LEGISLATION**

A—A Bill to Ban the Action of Intentional Blocking of Traffic to Reduce Pedestrian Physical Risks and Economic Damages

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Intentional blockage or stoppage of vehicular traffic shall be hereby be
3 illegal in all states, territories and municipalities of the United States of
4 America

5 **SECTION 2.** Intentional is the premeditated planning and implementing of blocking
6 roadways. Blockage or stoppage is reducing or interrupting the natural
7 flow of vehicular traffic.

8 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice will oversee the implementation and
9 enforcement of this statute in coordination with state and local law
10 enforcement agencies.

11 A. Current law enforcement funding will be used in the enforcement of
12 the statute.

13 B. Violators of this bill will be charged and face a fine of up to \$1,000
14 and potential for incarceration of no more than 6 months per offense.

15 **SECTION 4.** Bill will go into effect upon successful passage and signing of the
16 President of the United States

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Middleton High School

B—A Bill to Ban Animal Testing to Promote Humane Treatment of Animals

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All animal experimentation will henceforth be made illegal

3 **SECTION 2.** Animal experimentation is defined as any scientific experiment or test
4 performed on a live animal.

5 **SECTION 3.** This bill will be overseen by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection
6 Service.

7 A. Any person or agency found not abiding by this law will be fined
8 10,000 dollars.

9 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented immediately upon passage.

10 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Rocky Mountain High School.

C—Bill to Ban Plastic Straws in the United States

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** In passing this law the production and use of plastic straws will be
3 banned in the United States.

4 **SECTION 2.** Banning means producing and selling straws will be illegal.

5 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. **Environmental** Protection Agency (EPA) would oversee this bill.

6 **SECTION 4.** This Bill will be implemented immediately after passing.

7 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Mountain View High School

D—A Bill to Reform Police Training to Decrease Violent Altercations and Prevent Civilian Deaths

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All federal police training programs shall add training on non-violent de-
3 escalation methods while heavily advising officers against the use of
4 deadly force. Police Training shall also extend to at least two years.

5 **SECTION 2.** Non-violent de-escalation methods are ways of handling potentially
6 dangerous situations without the use of physical harm. The use of deadly
7 force is the use of firearms and/or physical contact that could be
8 considered dangerous for the sake of diffusing a situation.

9 **SECTION 3.** The United States Department of Justice and United States Department
10 of Homeland Security will be responsible for the implementation of this
11 bill.

12 A. Any Law Enforcement Agency that has not implemented non-violent
13 de-escalation training to be required for officers and/or has not
14 extended training curriculums will be penalized up to \$1 million.

15 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect on September 25, 2021.

16 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Timberline High School.

E—A Bill to Require Accurate State Level Redistricting

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All states must comply with the federal constitutional requirements
3 related to population and anti-discrimination. In order to ensure this, all
4 state governments will be required to draw electoral districts that
5 accurately reflect and represent the political views of the American
6 people.

7 **SECTION 2.** Electoral Districts shall be defined as a political division of a county in
8 certain states created for the administration of elections.

9 Redistricting shall be defined as to divide anew into districts, as for
10 administrative or electoral purposes.

11 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Commerce, in cooperation with the U.S. Census
12 Bureau, will oversee the enforcement of this bill along with the specific
13 enforcement mechanism.

14 A. Every year disproportional representation is present in state electoral
15 districts, the state in question shall lose 5% of federal funding in
16 accordance with each violation.

17 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will go into effect immediately on July 1st, 2021.

18 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Skyview High School

F—A Bill to Require Volunteer Service Hours to Graduate from High School

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** This legislation will require students graduating from public high schools
3 in the United States to have completed a minimum of hours of approved
4 community service to graduate.

5 **SECTION 2.** Community service will be defined as acts by individuals or groups giving
6 of their time for no compensation. High school will be defined as 9th-12th,
7 or 10th-12th grades, depending on school composition. Students in a four-
8 year school will be required to complete 200 hours of service and 150
9 hours for a three-year school.

10 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Education, in conjunction with state and local
11 school entities, will be responsible for overseeing the implementation
12 and tracking of hours served to meet graduation requirements.

13 **SECTION 4.** The implementation of this legislation will begin with the 2021-2022
14 school year.

