## A Bill to Save the Bicyclists to Protect Their Future

## BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS THAT:

1 SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government will enact a law requiring all
2	persons riding non-motorized bicycles on public roads to wear a helmet.
3 <b>SECTION 2</b> .	A non-motorized bicycle is defined as any bicycle that is not equipped
4	with a motor.
5	A public road is defined as any highway, road, or street under the
6	jurisdiction of and maintained by a public authority and open to public
7	travel.
8	A helmet is defined as a hard or padded protective head covering.
9 SECTION 3.	The government agency that will oversee the enforcement of this law
10	shall be the Department of Transportation
11 <b>SECTION 4</b> .	This law shall go into effect on January 1, 2022.
12 <b>SECTION 5</b> .	All other laws in conflict with this legislation shall be declared null and
13	void.

15	intersectionali	ty of these groups;

17	WHEREAS,	zero-tolerance polices prevent many public schools from	
18	moving toward	ds more preventative and restorative systems of support;

20	WHEREAS,	students are returning to schools after 18 months of	
21	uncertainty, e	xclusion, and a lack of access to social-emotional supports	
22	who may requ	ire additional inclusionary support;	
23	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled that a Department of	
24	Education con	nmission be established to create a plan to effectively abolish	
25	zero-tolerance	policies in public schools by the 2023-2024 school year.
