

The I.O.N. Act

A Bill Mandating Preschool and Kindergarten to be required as Part of the United States Public Education System

	BE IT ENACTED BY TH	E CONGRESS HEDE	ACCEMBLED THAT.
-	UL II LINACIED DI IT	L COMPAKENT HERE	AZZEMIRI ED THAT.

2	SECTION 1.	Upon passage of this bill, preschool and kindergarten will be required as
3		part of the United States Public Education system. In order to graduate
4		high school, students will be required to complete one year of preschool
5		and one year of kindergarten prior to completing first through twelfth
6		grade. Kids who have surpassed preschool or kindergarten age will not be
7		affected by this legislation.
8	SECTION 2.	Preschool will be defined as a school or class for children to attend before
9		they go to kindergarten. Kindergarten will be defined as a school or class
10		that teaches children typically between the ages of five to six.
11	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Education will Oversee the enforcement of the
12		bill.
13		A. States that do not comply with the bill will be penalized 7% of their
14		federally granted school funding.
15		B. The funding will be appropriated from the Department of Defense.
16		C. Schools will be receiving a 7% increase of their federal funding.
1.7	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect in the 2024 school year.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Abolish Capital Punishment

1	BE IT I	ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Capital Punishment shall be prohibited from being imposed as
3		punishment for any violation of the law.
4	SECTION 2.	Capital Punishment shall be defined as a state-sanctioned practice of
5		killing a person as a punishment for a crime, including but not limited to
6		lethal injection, electrocution, hanging, decapitation, gassing, shooting,
7		and stoning.
8	SECTION 3.	The Department of Justice shall oversee the implementation of this bill.
9		A. Anyone sentenced to Capital Punishment before
10		implementation of this bill shall not be pardoned.
11	SECTION 4.	Implementation of this bill will take effect on January 1, 2023
12	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Amend the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Title 1 § 10121 of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 will be amended
3		to include provisions for transportation and development of dry cask
4		storage for spent nuclear fuel.
5	SECTION 2.	Dry Cask Storage: A growing alternative method to storing spent nuclear
6		fuel above ground at independent storage facilities instead of in on-site
7		pools.
8	SECTION 3.	a. This Congress will make the recommendation to the Secretary of
9		Energy to fund the construction of additional independent dry cask
10		storage facilities to expand the United States storage capacity to meet
11		future demand.
12		b. This Congress will make a recommendation to the Secretary of Energy
13		to allow independent contractors to bid for licenses to construct dry
14		storage casks.
15		c. This Congress will make the recommendation to the Secretary of
16		Energy to transport nuclear waste from current pool storage facilities to
17		new dry cask facilities.
18		d. The Secretary of Energy will be granted the ability to transport
19		nuclear waste and/or fuel across state lines given that:
20		i. the final destination is within a state that allows the importation
21		of nuclear waste
22		ii. the fuel stays no longer than ten days within a given state until
23		it reaches its destination.
24		e. For every day over the ten-day maximum, the Department of Energy
25		will be fined a sum of fifty thousand dollars to be distributed to the state
26		government.
27	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect at the beginning of the 2024 fiscal year.
8.	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Eliminate the Tax Cap to Save Social Security

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The Social Security Payroll Tax Cap shall be eliminated, ensuring that all
3		income above the cap shall be taxed at the current rate of 6.2%, for both
4		employers and employees. Social Security benefits for retirees shall
5		remain capped at current levels.
6	SECTION 2.	The Social Security Payroll Tax Cap shall be defined as the existing cap of
7		\$142,800 for 2021 for Social Security FICA taxes. Although FICA taxes
8		shall no longer be capped, eligible income for Social Security benefits
9		shall be capped at \$142,800 annually, indexed to wage increases over
10		time.
11	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service shall be responsible for the implementation
12		of this legislation. The additional revenues generated by this legislation
13		shall be earmarked exclusively to the Social Security Administration Trust.
14	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall go into effect on January 1, 2023.
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ensure the Right to Travel by Common Carrier