15 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Columbia High School

G—A Bill to Repeal President Trump’s Tax Cuts and Jobs Act

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2. **SECTION 1.** This bill will repeal the tax cuts implemented by President Trump in 2017
3. and will reestablish the previous tax rates to corporations, raising them from the current
4. 21% back to the original 35% circa 2012, or the Obama administration.
5. **SECTION 2.** “Corporations” shall be defined as “a company or group of people
6. authorized to act as a single entity (legally a person) and recognized as such in law.”
7. **SECTION 3.** The Internal Revenue Service shall guarantee this bill’s implementation
8. and will oversee the adjustment of tax rates towards these corporations.
9. **SECTION 4.** This bill shall take effect in the next fiscal year upon its passage into law.
10. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Centennial High School

H—A Bill to Nationalize the Minimum Age a Minor Can Be Tried for Violent Crimes to 16

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** This bill requires that minors who are over the age
3 of 16 who commit violent crimes be tried as adults in a court of
4 law.

5 **SECTION 2.** Violent crimes will be defined as crimes that include:
6 homicide, murder (homicide with intent), voluntary
7 manslaughter assault, sexual assault and rape, armed robbery,
8 kidnapping (abduction), and harassment.

9 **SECTION 3.** This bill will be overseen jointly by the Departments of Justice
10 and Correction.

11 **SECTION 4.** This law will take effect January 1, 2022.

12 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced by Bishop Kelly High School.

I—A Bill to Abolish Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to Promote the Humane Treatment of Immigrants

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** ICE is hereby abolished. All operations currently performed by ICE and its
3 employees will cease, and all ICE detention centers will close.

4 **SECTION 2.** Abolish means to dismantle completely. Cease means to stop entirely.
5 An ICE employee is anyone who is directly employed by ICE or a person
6 who enforces within ICE jurisdiction.

7 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) will oversee the
8 implementation of this bill.

9 A. The DHS shall completely dismantle ICE within one year of passage, or
10 face a \$10 billion cut in discretionary funding.

11 B. All funding currently allotted to ICE will be diverted to the
12 Department of Housing and Urban Development to create low cost
13 housing in appropriate geographical areas for the detainees formerly
14 incarcerated in ICE detention centers.

15 **SECTION 4.** This bill shall be fully implemented within one year of passage, as noted
16 above.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Wood River High School.

J—A Bill to Require a Field Sobriety Test for Every Traffic Misdemeanor and Felony

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** This bill would require a Standardized Field Sobriety Test to be taken on
3 an individual pulled aside after committing a traffic misdemeanor or
4 felony.

5 **SECTION 2.** Sobriety is defined as the state in which an individual is not impaired by a
6 mind-altering substance, excluding a prescribed pharmaceutical drug(s).
7 The Standardized Field Sobriety Test is a nationally recognized cognitive
8 evaluation with three parts.

9 **SECTION 3.** The Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) will oversee the implementation of
10 this bill.

11 A. Anytime an individual is pulled over for a misdemeanor or felony the
12 officer on duty will conduct a field sobriety test.

13 B. Individuals pulled over will have the right to refuse the Field Sobriety
14 Test, however the individual will be subject to possibility of arrest for
15 non-compliance.

16 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect as of March 1st, 2021.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Renaissance High School.

K—A Bill to Protect Civil Rights of All Americans Working at For-Profit Corporations

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** To amend the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993 to protect civil
3 rights and prevents meaningful harm, including dignitary harm, to third
4 parties; ensuring that the act can no longer be invoked to threaten
5 fundamental civil and legal rights, including circumstances with people who
6 do not belong to the religion or adhere to the beliefs of that party. In
7 addition, promote equal opportunity to all employees of For-Profit
8 Corporations to not interfere with an employee’s given medical choices.

9 **SECTION 2.** Fundamental Rights: Rights that prevent abuses that threaten the entire
10 civilization form the pursuit of happiness, prevent unjustified suffering.
11 Unjustified Suffering: to undergo or experience any action, pain, process, or
12 condition that could have been avoided regarding there rights. Religious
13 Freedom Restoration Act of 1993: protects the free exercise of religion and
14 does not authorize an exemption from generally applicable law that imposes
15 the religious views, habits, or practices of one party upon another.

16 **SECTION 3.** U.S. Department of Justice Civil Rights Division will oversee the enforcement
17 of changes of RFRA also keeping companies accountable. A. Amendment
18 logistics will follow the proposed Do Not Harm Act. B. Churches and non-
19 profit religious entities are not analogous to for-profit corporations

20 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect January 1, 2022

21 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Columbia High School

L—A Bill to Ban the Usage of Solitary Confinement Against Prisoners in the United States

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The usage of solitary confinement will be banned within the United
3 States

4 against all prisoners, regardless of status, sentence, crime, or any other
5 factor. This legislation applies to US federal and military prisons.

