RESTORE ELECTORAL INTEGRITY ACT

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1.** This bill can also be cited as the REI Act.
- 3 **SECTION 2.** Federal, State, County, and Local governments in the United States and its
- 4 territories are hereby prohibited from using Electronic Voting Ballots during elections.
- 5 **A.** Electronic Voting Ballots shall be defined as a ballot or any other form of voting device that incorporates a computer connected to a network.
- B. A computer shall be defined as an electronic device where data is stored, retrieved, and
 processed. (Merriam-Webster)
- 9 **C.** A network shall be defined as a group of computers sending and retrieving data from each other and outside sources.
- 11 **SECTION 3.** The Federal Electoral Commission shall supply paper ballots as a replacement to
- 12 Electronic Voting Ballots.
- A. Paper ballots shall be defined as a ballot that utilizes a paper as the method of recording avote.
- 15 **B.** The Federal Electoral Commission shall provide the funding for the acquisition of paper16 ballots.
- 17 C. The Department of Justice shall examine the implementation of paper ballots to ensure18 proper distribution.
- 19 **SECTION 4.** The Federal Electoral Commission, the Department of the Treasury, and the
- 20 Department of Justice shall oversee the implementation of this bill.
- 21 **SECTION 5.** This bill shall be implemented sixty (60) days after the passage of this bill.
- **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.

- 10. Limiting the spending of such organizations including Super and regular PACS, Labor Unions, Corporations, and nonprofits to 10\$ million annually; to,
- 11. Remove and or limit the power of said organizations on American elections and politicians.

3		the United States shall earn a minimum of \$12 dollars per hour.
4	SECTION 2:	A. The national minimum wage has not been changed since 2009 and

6		the current minimum in poverty. An increase in minimum would wage
7		would help decrease this income inequality overall.
8		B. The higher minimum wage would reduce the amount spent by the

13	SECTION 3 :	The United States Department of Labor administers and oversees the

17		who earns less than the minimum.
18	SECTION 4:	Employers have until the beginning of the 2021 fiscal year to make sure all
19		of their employees earn at least \$12 dollars an hour.

A BILL TO IMPLEMENT ONLINE DATA PROTECTION TO PROTECT CONSUMER PRIVACY

- **SECTION 4.** This bill will take effect January 1st, 2020.