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2	SECTION 1.	All persons shall have the right to travel by common carrier. No persons
3		not under lawful arrest may be denied or refused transportation by air,
4		rail, road, or water by a common carrier, except on the basis of (1) failure
5		to pay the fare or comply with the rules of the fare; (2) failure or refusal
6		to submit to an administrative search, if required by applicable Federal
7		law or regulation, which shall be limited to a search for weapons,
8		explosives, or incendiary devices likely to pose a threat to the safety of
9		the conveyance, passengers, or crew; or(3) an order from a court of
10		competent jurisdiction.
11	SECTION 2.	A common carrier is a person or a commercial enterprise that transports
12		passengers or goods for a fee and establishes that their service is open to
13		the general public.
14	SECTION 3.	A common carrier, person, or Federal agency that denies or refuses
L 5		transportation by common carrier except as outlined in Section 2 shall be
16		liable to damages up to \$10,000 as determined in civil court.
L 7	SECTION 4.	This law will go into effect 90 days after passage.
.8	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Establish the State of Jefferson to Provide Greater Representation in the West Coast

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 SECTION 1. The 51st State of the United States of America shall be formed from the 3 Jurisdiction of the State of California. The Jurisdiction shall consist of 25 Northern 4 California Counties. This new State shall be dubbed the State of Jefferson. All members 5 of California's State Legislature that represent the Counties involved in the formation of 6 Jefferson shall draft a State Constitution that must be submitted and approved by 7 Congress. SECTION 2. 8 The Counties involved shall be Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, Del Norte, El 9 Dorado, Glenn, Humboldt, Lake, Lassen, Mariposa, Mendocino, Modoc, Nevada, Placer, 10 Plumas, Sierra, Shasta, Siskiyou, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Trinity, Tuolmne, and Yuba. 11 SECTION 3. Congress shall oversee the implementation of this bill. 12 Upon passage of this bill, it will be submitted to the California State Legislature A. 13 for approval in accordance with Article IV, Section 3 of the Constitution. This bill 14 must be the first policy addressed upon their next Legislative session. Until the State of Jefferson's Constitution has been approved by Congress, the 16 15 В. 16 Counties involved shall remain subject to the State of California. 17 SECTION 4. This bill will go into effect one year after its passing by California. 18 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. A Bill to Exclude Pre-Owned Good from Sales Tax

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
- SECTION 1. Those subject to Sales Tax in the United States and its territories will no longer pay sales tax on pre-owned items.
- 4 **SECTION 2.** Pre-owned items shall be defined as: Any goods produced internationally
- or domestically that have already had sales tax paid on them, examples
- include but are not limited to used cars, second-hand clothing, used
- 7 items sold on resell sites such as eBay, etc. Sales tax shall be defined as '
- any tax paid to the government for the sale of a good.
- 9 **SECTION 3.** The US tax code will be thus amended and enforced by the Internal
- 10 Revenue Service (IRS).
- 11 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect at the start of the 2022 fiscal year.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize Vigilante's Involvement in Crime

1	DE II LIVACI	ED BY THE COMPRESS HERE YSSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All law enforcement agencies and States in whole will allow able bodied
3		and trained vigilantes in the involvement of dealing with crimes. These
4		vigilantes will work hand in hand with law enforcement and trade
5		information and services between the two.
6	SECTION 2.	Only vigilantes who are able to protect their own lives while helping and
7		assisting the lives around them and can provide adequate help to the
8		crimes and situations they are assisting in may provide help. Each city wil
9		have a capped number of vigilantes allowed at a time based on
10		population size. Vigilante's must be aware that their actions will be
11		judged on their results, if said vigilante saves the majority of people and
12		property with limited collateral damage their help to situations is
13		accepted.
14	SECTION 3.	Both Homeland Security and Department of Defense will oversee in State
15		and local law enforcement vigilantes.
16		A. Both departments will receive adequate funding to pass to state law
17		enforcement and local law enforcement agencies.
18		B. Will receive detailed lists of known vigilantes and crimes they've been
19		involved in yearly from said state and law enforcement agencies.
20	SECTION 4.	This bill will be put into effect imediently.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Outlaw Confiscation of Students' Personal Property

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
2	SECTION 1. The confiscation of students' personal property, excluding illegal drugs
3	and items that pose a physical threat to anyone, shall be banned.
4	SECTION 2. No authority figures in a school setting, such as Principals,
5	Headmasters, Professors, teachers, etc. will be permitted to confiscate a
6	student's personal belongings, including cell phones or other physical
7	property, in any situation or circumstance that doesn't directly harm any
8	person.
9	SECTION 3. Funding for this bill will be taken from the U.S. Department of Education
10	budget.
11	SECTION 4. This bill will be monitored by the U.S. Department of education and enforced by
12	Special Jurisdiction Police agencies. Fines will be determined by these agencies
13	based on the severity of the situation, conditional to laws in place to protect the civil
14	rights of students.
15	SECTION 5. This legislation will take effect at the beginning in August of 2022.
16	SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill To prohibit public housing agencies from imposing breed restrictions on household pets

