be repaid in the form of equity in the borrower's future income.

SECTION 2. "Equity" shall refer to a set percentage of a borrower's income from all sources over a given time period. All recipients of these loans shall repay them with a fixed percentage (see below) of their total income, from all sources, during the twenty-five (25) years immediately following the departure from their educational institution.

10 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Education shall continue to administer the Direct

11 Loan Program. It shall establish a uniform base rate of repayment based

12 on the average expected earnings of all college graduates during the

13 repayment period (as determined by the Bureau of Labor Statistics) and

14 the average borrower's debt load. This base rate will then be adjusted

15 according to each individual student's specific amount borrowed to

16 determine his or her actual repayment rate.

A. The Internal Revenue Service shall act as the collection arm for these student loans.

19 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall go into effect on January 1^{st} , 2021.

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SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution in Support of a Pacific Defense Treaty

1	WHEREAS,	The United States and her Pacific allies presently lack a formal
2		alliance for mutual defense and diplomatic coordination, such as
3		the U.S. enjoys with NATO in Europe; and
4	WHEREAS,	States in the Pacific Ocean and its surrounding seas face ongoing
5		and escalating threats from aggressive, expansionist nations,
6		including Russia, North Korea, and the People's Republic of China,
7		as well as a host of smaller regional disputes; and
8	WHEREAS,	The United States' recent withdrawal from the Trans-Pacific
9		Partnership and other international agreements has eroded the
10		trust of its allies and diminished its level of diplomatic influence
11		around the world; and
12	WHEREAS,	A formal alliance would provide a structure for more coordinated
13		& effective responses to threats, lend international legitimacy to
14		such responses, and create a structure for dispute resolution
15		within said alliance; now, therefore, be it
16	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here, assembled that the United States supports
17		the creation of a Pacific Defensive Treaty that formalizes ties and
18		institutes a policy of mutual defense, with the original members
19		being The United States of America, Canada, Japan, the Republic
20		of Korea, Taiwan, the Republic of the Philippines, the Republic of
21		Indonesia, Malaysia, Republic of Singapore, the Commonwealth of
22		Australia, and New Zealand.

A Bill to Reform the Immigration Process to Encourage Educated Immigrants

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will increase the budget by 1.2 billion dollars for the
3		U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) and raise the
4		immigration cap by 50,000 people to offer a merit based green card
5		application.
6	SECTION 2.	USCIS will use this funding to streamline the immigration process,
7		modernize its utilities, and increase the amount of applications processed.
8		A merit based green card application will also be offered in addition to
9		those of the status quo.
10	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of US Citizenship and Immigration Services (BCIS), under
11		the Department of Homeland Security will oversee the enforcement of this
12		bill.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be implemented in FY 2021.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ensure Equal Representation of American Territories to Save Democracy

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The American territories of American Samoa, the Northern Mariana
3		Islands, Guam, and the US Virgin Islands shall each be entailed to at least
4		one member in the US House of Representatives.
5	SECTION 2.	(A) The number of Congressional Representatives shall be computed
6		according to the Huntington-Hill method and apportioned based on
7		population size.
8		(B) The number of Representatives is set at five hundred and thirty-
9		seven.
10	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Census Bureau shall oversee the implementation of this
11		legislation.
12	SECTION 4.	This bill shall into effect immediately upon passage.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
