A Bill to Provide Automatic Optional Voter Registration through Certain Government Agencies

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

L	SECTION 1.	Sixteen (16) states and the District of Columbia currently allow
2	legal citizens to	"opt in" to voter registration when applying for services within the $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right$
3	DMV, the Department of Health, or the Office of Children and Family Services. This	
1	bill would mandate that this practice be nationally utilized by 2022.	
5	SECTION 2.	All branches and establishments of the Depts. of Driver Services,
5	Health, and Chi	ldren and Family Services will attach an opt-in ability to all
7	functional forms (refer to Section 7). This system will be available digitally and in	
3	paper form nationwide by 2022.	
)	SECTION 4.	The DMV/DDS, Dept. of Health, and the Office of Children and
10	Family Services must implement this system by 1 January 2022 on all applicable	
11	forms. These vo	oter registration submissions will be submitted digitally through the
12	departments to voter rolls, eradicating the risk of fraud by faulty paper-and-pen	
13	error. A form of	f valid identification, including but not limited to driver's licenses
L4	and other form	s of government IDs, will be presented upon registration.
L5	SECTION 5.	All federal, state, or other laws in conflict with this legislation are
16	hereby declared null and void. This bill protects the voting rights of citizens while	
L7	preventing voter fraud.	
L8	SECTION 6.	Since Oregon became the first state in the nation to implement AVR
L9	in 2016, the Bea	aver State has seen registration rates quadruple at DMV offices. In
20	the first six months after AVR was implemented in Vermont on New Year's Day	
21	2017, registration rates jumped 62 percent when compared to the first half of	
22	2016. The benefits of AVR extend beyond increasing the number of people	
23	registering. The policy keeps voter rolls more accurate by creating a constant	
24	stream of updates between registration agencies and election officials and by	
25	reducing the odds of mistakes caused by processing paper registration forms by	
26	hand. Cleaner rolls reduce errors that cause delays on Election Day and prevent	
27	eligible voters from casting regular ballots. AVR also lowers costs. The transition to	
28	electronic trans	fer allows states to save money on printing, mailing, and data
	entry.