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. No public house agency may prohibit the ownership of common
- household pets on the basis of breed alone.
- 4 SECTION 2. Common household pets are understood as domesticated animals, such
- as a dog, cat, bird, rodent (including a rabbit), fish, or turtle, that is
- traditionally kept in the home for pleasure rather than for commercial
- purposes. Common household pet does not include reptiles (except
- 8 turtles).
- 9 **SECTION 3.** The US Department of Housing and Urban Development shall be
- responsible for the enforcement of this bill.
- 11 **SECTION 4.** This law will go into effect 90 days after passage.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Protect Ownership of NFTs

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Screenshotting or otherwise downloading another person's Non-Fungible
- Token (NFT) or its likeness without the owner's permission will be
- 4 prohibited.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. A non-fungible token (NFT) is an idiosyncratic and non-interchangeable
- 6 unit of data stored on a digital ledger. NFTs can be associated with
- reproducible items such as photos, videos, 3D models, audio, and other
- 8 types of digital files as unique items.
- 9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice and Copyright Office will have authority to
- enforce this legislation. Each instance in which this legislation is violated
- will result in a fine of up to \$10,000.
- SECTION 4. This legislation will go into effect on June 2nd, 2023
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reallocate Funds from CBP to Improve the Livelihood of Immigrants in Detention

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	5 billion dollars of the current Department of Customs and Border
3		Patrol's 23.1-billion-dollar budget will be reallocated to immigration
4		detention centers specifically for the purpose of improving the standard
5		of living in United States immigration detention centers.
6	SECTION 2.	
7	a.	An immigration detention center will be defined as an institution where
8		individuals are held for a period time, specifically immigrants from
9		another country, who are awaiting trial, approval of refugee status,
10		and/or further processing in order to become future American citizens.
11	b.	Medical care will be defined as the maintenance or improvement of
12		health via the prevention, diagnosis, treatment, recovery of illness, injury,
13		and other physical impairments in people.
14	C.	Proper hygiene will be defined as conditions and practices that help to
15		maintain health and prevent the spread of diseases.
16	d.	Materials of warmth are to be defined or considered as an object that
17		provides heat for a person in a time of cold and/or situations of lowering
18		body temperatures.
19	SECTION 3.	
20	a.	The 5 billion dollars will increase the standard of living by providing
21		medical care when needed, proper hygiene, any materials needed for
22		warmth and finally any expansion needed for overpopulated centers.

24	b.	The Department of Customs and Border Patrol will oversee the
25		implementation of this legislation.
26	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect at the beginning of the 2024 fiscal year.
27	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Adopt a No First Use Policy

1	BE IT E	NACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:				
2	WHEREAS,	the framers of the Constitution understood that the monumental				
3		decision to go to war, which can result in massive death and the				
4		destruction of civilized society, must be made by the				
5		representatives of the people and not by a single person.				
6	WHEREAS,	as stated within the War Powers Resolution, the President of the				
7		United States as the commander in chief has the constitutional				
8		power to engage in military activities only pursuant to (1) a				
9		declaration of war, (2) specific statutory authorization, or (3) a				
10		national emergency created by an attack upon the United States.				
11	WHEREAS,	a "first-use nuclear strike" means an attack using nuclear weapons				
12		against an enemy that is conducted without an enemy having first				
13		launched a nuclear strike against the United States or an ally of				
14		the United States, in which case, a United States strike would				
15		result in the escalation of conflict.				
16	WHEREAS,	nuclear weapons are uniquely powerful weapons that have the				
17		capability to kill millions of people instantly, create long-term				
18		health and environmental consequences, directly undermine				
19		global peace, and put the United States at existential risk from				
20		retaliatory nuclear strikes.				
21	RESOLVED	The President may not use the Armed Forces of the United States				
22		to conduct a first-use nuclear strike.

