A Bill to Increase University Accountability for Student Debt

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	ARTICLE I.	University eligibility for the Guaranteed Student Loan Program shall be

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Abolish Excessive Solitary Confinement

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds	s of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is

4		ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within
