# A Bill to reduce beverage container waste with can redemption programs

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. All states will implement a Can Redemption Program.
- SECTION 2. A Can Redemption Program is defined as a program where retailers charge customers a deposit per can or bottle that can be recouped by returning the container to a designated center.
- **SECTION 3.** The EPA will enforce and regulate this bill.
  - A. States must implement their own can and bottle redemption program or risk losing up to 15% of their federal highway funding.
  - B. Redemption programs must cover beverage containers including any plastic, glass, bimetal, or aluminium beverage containers (not including kegs or any similar devices), no larger than 5 gallons.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2023.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill for the State of Iowa to prohibit the production and sale of Vape Products

# A Bill to Give Puerto Rico Statehood

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. If a majority of Puerto Rico voters so choose, Puerto Rico will become a full member state.
- **SECTION 2**. A full member state is on equal footing with all other US states in such matters as sending legislators to congress.
- SECTION 3. During the 2024 election the Puerto Rico ballot will include the question, "Do you approve of Puerto Rico's admission as a State of the Union?"
  - A. If the result shows a 60% majority approval, then Puerto Rico will submit the results to the President, Senate, and House of Representatives. At which point the president will declare Puerto Rico a full State of the Union.
  - B. If the 60% majority of votes show disapproval this bill will immediately cease to be in effect.
- **SECTION 4.** The vote will occur during their 2024 election. Statehood will be effective as soon as results are certified and confirmed by the federal government.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# The Preclearance Over Liable Legislation (POLL) act of 2021

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 (preclearance for select voting rights
2		legislation) shall be expanded and standardized under updated guidelines.
3	SECTION 2.	Preclearance shall be defined as "The act of freezing changes in election practices
4		or procedures in covered jurisdictions until the new procedures have been
5		determined, either after administrative review by the Attorney General, or after a
6		lawsuit before the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, to have
7		neither discriminatory purpose or effect".
8	SECTION 3.	The following election policy legislation shall be subject to automatic preclearance
9		a. Election policy legislation that originates from a state government with
10		over one half of its counties having a voter turnout rate less than 72
11		percent in the previous presidential election.
12		b. Election policy legislation that originates from a state government with a
13		statewide voter turnout of less than 67 percent in the previous
14		presidential election.
15		c. Election policy legislation from states selected by 60 percent of the US
16		Senate as being "high risk" for voting rights violations.
17	SECTION 4.	50 Million dollars shall be allocated to the US Department of Justice for resources
18		to ramp up preclearance efforts. This money shall come from the United States
19		Department of Defense budget.
20	SECTION 5.	The US Department of Justice, the US District Court for the District of Columbia,
21		and the United States Attorney General shall jointly oversee the implementation
22		of this legislation.
23	SECTION 6.	This legislation shall be implemented on July 1 2022.
24	SECTION 7.	All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.

# A Bill to End Anti-Mask Policies

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	No privately-owned business may institute or enforce a policy prohibiting its employees,
3		customers, or anyone else legitimately on its premises from wearing a face mask.
4	SECTION 2.	Any violation of this legislation shall be viewed as reckless endangerment and prosecuted
5		accordingly based on the relevant portions of the penal code in the jurisdiction where the
6		crime occurs. Either the entire business or individual employee(s) may be held culpable,
7		depending on the circumstances.
8	SECTION 3.	An employee, customer, or anyone else legitimately on the premises of a business who
9		demonstrably contracts COVID-19 as a result of a proven violation of this law shall be
10		eligible to have compensatory damages awarded in an amount equal to his or her relevant
11		medical expenses and paid by the defendant.
12	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be jointly overseen by local law enforcement and the Occupational
13		Safety and Health Administration.
14	SECTION 5.	This legislation shall take effect immediately.

**SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



# A Bill to Promote Resettlement of Haitian Refugees in Canada

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1.	\$500 million of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement budget shall be allocated to
3		provide transportation from the southern U.S. border onward to Canada for Haitian
4		refugees fleeing the crisis brought about by the August 2021 earthquake as well as Tropical
5		Storm Grace. These funds may also be used to provide food, lodging, medical care, and
6		legal support for these refugees as they attempt to immigrate to Canada.
7	SECTION 2.	As long as funding remains, Haitian refugees who opt not to attempt to continue on to
8		Canada shall be deported back to Haiti.
9	SECTION 3.	An additional \$500 million in federal aid shall be given to Canada to assist with
10		resettlement of these refugees.
11	SECTION 4.	All of these funds shall be renewed annually until the United Nations no longer considers
12		Haiti to be in crisis or until three years have passed, whichever comes first.

- SECTION 5. Section 1 and 2 of this legislation shall be overseen by U.S. Immigration and Customs

  Enforcement. Section 3 of this legislation shall be overseen by the Department of State.
- **SECTION 6.** This legislation shall take effect immediately upon passage.
- **SECTION 7.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



# **A Bill to Standardize National Drug Laws**

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2 **SECTION 1.** All federal highway funding shall be revoked from any state with drug legislation that
- 3 contradicts federal drug policy as expressed in the Controlled Substances Act (H.R. 18583)
- and its subsequent amendments.
- 5 **SECTION 2.** Any withheld highway funding shall be redirected into the Drug Abuse Resistance
- 6 Education (DARE) campaign.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** This legislation shall be jointly overseen by the Drug Enforcement Administration and the
- 8 Federal Highway Administration.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2022.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.



# A Resolution to Discourage Trick-or-Treating

1	WHEREAS	children ages twelve and under, who make up the overwhelming majority of Halloween
2		trick-or-treaters, remain ineligible for vaccination against COVID-19; and
3	WHEREAS	the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention continue to discourage unnecessary
4		gathering in crowded settings, especially among the unvaccinated, as a result of the
5		ongoing COVID-19 pandemic; and
6	WHEREAS	the practice of trick-or-treating comes with and can lead to a variety of other health risks
7		even during normal times; now, therefore be it
8	RESOLVED	by the Congress here assembled that municipal corporations throughout the nation,
9		especially cities and those that are more densely populated, are strongly encouraged to
10		ban the practice of trick-or-treating on and around October 31 (Halloween) of this year
11		(2021) and are further encouraged to ban or set parameters on trick-or-treating in all
12		subsequent years to mitigate its negative health impacts.

# A Bill to Criminalize the use of Chemical Castration in the Criminal Justice System

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- 2. SECTION 1: The practice of utilizing chemical castration (here being defined as the use
- 3. of anaphrodisiac drugs for the purposes of inhibiting primary sex characteristics) as a
- 4. means of either parole or punishment is to be made a class B felony under federal law.
- SECTION 2: Commissioning the use of chemical castration for the criminal justice
- 6. purposes outlined above will be made a class B felony under federal law.
- 7. SECTION 3: Any institutions within the criminal justice system found to be engaged in
- 8. the practice of retributive castration after the passage of this legislation will have all
- 9. federal funding revoked after three months, unless a complete report detailing who was
- 10. responsible for the authorization of the procedure is made, and those who are
- 11. implicated in the report are to be terminated and are barred from rehire.
- 12. SECTION 4: The Department of Justice and Bureau of Prisons shall be responsible for
- 13. the enforcement of this legislation.
- 14. SECTION 5: This legislation shall go into effect on June 1, 2022.
- 15. SECTION 6: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
