

The Reapportionment Act

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The Seats to the US House of Representatives shall expand to be equal to
2 691 by the year 2040. This shall be done in two parts, after the release of
3 the census data for the years 2030 and 2040. District maps must be held
4 within judicial and legislative standards, and must account for the
5 representative increase in the years 2030 and 2040. Following this, the
6 value of the number of Representatives shall be determined using the cube
7 root of the updated Census population of a given year, and apportioned
8 accordingly using the current Method of Equal Proportions.

9 **SECTION 2.** An election cycle may be defined as the beginning of a Representative's
10 two-year term and ending at the Election Day of each even year. Judicial
11 and legislative standards refer to Supreme Court precedents and laws
12 established by this Congress.

13 **SECTION 3.** This legislation will be enforced by the powers of this Congress assembled
14 here.

SECTION 4. This legislation shall come into effect in the election year 2022.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Privatization of Prisons

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The Bureau of Prisons shall now forth be prohibited from contracting
3 with, or utilizing services provided by, privatized prisons or any
4 corporation engaged in the private prison industry.

5 **SECTION 2.** A private prison is considered an institution that is owned or operated by
6 a non-government entity.

7 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice will be responsible for overseeing the closure
8 of all privatized prisons, the divesting of all contracts with private prison
9 corporations, and the opening of all new prisons.

10 **SECTION 4.** The Department of Justice will have five years to complete the closure of
11 all privatized prisons from the date this bill is passed.

12 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to End the United States Drone Program Overseas

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** 1 Year from the passage of this legislation, there will be a complete end
3 to the U.S. Drone Program and the usage of Drones as a military offensive
4 in foreign countries.

5 **SECTION 2.** The U.S. Drone Program is defined as: the program with a demonstrated
6 and an enabled willingness to use lethal force in counterterrorism
7 operations through the usage of military grade drones

8 **SECTION 3.** U.S Code § 357, 132 Stat. 3305 be revised to say: It is the policy of the
9 United States that the operation of any unmanned aircraft or unmanned aircraft system
10 shall be carried out in a manner that respects and protects personal and foreign privacy
11 consistent with the United States Constitution and Federal, State, and local law."

12 **SECTION 4.** \$10 Billion in Department of Defense Funding shall be reallocated from the
13 current Drone Program annual spending to a research project to innovate and discover
14 new military offensive methods to replace the abrogated U.S. Drone Program.

15 **SECTION 5.** The implementation of this legislation will be overseen by the Department
16 of Defense, State Department, and the U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations.

17 **SECTION 6.** This legislation will take effect immediately. All laws in conflict with this
18 legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Levy Taxes on Credit Unions

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The United States Government will levy Corporate Income Taxes on all
2 federally-registered and state-chartered Credit Unions

3 **SECTION 2.** A. Corporate Income Tax is defined as a direct tax imposed by a
4 jurisdiction on the income or capital of corporations or analogous legal
5 entities.

6 B. Credit Unions are defined as a type of financial institution, similar to a
7 commercial bank, is a member-owned financial cooperative, controlled by
8 its members and operated on a not-for-profit basis.

9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Treasury and Federal Reserve will oversee the
10 implementations and compliance with this legislation.

11 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect at the start of Fiscal Year 2022
12 [1 October, 2022]. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
13 null and void.

A Bill to Lower the Medical Age of Consent to Sixteen

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The Federal Standard for the Medical Age of Consent will be lowered to
3 age of sixteen for every person residing in the United States, regardless of
4 citizenship status.

5 **SECTION 2.** Medical consent is defined as formal permission granted by an individual
6 to their caretaker, doctor, nurse, or other medical professional to provide
7 them medical care, immunization, surgeries, etc.

8 **SECTION 3.** The age for a minor to exercise their right under the Health Insurance
9 Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) will be revised to classify
10 minors as anyone younger, but not including those 16-Years of Age.

11 **SECTION 4.** An annual grant program of \$50 Billion will be made available for
12 hospitals in the United States to apply in the case of legal subjugation
13 from third parties.

14 **SECTION 5.** The Departments of Justice and Health and Human Services will oversee
15 the implementation and enforcement of this legislation.

16 **SECTION 6.** This legislation will take effect on June 1, 2022

A Bill to Minimize U.S. Military Relations with Saudi Arabia

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States Federal Government will no longer participate in the
3 sale of, or providing of support to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia with
4 weapons, government technology, or military support.

5 **SECTION 2.** Sale is defined as: the exchange of a commodity for money; the action of
6 selling something, such as money.

7 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Political-Military Affairs (PM)
8 will oversee the implementation of the cease in sales. All instances of
9 weapon sales to Saudi Arabia, both directly and indirectly, shall be
10 investigated by non-partisan organizations and all complicit actors in the
11 sale of weapons to Saudi Arabia will be given life sentences with
12 opportunity for appeal and bail.

13 **SECTION 4.** This cease of sale of weapons to Saudi Arabia will be implemented
14 December 1st, 2022.

15 **SECTION 5.** The United State will withdraw 90% of all troops in Saudi Arabia that are
16 presently stationed there to prevent conflict with Iran and its proxy
17 forces.

