STOP FUNDING ISRAELI APARTHEID NOW ACT

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT

SECTION 1. Repeal all existing legislation that give economic, military, and foreign aid with the State of Israel in order to stand in solidarity with the people of Palestine.

- A. Any other anti-BDS laws on the state level which restricts the American people's right to expression and engage in uninhibited economic decision making will also be considered
- B. The United States will sever all relations with the government of the State of Israel
- C. Impose Economic, Military, and Diplomatic sanctions on the State of Israel.
- SECTION 2. An apartheid is defined by Article 7 of the Roman Statue of the International Criminal Court as "inhumane acts...committed in the context of an institutionalized regime of systematic oppression and domination by one racial group over any other racial group or groups and committed with the intention of maintaining that regime."
 - A. The State of Israel's occupation of the Palestinian people is in violation of over 45 separate international laws, most notably the UN Charter, International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid, the Geneva Convention, and the Hague Regulations.

SECTION 3. \$4 billion in annual aid will be sent to the Palestinian Authority as well as \$10 billion of loan guarantees over the next decade in order to develop necessary infrastructure in the region.

SECTION 4. Considering the multitude of actions outlined in this legislation:

- A. The Office of Foreign Assets Control, Department of the Treasury will oversee the implementation of the sanction programs
- B. The United States Agency for International Development will oversee the administration of aid to the Palestine
- C. The Department of State will oversee the official severance of ties with the State of Israel.

SECTION 5. These legislations upon passage will go into effect on January 1,2022

SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill To Generate Green Jobs and Preempt the Worst Impacts of the Climate Crisis

A Bill to Devolve Responsibilities Regarding Oil and Natural Gas Extraction to Native American Tribes

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	Article I:	The United States Federal Government will devolve responsibilities
2		in matters concerning hydraulic fracturing, oil drilling, and all other
3		natural gas extraction on United States lands or territories to Native

6	Article II:	A Native American person is defined as someone who has blood

12		A. Every state's tribes will hold a conference with each other

20		state will be decided at the conference.
21		C. If a state government or outside actor is found to impede the
22		proceedings of the conferences, they will be charged at least
23		\$100,000 USD.