6 **SECTION 2.** Solitary confinement is defined as the forced placement of a prisoner into
7 a cell intended to be occupied by a single person, where interaction with
8 other inmates, officers, or other human beings is severely restricted, in
9 order to punish a prisoner for wrongdoing. This includes systems in which
10 prisoners are allowed to leave their cell for a short period of time.

11 **SECTION 3.** The Federal Bureau of Prisons and the Department of Homeland Security
12 will jointly oversee the enforcement and implementation of this
13 legislation.

14 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented immediately upon passage.

15 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced by Bishop Kelly High School.

M—A Bill to Require the Maintenance of Recent Burned Areas to Prevent Future Destructive Wildfires

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** This bill would require federal forest lands to be maintained after recent
3 wildfire burn areas. This would include the clean up of deadfall,
4 replanting devastated areas, and increasing the funding towards the U. S.
5 Department of Agriculture to 200 billion dollars.

6 **SECTION 2.** Deadfall is defined as a mangle of dead trees, bushes, and shrubs, which
7 increases the risk of widespread wildfires. Replantation is defined as the
8 natural or intentional restocking of existing forests and woodlands
9 (forestation) that have been depleted, usually through deforestation.

10 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Agriculture will oversee the implementation of
11 this Bill.

12 A. Anytime a forest fire causes widespread damage the Forest Service in
13 each state will receive proper funding to carry out necessary forest
14 maintenance.

15 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented on January 1st, 2021.

16 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Renaissance High School.

N—A Bill to Cease the Production of the U.S. Penny to Lower Contributions to the National Debt and Save Taxpayers Money

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall cease all minting and manufacturing of the penny.

3 **SECTION 2.** Penny shall be defined as the U.S. coin or unit of money worth one cent
4 or one hundredth of a dollar. Minting shall be defined as the making of
5 coins or money out of metal. Manufacture shall be defined as the act or
6 process of producing something.

7 **SECTION 3.** The U.S Department of the Treasury shall oversee the implementation of
8 this bill.

9 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented at the end of the year 2021.

10 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Ridgevue High School.

O—A Resolution to Prioritize Health Professionals Visa to Aid the U.S. COVID-19 Crisis

1 **WHEREAS,** There are not enough medical professionals to help care for patients
2 currently in the U.S.

3 **WHEREAS,** The U.S has experienced a lack of medical professionals. The demand for
4 registered nurses and doctors has increased in demand by 1.1 million.

5 **WHEREAS,** Patients are being sent home because there isn't enough staff to handle
6 non-emergent cases. Retired physicians are being asked to come back to
7 work and medical students are being asked to step up to help.

8 **WHEREAS,** Speeding up the process for foreign health professionals would help
9 improve the quality of care for patients. There would be more staff to
10 handle all incoming patients and take away some of the stress on the
11 clinics.

12 **RESOLVED,** That the Congress here assembled should prioritize foreign health
13 Professional's visas to help the shortage of staff the hospitals are
14 currently facing, and potentially better the crisis

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Mountain Home High School

P—A Bill to Remove Statewide Exceptions to the Legal Drinking Age

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All states prohibit providing alcohol to persons under 21 with no
3 exceptions to family under federal law.

4 **SECTION 2.** By removing any and all exceptions to the legal drinking age this bill not
5 only promotes the safety of youth in this country but also acts as a
6 preventative measure toward addiction. The younger you are the more
7 vulnerable you are towards creating negative habits or addictions. You
8 can also stunt brain development and could affect the rest of your life,
9 and the lives of those around you.

10 **SECTION 3.** The departments of justice and health and human services will oversee
11 the enforcement of this bill.

12 A. Repercussions for underage drinking will remain the same.

13 B. If in the present of a parental figure or family member while
14 participating in underage drinking, it's considered the family
15 member/parental figure's fault.

16 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be active immediately.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Timberline High School.

Q—A Bill to Establish State-Subsidized Parental Leave

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Each state government will be required to provide at least 12 weeks of
3 paid parental leave.

4 **SECTION 2.** Parental leave is the period when a parent takes time off from work
5 during or after having a baby.

6 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Labor will oversee the implementation of this bill.

7 a. Those on parental leave will receive 70% of their average pay

8 b. Necessary funds will be reallocated from the Department of

9 Defense as needed.

10 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented on January 1st, 2021

11 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Borah High School.