18 **SECTION 6.** The withdrawal of troops will begin July 1st, 2022.

19 **SECTION 7.** The United States Department of Defense will oversee the withdrawal of
20 troops and maintain protection of the U.S. Embassy.

21 **SECTION 8.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
22 and void.

A Bill to Opt Into Data Collection from Big Tech

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Companies that fall under the category of technology and sell personal
3 technology are hereby required to offer an opt in option to the devices
4 data collection practices.

5 **A.** Companies have one year from the passage of this legislation to
6 implement an opt in option for their consumers.

7 **B.** Companies that fail to do so will be fined \$1.5 million dollars per
8 month until an opt in option is provided to align with this legislation.

9 **SECTION 2.** Personal technology is defined as a device and service that is used by a
10 single person as opposed to a family, business, or society.

11 **SECTION 3.** The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and Department of Commerce will
12 be responsible for the implementation and enforcement of this
13 legislation.

14 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage. All laws in
15 conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Promote Peace in Kashmir

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The United States shall send India and Pakistan an additional \$500 million
3 in developmental aid each.

4 **SECTION 2.** Developmental aid shall be defined as monetary assistance in the form of
5 grants, program, and/or training to support a developing country's
6 political, economic, or social development and progress.

7 **SECTION 3.** The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) shall be
8 tasked with the implementation of this bill

9 **SECTION 4.** To continue receiving aid, both countries must withdraw their military
10 forces by April 1, 2022.

11 **SECTION 5.** Monthly audits will be conducted to ensure that both countries fully
12 remove their militaries from Kashmir. If the audit determines that either
13 India or Pakistan has not withdrawn from Kashmir, all military and
14 developmental aid will be revoked to countries in non-compliance.

15 **SECTION 6.** This legislation will take effect on April 1, 2022

16 **SECTION 7.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Strengthen the Integrity of Election Finance

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. All SuperPAC's shall be subject to the same campaign finance limits that PACs are. To supplement for the possible funding reduction, citizens shall receive a \$100 voucher to help fund the candidate of their choice.

SECTION 2. SuperPAC's shall be defined as independent expenditure-only political committees that may receive unlimited contributions from individuals, corporations, labor unions, and other political action committees for the purpose of financing independent expenditures and other independent political activity. PACs shall be defined as a political committee organized for the purpose of raising money for the purpose of electing and defeating a candidate. Vouchers shall be defined as a form given to voters where they signify which candidate within their jurisdiction, they will use the government supplied funds on.

SECTION 3. The Federal Election Commission (FEC) will oversee the implementation of this legislation. All money needed to fund this bill will be reallocated from the U.S. Department of Defense Budget.

A. The campaign contribution limits that SuperPAC's will now be subject to include but are not limited to:

I. A full disclosure of all entities that fund the organization to the FEC

II. Must register with the FEC within 10 days of formation.

III. A \$5,000 limit for how much any corporation, individual or other organization can spend funding the SuperPAC.

IV. A \$5,00 limit on how much SuperPAC's can spend supporting a particular candidate, and a \$15,000 limit for supporting a particular party.

B. If the organization is supporting and/or attacking a particular candidate and/or party, they are subject to these laws regardless of if they had any direct relations with the candidate.

C. The distribution and collection of vouchers will be handled in the same way as mail-in ballots. **D.** Vouchers will have an option to not donate to any candidate. In that case, the money that would have been used will stay in the U.S. Department of Defense budget.

E. Vouchers will only be distributed to registered voters.

F. Vouchers will be sent 9 months before the election date but must be returned at least 90 days prior to the election date.

G. Vouchers will be used in addition to the current political donation system and will not replace it.

SECTION 4. This law will go into effect on November 9th, 2022.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Promote Democracy in Taiwan

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **WHEREAS,** China is continuously endangering the continuation of a free democracy
3 in Taiwan, and

4 **WHEREAS,** Various elections, media, and public opinions are shaped by the Chinese
5 Communist Party, and

6 **WHEREAS,** The future of Taiwanese democracy and close US-Taiwan relations is in
7 trouble, and

8 **WHEREAS,** The U.S. supports democracy around the world and strives to preserve
9 U.S. presence in East Asia while protecting democratic values; now,
10 therefore, be it

11 **RESOLVED,** By the Congress here assembled that the United States assist Taiwan in
12 Assuring that the full transparency and independence of its media and
13 elections take place through the coordination between the United States,
14 Taiwan, and the United Nations and be it.

15 **FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the US further strengthen Taiwan's defense system by
16 providing arms, missiles, and additional technologies to defend itself against China.

A bill to abolish The Military Selective Service Act of 1948

Be it enacted by the congress here assembled that:

Section 1: The Military Selective Service Act of 1948 is hereby abolished. The bill was last utilized in 1973.

Section 2: The Military Service Act of 1948 requires all men 18 or older to register with the Selective Service.

Section 3: This bill shall be enforced by the Selective Service System (SSS).

Section 4: The bill shall take place immediately upon passage. The SSS will discard all registered individuals, reject new registrants, and disband all sectors of the agency that deal with the draft.

Section 5: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
