FEC Finds Massive Voter Suppression and Election Fraud Weeks Ahead of 2020 Presidential Election

October 26, 2020

WASHINGTON -- At its general meeting today, the Federal Election Commission reviewed cases of voter suppression and election fraud as it pertains to the 2020 Presidential Election.

As of October 26, 2020, the cases include but are not limited to:

Voter Suppression

- Over 500,000 inconsistencies discovered between paper ballots and electronic ballots;
- Over 600,000 ballots unaccounted for as a result of fraudulent ballot drop-off boxes;

Election Fraud

- Over 20,000 fraudulent ballots being successfully cast in one state alone;
- 3 states have reported individuals with unauthorized access entering servers containing ballot information.

The FEC seeks public comment on these findings from the White House and Members of Congress.

The Federal Election Commission (FEC) is an independent regulatory agency that administers and enforces federal campaign finance laws. The FEC has jurisdiction over the financing of campaigns for the U.S. House of Representatives, the U.S. Senate, the Presidency and the Vice Presidency. Established in 1975, the FEC is composed of six Commissioners who are nominated by the President and confirmed by the U.S. Senate.
