## **A Bill to Regulate Deportation**

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	A. An individual may not be removed or deported to a country if the individual	
3		has never had residency in that country after the age of 12 years.	
4		B. Prior to deportation of any individual from the United States, the	
5		United States Immigration and Citizenship Services (USCIS) must demonstrate	
6		that the individual has knowledge of the language and culture of the country to	
7		which they are being deported.	
8	SECTION 2.	Knowledge of language and culture includes the ability of individuals to act and	
9		converse sufficiently to obtain housing, medical care, food, and assistance in	
10		case of emergency in the country to which they are being deported.	
11	SECTION 3.	The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) through USCIS will make the	
12		necessary changes to the deportation and removal procedures to comply with	
13		Section 1.	
14		A. USCIS must be able to document language proficiency or demonstrate why	
15		they believe the individual has language proficiency.	
16		B. The USCIS does not need to demonstrate the individual has the financial	
17		means to obtain the items listed in Section 2.	
18	SECTION 4.	This law with take effect for all deportations and removals occurring after	
19		January 1, 2021.
