A Bill to De-Criminalize and Control Distribution of Illegal Drugs BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

Section 1. Possession of any currently scheduled drug will be de-criminalized.

A. The US Federal Government will tax, regulate and control the distribution of currently scheduled drugs similar to tobacco and alcohol in the United States working with its state partners and private enterprise.

B. Possession of any scheduled drugs without both federal and state tax stamps or possession in non-approved government containers will be subjected to arrest and a penalty not to exceed a one-year jail sentence for illegal distribution and a cash penalty equal to the amount of likely value of illegally distributed drugs. Possession of scheduled drugs by minors without a prescription will result in mandatory drug rehab.

Section 2. Anyone convicted under the provisions listed above is also **Section 3**. Regulation of scheduled drugs is through the FDA with enforcement through the Department of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms.

Section 4. This shall take effect on January 1, 2023

Section 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Provide Aid to the Kurdish People

1	BE II ENACTE	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will allocate 450 million United States dollars in military
3		aid to Kurdish forces in order to protect their people from external
4		threats.
5	SECTION 2.	A. "Military Aid" shall be defined as funding allocated strictly for the
6		purposes of providing resources such as food, water, clothing, and
7		ammunition for the purposes of the Kurdish defense of their homeland.
8		B. "External Threats" currently acting against the Kurdish people
9		include the Turkish government and the Islamic State (ISIS); these may be

17		B. The DOD and USAID will be responsible for the delivery of aid
18		and the regulation of the Kurds' use of the aid, including what
19		causes may be considered threats to the Kurdish people.
20	SECTION 4.	This bill shall take effect immediately after its passage.

A Bill to Establish a Wealth Tax on the Very Rich

7		steps being taken to reunite the customer with the bag. If unable to	
8		reach the customer within 72 hours, the bag must be returned to its	
9		point of origin and held for a minimum of 1 week.	
10	Article II:	(A) Day refers to the time from when the time the airport opens to the	
11		conclusion of the baggage claim process for the last flight from that