R—A Bill to End the Practice of Disenfranchisement in the United States

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2. **SECTION 1.** This bill will restore all voting rights to American citizens who have been
3. disenfranchised due to their criminal history or current incarceration status. All
4. American citizens of age 18 or older will have an unalienable right to vote.
5. All prisoners and other disenfranchised American citizens will be ensured convenient
6. and private voting access through in person ballots delivered to their respective
7. detention facility.
8. **SECTION 2.** Disenfranchisement is to be defined as revoking the right to vote from an
9. American who previously would have been eligible for such right.
10. **SECTION 3.** The Federal Election Commission will oversee the enforcement and
11. implementation of this bill.
12. All funds to implement the bill will be allocated from the Federal Election Commission.
13. Any person that attempts to revoke this right will be subject to a minimum of 10 years in
14. prison.
15. **SECTION 4.** Effective immediately once passed.
16. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Emmett High School.

S—A Resolution to Recognize the Official National Age of Adulthood as Eighteen

- 1 **WHEREAS,** the status quo does not apply the rights and privileges of citizens
2 uniformly throughout the states; and
- 3 **WHEREAS,** the status quo restricts the rights of individuals above the age of eighteen
4 in regards to allowing for the purchasing of various products and
5 providing of certain services; and
- 6 **WHEREAS,** society holds the traditional view that eighteen is the threshold with
7 which we recognize citizens as adults; and
- 8 **WHEREAS,** we hold eighteen year olds to expectation and legal requirements of
9 adulthood, such as: being tried in the judicial system as an adult, voting,
10 ability to marry without consent, registering for selective service, etc..;
11 and
- 12 **WHEREAS,** these actions could be interpreted to be in violation of citizen’s
13 Constitutional Rights; now, therefore, be it
- 14 **RESOLVED,** By the Congress here assembled that the official age of adulthood in the
15 United States of America is eighteen years and that no private or public
16 entity should discriminate and/or refuse services or products based solely
17 on age once a citizen reaches eighteen.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Middleton High School

T—A Bill to Enact a Federal Mask Mandate to Control the Spread of COVID-19

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** A solid cloth or medical face-covering mandate is hereby imposed on all
3 people in public places of all the states and territories where the
4 Congress here assembled has jurisdiction, with reasonable exception.
5 Fines for individuals violating this mandate shall be \$150 when social
6 distancing is possible and \$500 when it is not.

7 **SECTION 2.** Reasonable exception shall be defined as a medical exception with a
8 doctor's note, whilst eating or drinking, or a pre-existing exception for
9 persons with mental extenuating circumstances (504 or IEP for
10 schoolchildren). Social distancing is when every person can be at least six
11 feet apart from one another. Public spaces shall include any place that is
12 not a private residence (police departments, schools, daycare centers,
13 malls, etc.) No exception shall be made for law enforcement.

14 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice shall oversee the implementation of this bill
15 through local police departments.

16 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented immediately upon passage.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Wood River High School.

U—A Bill to Decriminalize Psilocybin

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Section 811 of title 21, United States Code, Controlled Substances Act,
3 shall be amended by including an exemption for the decriminalization of
4 psilocybin mushrooms to state, “All mushrooms classified as psilocybin
5 can be carried if the amount is 2.5 grams or less without law enforcement
6 intervention in the United States of America.”

7 **SECTION 2.** Psilocybin mushrooms are mushrooms that are an informal group of
8 fungi which contain psilocybin and psilocin, which cause hallucinations.
9 Psilocybin Mushrooms are commonly referred to as magic mushrooms.

10 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice will oversee the implementation of this bill.

11 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented on January 1st, 2021

12 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Introduced for Congressional Debate by Borah High School.

V—A Bill to Provide Infrastructure Aid to The Republic of Malawi

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States will provide infrastructure aid to the Republic of
3 Malawi.

4 **SECTION 2.** A. Infrastructure aid shall be defined as a sum of money directed toward
5 infrastructure, sent in the form of developmental and humanitarian aid.

6 B. Infrastructure shall be defined as the basic physical and organizational
7 structures needed for the operation of society— for instance,
8 transportation systems, communication networks, law enforcement,
9 sewage, water, and electric systems.

10 **SECTION 3.** This shall be overseen by the United States Agency for International
11 Development (USAID) and the United States Treasury Department.

12 A. \$550 million dollars will be allocated from Egyptian military aid to
13 fund this bill.

14 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will be implemented at the end of the fiscal year 2023.

