A Bill to Expand the Availability of Gender-Neutral Bathrooms in Education

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- SECTION 1. All schools built on or after January 20, 2021 are hereby required to make available at least one (1) accessible gender-neutral bathroom to the students and factually of the school.
- SECTION 2. An "accessible gender-neutral bathroom" is defined as a bathroom available without unnecessary burden to anyone without prejudice towards gender identity.
 - **SECTION 3.** A "school" is defined as any place of learning that receives public funding, including but not limited to primary schools, secondary schools, and colleges.
- SECTION 4. Schools built before January 20, 2021 must make available sufficient resources for students and faculty who would otherwise require an accessible gender-neutral bathroom through existing restrooms to the reasonable extent of their ability.
 - **SECTION 5.** The implementation, interpretation, and enforcement of this legislation is to be overseen by the Department of Education.
 - **SECTION 6.** Schools that fail to comply with this legislation risk withdrawal of federal funds, civil liability, and additional enforcement at the discretion of the Department of Education.
- SECTION 7. This legislation will take effect January 20, 2021.

A BILL TO IMPLEMENT ONLINE DATA PROTECTION TO PROTECT CONSUMER PRIVACY

- SECTION 2. Personal data is defined as any data or information that is specific to an individual or can otherwise be used to identify them. Reasonable access is defined as the ability to view all personal data in a concise, readable, and understandable format.
- SECTION 3. This bill will be enforced by the Federal Trade Commission. Violations of this law will be punished with fines up to 2% of an offending organization's yearly revenue per violation.
- SECTION 4. This bill will take effect January 1st, 2020.

- **SECTION 1.** WHEREAS several corporate conglomerates have lobbied against free speech, forced employees to not express certain views, or restricted/altered content in order to fit their narrative, the federal government must take steps in order to ensure the rights guaranteed by the 1st amendment.
- **SECTION 2.** Any entity that creates a platform for social media must allow all viewpoints and content to be discussed and posted about, unless it is a criminal act or presents a danger to others.
- SECTION 3. "Social Media" is here defined as any online platform used for sharing videos, pictures, text, audio, or media of the like in the fashion desired by the private user. "Criminal act" refers to an activity that is blatantly illegal. And an act that would "present a danger" would be a specific threat to a person or organization with details of said attack.
 - **SECTION 4.** In addition to the censorship of posting rights, new protection must be created for what may be searched. No institution may restrict or alter the search results of a user for any purpose. Including targeted ads, politically affiliated searches, or results pertaining to that institution or other institutions.
- **SECTION 5.** Any entity proven to be censoring the content of those using their platforms, either for posting or searching on the internet, shall be fined 50% 20 or more of their total gross revenue for the year. 21
- **SECTION 6.** This bill is effective immediately upon passing. 22

A Bill to Make English the National Language

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1. English shall be made the official language of the U.S. government, the only
3	language that federal employees and officials and members of Congress

- **SECTION 2.** The bill to make English the national language would extend to federal "actions, documents, policies … publications, income tax forms, informational materials," records, proceedings, letters to citizens indeed, to any form of written communication on behalf of the U.S. government.
- **SECTION 3.** Naturalization ceremonies would be specifically restricted to only the English language.

Exceptions to the ban on federal use of other languages would be permitted for purposes that include national security, international trade and diplomacy, public health and safety, criminal proceedings, language teaching, certain handicapped programs, and the preservation of Native American languages.
- SECTION 4. This bill shall be implemented on January 1st, 2021.
