1. A Resolution to encourage state education departments to Update the current pronouns curriculum

1	WHEREAS,	The current state of pronoun education does not adequately provide our
2		students with the proper knowledge on topics such as non-binary pronoun
3		usage. This specifically occurs with the singular usage of They/Them
4		pronouns and Neopronouns; and,
5	WHEREAS,	According to The Report of the 2015 U.S. Transgender Survey, 35% of the
6		nearly 28,000 transgender respondents to the anonymous online survey
7		identified as non-binary; and,
8	WHEREAS,	In the United States, the nonbinary respondents to the National
9		Transgender Discrimination Survey chose were nine percentage-points (33
10		percent) more likely to report forgoing healthcare due to fear of
11		discrimination than the general sample (36 percent compared to 27
12		percent). Ninety percent reported experiencing anti-trans bias at work, and
13		43 percent reported having attempted suicide; and,
14	WHEREAS,	The implementation of an updated pronouns course could help educate
15		people on how to properly address those who are nonbinary and on how
16		to properly use singular form They/Them pronouns and Neopronouns;
17		Now, therefore be it
18	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled to make the following recommendation
19		for The U.S department of education to make a suggestion to the states'
20		department of education to update their current pronoun curriculum to
21		adequately cover Neopronouns and Singular They/Them pronouns.

5. A BILL TO REQUIRE DEPICTIONS OF AMERICAN PRESIDENTS ON PAPER CURRENCY

3		former United States Presidents on Federal Reserve Notes. There will be a

6		Notes that conflict with this law upon its passage will remain legal currency, but
7		will be removed from circulation by banking institutions.
8	Article II:	A. Utilization is defined as the printing of images on paper currency by the
9		Bureau of Engraving and Printing;
10		B. Former United States Presidents include any previous holder of the title
11		"President of the United States;"
12		C. The waiting period of twenty-four years begins at noon, on the twentieth day
13		of January, or any day Congress holds the swearing-in of the subsequent
14		president;
15		D. Banking institutions refer to any financial institution that handles legal U.S.
16		currency within the United States of America and its territories.
17	Article III:	This will go into effect immediately upon passage of the bill into law.
18	Article IV:	The Department of the Treasury will oversee the implementation of the law by
19		the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.
20	Article V:	All other laws in conflict with this new policy shall hereby declared null and void.

7. A BILL TO ESTABLISH THE NATIONAL COVID-19 VACCINE CERTIFICATION DATABASE

2	Article I:	The United States shall authorize the creation of a Covid-19 vaccine database and
3		implement a system to certify citizens' immunity to the coronavirus disease 2019 (Covid-
4		19). The Department of Health and Human Services shall grant digital certificates
5		indicating citizens' immunity status upon request.
6	Article II:	A. Coronavirus disease 2019 (Covid-19) refers to the SARS-CoV-2 virus responsible for the
7		2019-2020 global pandemic;
8		B. "Database" is defined as a digital repository for vaccination records;
9		C. "Immunity" refers to resistance to the aforementioned coronavirus as a result of
10		receiving a vaccine specifically designed for Covid-19.;
11		D. "Implementation" will authorize the agencies responsible for the database to contract
12		with private firms;
13		E. "Digital certificates" shall be any electronic method for verifying a citizen's vaccination
14		and immunity status.
15	Article III:	The creation of the database will be effectively immediately upon the successful passage
16		of the bill into law.
17	Article IV:	A. The database will be overseen by the Department of Health and Human Services and
18		maintained by the Center for Disease Control (CDC);
19		B. The Department of Justice and Department of Homeland Security will provide support
20		in screening private contractors and maintain security of the digital database.