15 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

SUPER CONGRESS LEGISLATION

AA—A Bill to Amend the Violence Against Women Act to Include Comprehensive Care to Sexual Assault Victims at No Cost

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All victims of sexual assault will have the ability to receive comprehensive
3 care including but not limited to: a forensic sexual assault examination,
4 STD testing and treatment, pregnancy testing and emergency
5 contraception, medical treatment for any injuries experienced during
6 assault, mental health services, and reimbursement for any time off work
7 to receive care.

8 **SECTION 2.** This bill will only modify the Violence Against Women Act so that the
9 level of free care victims qualify is comprehensive and standardized
10 across states.

11 **SECTION 3.** Provision of comprehensive care will be ensured by the Office on
12 Violence Against Women through the Department of Justice.

13 A. Access to care at no cost to victims will not be dependent upon a
14 victim's cooperation with law enforcement in a criminal investigation
15 or otherwise.

16 B. Failure to comply will result in loss of grants from the Department of
17 Justice and fines of \$5,000 for each instance of non-compliance.

18 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be fully implemented a year after its passage.

19 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

BB—A Bill to Implement Mental Health Awareness into Law Enforcement Training

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Mental health Crisis Intervention Training shall be included in standard
3 police training prior to any individual serving on duty in a law enforcement
4 capacity in any state.

5 **SECTION 2.** Law enforcement is the department of people who interact with the public
6 to enforce laws, investigate crimes, and make arrests. Crisis Intervention
7 Training (CIT) is a specialized police curriculum that aims to reduce the risk
8 of serious injury or death during an emergency interaction between persons
9 with mental illness and law enforcement by way of mental health education
10 and training.

11 **SECTION 3.** The attorneys general of each state shall oversee the implementation and
12 enforcement of this legislation.

13 **A.** The officers shall be educated and trained by a licensed psychologist,
14 psychiatrist, or other appropriate professional with a masters or
15 doctorate level degree in the field of mental health.

16 **B.** The CIT program must meet a national standard set by the U.S.
17 Department of Health and Human Services.

18 **C.** The cost of this training shall come from the law enforcement budget of
19 each respective city, county, or state.

20 **SECTION 4.** This law will take effect January 1, 2022.

21 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

DD—A Bill to Terminate Parental Rights After First Declaration of a Child

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** After the first offense against a parent(s) and the child is declared, the
3 parent's right will be terminated.

4 **SECTION 2.** Declaration of a child is defined as a child becoming a ward of the state.

5 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Health and Human Services will oversee the
6 enforcement of this legislation.

7 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall go into effect immediately upon passage

8 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

EE—A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Guarantee Access to the Internet as a Fundamental Right

1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2. **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article
3. is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be
4. valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the
5. legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its
6. submission by the Congress:
7. **ARTICLE –**
- 8.
9. **SECTION 1.** All natural born and naturalized citizens of the United States of America
10. i. shall be guaranteed access to the internet as a right of citizenship.
11. **SECTION 2.** The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate
12. legislation.

FF—A Bill to Test Covid-19 Vaccines on Prisoners Sentenced to Death

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Prisoners on death row will be used as test subject for potential vaccine
3 development for Covid-19.

4 **SECTION 2.** Sentenced to death is any person who has been found guilty of a crime so
5 severe that they have been sentenced to be put to death.

6 **SECTION 3.** The Federal Bureau of Prisons and The Centers for Disease Control will
7 oversee the enforcement and implementation of this policy.

8 A. If a prisoner is medically confirmed to be at higher risk of
9 complication due to vaccine testing, they will not be required to
10 participate unless by volunteer.

11 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will be enacted upon passage.

12 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

GG—A Bill to Require Evidence-Based, Factual and Comprehensive Sex Education in all 50 states and Territories

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** This bill will mandate the creation of a nonelective sex education class
3 that all students attending public high school will be required to attend.
4 The class must be research and science driven.

5 **SECTION 2.** Standards for the class will be driven by scientific research.

6 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Education will oversee and enforce the bill along with
7 state and district school boards.

8 A. If schools or districts fail to meet the standards, they will be issued a
9 warning and given one year to meet the standards. Schools who have
10 been issued a warning must submit a plan for implementation to the
11 state board of education.

12 B. If a school does not meet the standards outlined by the end of the
13 “warning” year the state must intervene and help the school to
14 implement the new standards. Schools could face loss of federal
15 funding.

16 **SECTION 4.** This bill will take effect on August 1, 2023.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
