1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

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2	SECTION 1.	All eligible citizens will serve 4 years in the armed forces (Army, Navy, Air
3		Force, Coast Guard, National Guard), active or reserve, when or if they
4		meet the criteria for acceptance as defined by the SSS.
5	SECTION 2.	Eligibility is defined as anyone between the ages of 18 and 28, is a citizen
6		of the United States and does not have a disqualifying disability as
7		defined by each branch or as further defined by the Selective Service Act
8	SECTION 3.	The Department of Defense will oversee the enforcement and
9		implementation of this bill.
10		A. All eligible citizens in the United States that have not completed their
11		mandatory service by the age of 32 will be required to complete 8000
12		hours of community service within 8 years.
13		B. If an eligible citizen fails to complete the required community service
14		within 8 years and still has time to complete, they will serve one day
15		of jail time for every hour they did not complete unless they have
16		completed at least 6999 hours, at which point they will only be
17		imprisoned for their time remaining.

- 18 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect immediately.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Protect the Bears Ears National Park

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The boundaries of the Bears Ears National Park Monument in Utah shall
2		be redrawn to that of its original size and formally established as a
3		national park. All mining companies that have been granted claims to the
4		land by the federal government shall receive severance damages.
5	SECTION 2.	For the purpose of this legislation, "severance damages" shall be defined
6		as monetary compensation for the loss of a portion of land that the
7		government reclaims for public use.
8	SECTION 3.	This bill shall be enacted by the Department of the Interior
9		A. Funding for the severance damages mandated by Section 2 of this
10		legislation shall be derived from the Department of the Interior's Fiscal
11		Year 2021 budget.
12		B. Staffing and maintenance of the park will be the responsibility of the
13		National Park Service.
14	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall go into effect on the 28th of December 2020.
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Resolution to Reintroduce the Bicameral Dignity for Incarcerated Women Act

1	WHEREAS,	Women, particularly those pregnant, are severely disadvantaged and
2		poorly treated in federal prisons and deprived of privacy, access to basic
3		hygiene products, and effective trauma and drug rehabilitation programs;
4		and
5	WHEREAS,	the number of incarcerated women in the United States has increased by
6		19 to 20 percent, along with the number of incarcerated women with
7		children under the age of eighteen (18); and
8	WHEREAS,	current legislation, such as the 2018 First Step Act, ineffectively addresses
9		these issues; and
10	WHEREAS,	this act would seek to further improve the condition of women in the
11		areas of pregnancy and childbirth; postpartum recovery; access to
12		menstrual products and hygiene; etc.; and
13	WHEREAS,	without the re-introduction of this act, recidivism rates amongst women
14		would continue to increase and basic human needs, decency, and rights
15		would go unmet for incarcerated women and their families; now,
16		therefore, be it,
17	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here assembled that the Dignity Act will be enforced for
18		the benefit of incarcerated women, their families, and the community.

A Bill to Legalize Marijuana

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. The use, possession, and distribution of marijuana be legal for those over the age of 21.
 - **A.** Driving while intoxicated is prohibited.
 - **B.** All persons currently incarcerated for the use, possession, and distribution of marijuana will be immediately released and their records expunged.
- **SECTION 2.** "Distribution" being defined as selling with a permit. "Intoxication" being define as higher than 5 nanograms of THC per milliliter of blood.
- of this legislation. Each state will have jurisdiction for creating a department to issue permits to businesses for the purpose of distribution.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented January 1, 2021.

A Bill to Subsidize the Purchase of Consumer Electric Vehicles

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. The United States Federal Government will subsidize 20% of every consumer electric vehicle purchased in order to alleviate some on the fiscal burden of purchasing electric vehicles, while not hurting electric vehicle producers' profits.
- **SECTION 2.** A Consumer Electric Vehicle is an electric vehicle that is purchased by a non-corporate entity for non-corporate purposes.
- SECTION 3. The Department of Treasury, the Department of Transportation, the Department of Energy, and the Environmental Protection Agency will work together to enforce this bill.
 - A. This bill will be funded through a 10% corporate revenue tax on all US
 Gas and Oil Corporations whose annual revenue is above 10 Billion
 USD.
- SECTION 4. The 10% corporate revenue tax will go into effect at the beginning of FY 2021, and the rest of the bill will go into effect at the Beginning of FY 2022.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

7		less than a year are commonly issued punishments for misdemeanors.
8		B. A criminal background check is the process of investigating a person's

10		C. Recidivism refers to a person's relapse into criminal behavior and is
11		measured by criminal acts that result in re-arrest, re-conviction, or return
12		to prison.
13	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Justice will be tasked with overseeing
14		the enforcement of the bill.