1	WHEREAS,	A threat of an invasion into Ukrainian territory looms; and
2	WHEREAS,	A Russian invasion may spark an undesirable international armed conflict;

4	WHEREAS,	Ukraine stands as a strategical asset for Russia, and Russia's sudden
5		aggression against this struggling democracy serves as a cause for alarm;
6		and
7	WHEREAS,	Ukraine wishes to join the European Union, and sever from Russian ties;
8		now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled make the following recommendation
10		for the initiation of diplomatic talks with Ukrainian leadership in hopes of
11		negotiating a supportive deal; and
12	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That all options of support be considered, up to and including
13		military support.

A Resolution to Limit Access to Energy Drinks by Students in the Secondary School System

- WHEREAS, the market for energy drinks has been steadily rising in the United States,

- 4 consumed in large quantities as well as long-term health effects, and
- 6 WHEREAS, student performance in the classroom and in school related activities can
- 7 be impacted by the consumption of energy drinks, and
- 8 **WHEREAS**, students who consume energy drinks have short bursts of energy energy followed by great drops in energy, be it
- 10 **RESOLVED**, that the Student Congress here assembled shall make a recommendation
- that schools create policies related to the banning of the consumption of energy drinks
- on school property and by those who are participants in school related activities.

A Resolution to Support the Elimination of the Filibuster

1	WHEREAS,	the framers of the Constitution intended legislation to be passed by
2		simple majority vote, and the Constitution requires a supermajority vote
3		in only a few specific cases; and
4	WHEREAS,	the Senate filibuster is not found in the Constitution, but was created
5		unintentionally in 1806 by Senators removing what they thought was
6		redundant language in the Senate rules; and
7	WHEREAS,	the use of the filibuster before 1970 was rare, but when used it was
8		brutal tool used to segregate, abuse and deny the civil rights of African-
9		American; and
10	WHEREAS,	the use of the filibuster has skyrocketed since 1970 and recently been
11		used to block vital legislation, including worker rights, voting rights and
12		election reform, a public option for healthcare, immigration reform,
13		climate change legislation, and gun violence prevention in the wake of
14		the numerous mass shootings; and
15	WHEREAS,	the current Senate rule creates partisan factions, extremism, and
16		gridlock. Returning to the simple majority threshold as drafted by the
17		framers will allow for more bi-partisan cooperation between moderate
18		members of both political parties
19	RESOLVED,	therefore that the United States Congress here assembled, implores
20		President Joseph R. Biden, President of the Senate Kamala Harris,
21		President Pro Tempore Patrick Leahy, and Majority Leader Charles
22		Schumer to use all expedient measures, legislative or procedural, to
23		eliminate the filibuster rule.

2	SECTION 1.	The ION Act or The Interconnecting Our Nation act, will upon passage,
3		for the next 5 years dedicate 150 billion dollars to the development of
4		electric high-speed rails for the 11 high speed rail Corridors, along with
5		30 billion dollars for the development of high-speed electric rail systems
6		in regions outside of the corridors.
7	SECTION 2.	The High-Speed Rail corridors are 11 regions that are home to 65 percent
8		of Americas population and were deemed by the FRA to be the regions
9		most in need of highspeed transport.
10	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Transportation and the Federal Railway
11		Administration will be responsible for the distribution of the funding and
12		its enforcement.
13		A. 50 billion dollars will come from the annual highway expansion
14		budget. The remaining 130 billion dollars will come from a budget cut
15		to the United States Military.
16	SECTION 4.	This Law will take effect June 1st, 2022. Funding will continue to be
17		provided until June 31 st , 2027.

A Bill to Abolish all Agricultural Subsidies

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- **SECTION 1**. All agricultural subsidies will be abolished, and funds allocated to
- government agencies for the purpose of agricultural subsidies will be
- 4 removed from their budget.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. An agricultural subsidy or agricultural incentive is a government incentive
- 6 paid to agribusinesses, agricultural organizations and farms to
- supplement their income, manage the supply of agricultural
- 8 commodities, and influence the cost and supply of such commodities.
- 9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Agriculture will enforce this legislation.
- SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1st, 2023. All laws in conflict
- with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Amend the Gun-Free School Zones Act of 1990 to Allow for Teacher Carry

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Certified teachers and administrator shall be permitted to possess a
3		firearm in a locked location within their classroom. If a teacher wishes to
4		carry on their person, they must obtain and possess a valid concealed-