A Bill to Provide Free Condoms in all Public High School Nursing Offices

States that have implemented this bill have seen an 84% decrease in teen pregnancies and an 89% decrease in the spread of sexually transmitted diseases among teenagers.
- SECTION 2. This bill should ensure that all public nursing offices in the United States have free accessible condoms to all students.
- SECTION 3. This bill shall be enforced by both The United States Department of Health and Human Services and The United States Department of Education.
 - A. Funding for the bill shall be allocated by the individual State's

 Department of Education
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall be enforced directly upon passage.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government will institute a federal permitting
3		system requiring firearm purchasers nationwide to meet guidelines
4		established by law enforcement and healthcare professionals in order to
5		be certified as being fit to purchase and/or possess firearms.
6	SECTION 2.	Permits are assurances issued by a government authority allowing a
7		licensee to buy, own, possess, or carry a firearm. Permits are specific to
8		firearm types and subtypes established by US criminal justice code §921.
9	SECTION 3.	The Firearm Owner Certification System would be overseen by the
10		Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF).
11		A. Guidelines for certification would be established by the Federal
12		Bureau of Investigation (FBI) with cooperation from the Substance
13		Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and
14		National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS).
15		B. State agencies will create and administer a firearm safety test to
16		certify applicants' knowledge of safe handling procedures.
17	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented by January 1, 2021
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Spring 2020 Item 6: A Resolution to Ban Plastic Water Bottles to Decrease Ocean Pollution

1	WHEREAS,	70% of plastic water bottles bought in the U.S. are not recycled and a
2		majority are ending up in the oceans; and
3	WHEREAS,	Plastic water bottles are the third most commonly collected trash in the
4		ocean; and
5	WHEREAS,	It is estimated by 2050 that there will be more plastic water waste in the
6		ocean than fish; and
7	WHEREAS,	The majority of plastic water bottles are made with polyethylene
8		terephthalate (PET) which is derived from crude oil and natural gas; and
9	WHEREAS,	American consumption of bottled water has increased 65% from 8.3
10		billion gallons in 2006 to 13.7 billion gallons in 2017; and
11	WHEREAS,	A nationwide ban would lead to an estimated 68 billion few plastic water
12		bottles being purchased, used and discarded; and
13	RESOLVED,	By the Congress here assembled that the United States shall ban the sale
14		of disposable plastic water bottles.

Spring 2020 Item 7: A Bill to Lower the Voting Age to Sixteen to Increase Voter Turnout

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2	SECTION 1.	The United States should lower the national voting age to sixteen in order
3		to increase voter turnout for younger voters.
4	SECTION 2.	Though voter turnout for people ages 18 to 29 increased from 20 percent
5		in 2014 to 36 percent in 2018, voter turnout for younger voters remained
6		significantly less than the voter turnout of people ages 50 and older, who
7		saw a turnout of 53.4 percent. Studies show that allowing people to vote
8		at a younger age rather than delaying their ability to vote would have a
9		positive impact on their voting habits overall.
10	SECTION 3.	The bill is to be enacted by Congress with the help of the Federal
11		Elections Commission in order to ensure that all minors who are eligible
12		to vote are aware of the resources available to them.
13		A. Resource awareness would include informing minors of
14		transportation options to and from polls and what information is
15		needed in order to properly register to vote.
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect in June of the year 2020
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Spring 2020 Item 9: A Resolution to Increase Alternative-to-Incarceration Programs for Nonviolent Offenders

1	WHEREAS,	US courts incarcerate citizens at a rate 5 to 10 times higher than other
2		western democracies; and
3	WHEREAS,	The US prison population has risen more than 700% since 1970; and
4	WHEREAS,	Mass incarceration in the US has led to prison overcrowding and the
5		development of a privatized prison industrial complex; and
6	WHEREAS,	Incarceration can impose tremendous impacts on individuals after
7		release that include obstacles to finding employment, securing loans, and
8		obtaining housing; and
9	WHEREAS,	Nonviolent offenders make up more than 90 of the federal prison
10		population and roughly half of the state prison population; and
11	WHEREAS,	The poor and people of color are disproportionately affected by mass
12		incarceration in the United States; now, therefore, be it

- B. "Voter Verifiable Paper Audit Trail" is defined as a voting system which allows voter verification of candidate selections prior to ballot submission and contains a paper backup system which can be manually counted in the event of disputed results or recounts.

SECTION 3. The Department of Homeland Security and Election Assistance Commission shall work in conjunction with state and local electoral commissions in carrying out this legislation.

- A. The Multi-State Information and Analysis Center will be granted \$5 Billion for the purpose of improving inter-state communications regarding cybersecurity and foreign interference in state voting systems.
- B. The Department of Homeland Security will be allocated \$25 Billion and granted responsibility of allocating funds to state and local election commissions to assist implementation of this legislation.
- C. The Election Assistance Commission shall be tasked with the approval of voting machines permitted under this legislation.

SECTION 4. This bill will be implemented immediately upon its passage.

- B. The training is required to take place annually, which shall bedocumented in an annual report to the Department of Labor.
- 15 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect immediately after passage.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
